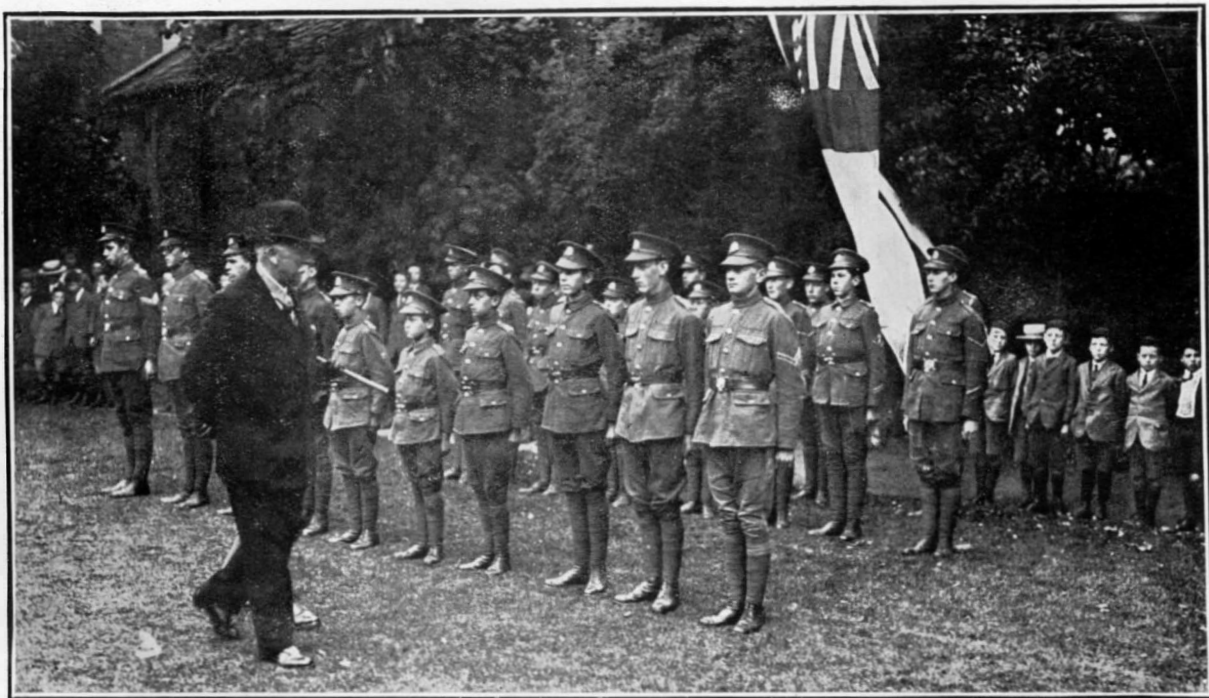

School Topics.

BY THE HEADMASTER.

THE Prize Day of 1919 was specially marked by the fact that both the Lord Mayor and Sheriff honoured us with their presence. This is the second time this has occurred since the opening of the School in 1910.

There was a very large gathering of parents and friends in the Thatched Assembly Rooms to welcome them, and the proceedings passed off very well indeed.

The Sheriff (Mr. H. P. Gowen) made an excellent Chairman, and spoke in eulogistic terms of the School and its work, and in the course of his speech very kindly made mention of the sincere friendship that has existed between him and me for many years past. It is well known how thoroughly capable and businesslike our worthy Sheriff is, so, to make quite sure he was supporting a commendable and well-conducted School, he very kindly and considerately paid us a special visit, inspected the Cadet Corps, looked over all the premises, made the acquaintance of the members of the Staff, and saw the boys at work in their classes. That he should speak in high terms of satisfaction with all he had seen was very gratifying to me and all connected with the School.

On rising to give his address before distributing the prizes, the Lord Mayor ("Our Lord Mayor," I should say, for so he likes to be considered and we love

to call him) at once delighted the boys by saying he "had squared the Headmaster, as he had asked and obtained his consent for an extra day's holiday." His lordship has a wonderful way with boys, and quickly and easily wins their attention and affection. He has been one of our staunchest friends and supporters ever since the opening of the School, and has rarely been absent from our Prize Day proceedings, and has never failed to send us a handsome prize. On this occasion he not only praised the patriotism, bravery, and devotion of our dear Old Boys, but urged those present to spare no effort to train themselves in mind and body, so as to become worthy residents of the city and county that had produced Nelson and Townshend.

