## Netball.

The Final Form Cup Match, between Forms VI. and L.V., postponed from last term on account of bad weather, was played on Thursday, July 19th, and resulted in a win for Form VI.- 14 goals to 8. The game was an exciting one to watch, as the teams were very well matched. The VI. Form were decidedly stronger in the middle of the field, but the L.V. made up for it in their shooting and defence. At first it seemed as if the L.V. were going to have an easy game, as they scored goal after goal, while the VI. missed the easiest shots ; but after half-time, the VI. Form shooting improved considerably, and they gained and kept the lead. J. Horn and M. Follett did very good work on the L.V. side, and P. Foucard, H. Bourne, and E. Hotchkin combined well together for the VI. Form.

## Tennis.

No outside matches have been played this term, as it has been decided to drop them all until after the War. However, there have been three matches: two against the Staff and one against the mothers.
Staff $v$. School. Played on July 6th. Result: the Staff won by 51 points (8-7, 10-5, 10-5). The play of the 3 rd couple was quite promising, though they were overmatched by their opponents. The School 2nd couple were also outplayed. The back line play was quite good, but the net play was weak. The third match was more even than either of the other two, though somewhat uninteresting. H. Bourne played a very steady game.
School v. Mothers. Played on July 13th. Result: the Mothers won by 115 points to 110 . 1st couple won 9-6, 2nd couple won 8-7, 3rd couple lost 4-11. For the juniors C. Philip played a very pretty game. In the second couple I. Butlin played very steadily, and gained her first mention. In the first couple H. Bourne played very well, and gained her third mention and shield.
Staff $v$. School. Played on July 20th. Result: the Staff won by 89 points to 76.1 st couple (School) lost 6-9, second couple won 8-7. Owing to the illness of Miss Rose, the Staff played two couples only, substituting one of the third couple in the second.

## Chapacters of the Tennis Champions.

H. Bourne has developed into a good all-round player. Her service is extremely good, and she shows judgment in placing her balls. Her cross-drives are most effective, and at the net she is somewhat difficult to pass. She has won her shield. We shall miss her very much next year.
I. Butlin is a very steady back-line player. Her service is good, but she should vary it at times. She places her balls, but must try to put more force into her strokes. She has won her first mention.
D. Browne shows a lack of alertness in her play. Her back-line play is good on the whole, but her net play is poor. Her service, apart from double faults, which are too frequent, is good.
P. Foucard is at her best at the net, but she is not difficult to pass, and should try to increase her reach. Her service needs a great deal of practice and her back-line play is weak.
C. Phicip is decidedly promising. Her style is good and her drives show considerable force, though she shows too great a tendency to "smash."
I. Windebank also shows promise. Her forehand strokes are good, and so is her service, except for a tendency to " doubles," but her back-line balls are weak.

## The Lower School Sports.

The Lower School Sports were held on Wednesday, June 6th. Aithough the weather had been uncertain the day before, Wednesday dawned fine and sunny, and we were pleased to be able to welcome a number of parents and Old Girls. One of the most interesting events was the Bicycle Obstacle Race. This was a real trial of skill, and very few succeeded in overcoming all the obstacles, the plank along which they had to ride at the end proving a serious difficulty to competitors who had otherwise been successful. The last event was the time-honoured Form Team Race, and amidst great enthusiasm the Second Form bore off the Lower School trophy, and the Sixth Form remained the proud possessors of the Upper School bowl. The day closed with the distribution of medals, in the form of Maltese crosses, which for the third year have been presented instead of prizes; and three hearty cheers were given for Miss Bell.


## Upper School Sports.

Upper School Sports have never been held since the School began until this term, and there was a general rejoicing when it was announced that they were to take place on Thursday, July 5th, at 5 p.m. The Sixth Form suggested having the sports in order to raise money for War Funds, and they undertook their organisation. The races were chosen from the point of view of variety, so that both the audience and the competitors might enjoy themselves. The entrance fees were $1 / 6$ (covering all races) or 3d. for each race; and the spectators' tickets were 9 d . for parents and friends, 6 d . for School girls, and 3d. for brothers and sisters under 12 and not in the School. There were no prizes, in orler to save expense. Instead, certificates, made by the girls and signed by Miss Bell, were awarded.

The afternoon of July 5th was fine and sunny, and although the heat was not great, it was enough to make the refreshments very much appreciated. The races were all most entertaining, especially the Four-Legged, the Musical Chairs, the Hair Dressing and the Costume Obstacle Races. In the latter the costume, a bonnet, a sweater, a very long skirt, and a pair of gloves, was indeed cruel,
especially the sweater, since it had to be taken off half-way through the race, and this is never an easy job, at the best of times. 'The money raised by entrance fees, spectators' tickets, refreshments, and donations, amounting to $£ 1017 \mathrm{~s}$, has been sent to the Children's Country Holiday Fund. This fund ismore than ever in need of help, now that travelling expenses are so great and cases of distress are so terribly numerous. The Sixth Form wish to thank the Staff who judged and superintended the races on the day, the girls who mades the certificates, and those people who were so kind as to give donations.