In proposing and seconding a vote of thanks to the Sheriff and the Lord Mayor, the Rev. Griffith Jenkins and Alderman H. J. Waters not only happily voiced the grateful feelings of all present towards our distinguished citizens, who had so well taken the principal parts in the day's proceedings, but also spoke in high terms of the School and gave great encouragement to those responsible for its management.

The musical items so well rendered by the School Choir showed how thoroughly and carefully they had been trained by Mr. A. E. Benson (the School Singing Master).

Geo. Harrington Kidd ("our youthful Sarasate," as the Lord Mayor so aptly called him) delighted everyone by the masterly and pleasing manner in which he played one of the most difficult compositions of the great master. He won tumults of applause both in that and the charming selection he gave as an encore.

Specimens of Handwriting and Art Work, done by the boys during the year, were exhibited on the walls of the Assembly Rooms. These were creditable both to the Art Mistress, Miss Agnes B. Walker, and to her pupils, and were much appreciated and admired by the large number of the audience who inspected them.

The whole Prize Day proceedings passed off exceedingly well, and I wish to express my sincere thanks to all those who helped to bring about so happy a result.

The present Term has been a very busy and most enjoyable one to the boys especially. Cricket, tennis, bowls, and swimming, have had their full share of attention, and afforded a full measure of happiness.

The Cadet Corps has been busy too, and, though not so large as a year ago, I think is just as efficient. A picked squad of the Corps under the command of their most energetic and kindly Captain—Captain E. J. Tench—had the privilege of forming a guard of honour to Mrs. Lloyd George, at the Private Schools Exhibition in Caxton Hall, London, where their displays in Cadet work won very hearty and well-merited applause and appreciation.

The Lucas-Tooth competition display came at the end of the Term and we have not yet heard the result. We hope many of the parents will encourage their boys to join the Corps in the near future, as it has so many advantages both physically and in the formation of character as well.

I should very much like to form a Junior Officers Cadet Corps at the School, and if this could be done, as might easily be the case, we should get considerable help from the War Office in the way of instructors, uniform, arms, and ammunition. This would considerably raise the tone and status of the Corps and its members. I should be very glad to hear from parents who are willing to let their boys join such a Corps. I could include both boys at present in the School, and also those who have left, whose ages are between 14 and 18 years.

To return to the visit Schools Exhibition, the School sent up several specimens of Art Work which were much admired, and our talented young violinist, George Harrington Kidd, was splendidly received. So many Schools were represented at the Exhibition that each performer was only allowed to give one item, but George Kidd was called on for **three** displays and received quite an ovation on each occasion. The Cadet Corps, too, gave two displays, so that our School really made an excellent impression.

About the middle of the Term the School was inspected by the University of Cambridge. The Inspector, Mr. Rupert Deacon, M.A. (Oxon), spent three days at the School, and very thoroughly inspected every branch of the School work, buildings, and equipment. He saw every member of the Staff at work, and made many suggestions, and gave much friendly advice which his long experience fully qualified him to do. I think he was pleased with the School as a whole, although he did not fail to criticise and advise where he thought improvement might be made; but it was always done in a most kindly and courteous manner, which was received in quite the right spirit by practically every member of the Staff.

The report has not yet come to hand, and we may have to wait some little time for it, as there are so many other schools being inspected by the University during this Term.

Another important event during the Term was the presentation of the Lucas Tooth medals won by the Cadet Corps last year. The Lord Mayor (Sir G. M. Chamberlin) very kindly came to the School to perform this interesting ceremony. This is the second time this year he has shown his keen interest in the School by taking the principal part in a School function. He is always an exceedingly popular visitor, as he has such a charming and original way with him as to win the attention, respect, and affection of the boys.

Quite at the end of the Term came our Annual Athletic Sports, held for charitable purposes, as the whole of the receipts a between the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital, the Jenny Lind Hospital, and the Blind School. We were very glad to be able to carry out our programme in full, as the morning and early afternoon were very threatening, but the rain held off, and the weather was quite pleasant at the end of the day. Of course, this had a bad effect on the attendance, but, considering the state of the weather, we had a very nice company of spectators. The races were well contested, and we had a record number of entries—652. Unfortunately, Mrs. H. P. Gowen was unable to be present through illness to present the prizes, but Miss Gowen carried out that important duty in a very charming manner, and received a lovely sheaf of carnations from the boys at the close of the ceremony, the Victor Ludorum (Ivan G. Wright) making the presentation.

Miss Gowen was accompanied by her father, our worthy and popular Sheriff,

who made an excellent speech, expressing his pleasure at being present and his high opinion of the School in respect of its educational successes, its sports, and Cadet work. He urged the boys of the High School not only to high achievements in these ways, but also to strive equally hard to build up noble characters of honour, morality, and Godliness. This is the second time the Sheriff has visited us, and on each occasion he has encouraged us greatly by his good advice, friendly hearty appreciation of our efforts to do our duty.

Quite a good number of our Old Boys were at the Sports, much to our delight. Among them David Hewitson and James Fisher, who took the opportunity to carry off the first and second prizes in a well-contested Old Boys race. Hewitson has been doing quite well at Sandhurst, and came out **eleventh** in order of merit in the final examinations, a very fine performance for a boy from a Private School. He also gained his "blue" at football and tennis at Sandhurst, and was in the winning tug-of-war team at their Annual Athletic Sports. I hear rumours of other possible successes which I hope will materialise.

I cannot close these notes without expressing my satisfaction and thankfulness that the martial strife between nations has ceased, and that the "dogs of war" are muzzled, I hope, for ever. But things are looking black in the industrial world. Would that peace might soon be declared there! We sank our differences and pulled together to win the war, and now I hope that all will strive by common sense and sweet reason to bring about such a state of affairs as will produce "Peace on earth and goodwill among men," especially of
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Annual Prize Distribution.

ON Wednesday, April 15th, the School held its Annual Prize Distribution at the Thatched Assembly Room, All Saints' Green. The Sheriff (Mr. H. P. Gowen) presided over the proceedings, and the Lord Mayor (Sir G. M. Chamberlin) distributed the prizes and certificates. Supporting them on the platform were the Rev. W. Griffith Jenkins, Mr. H. Oake, Mr. H. J. Waters, and Capt. E. J. Tench, and a large assemblage of parents and friends of the boys was present.

A first-rate musical programme was rendered, consisting of pianoforte solos by Miss Jean Walker, L. J. Stammers, and H. G. Arnold; songs by the choir, under the direction of Mr. A. E. Benson; and a violin solo by G. H. Kidd.

The Chairman congratulated the Headmaster on the Report, and the boys on the excellent results of last year.

that the proceeds of the last Athletic Sports had been devoted entirely to charities, The gift of charity was a thing that should be inculcated in boys—a gift some people were unable to exercise. He did not think there was any need to apologise for such a school. The Headmaster's Report and the splendid audience present were sufficient to justify its existence. He was glad the School was to be publicly examined, because however good a school might be, the boys themselves liked to know that they had not only passed their own master's tests, but also those of the higher education authorities.

The Lord Mayor, before distributing the awards, also very warmly congratulated the Headmaster and the boys on the results of their year's work. He was not there to advocate militarism,

yet at the same time he felt it was only right that the boys should be trained in healthy pursuits outside their working hours, and this was done at the School through the Cadet Corps. The war record of the School was a highly worthy one, and he was sure all the boys he saw before him would do their utmost to live up to the ideal of duty set them by so many of the Old Boys. They belonged to a county which produced Nelson and Townshend. Norfolk men had always had a reputation for being brave and ready to do their duty, and they still retained their good name.

He was glad to find that amongst the fresh developments in connection with the School the art of public speaking was going to be taken in hand. Proud as he was of his city, it must be admitted that there were not overdone with public orators. He did not himself pose as an orator, but one thing he always strove after was to what he wanted to say, and then, when he had finished, to sit down. The art of public speaking, as he knew it, was not to bore the audience. He endorsed the remarks of the Sheriff with regard to the public examination. They wanted the Norwich High School not only to keep up its reputation, but very much to enhance it.

After the prizes had been distributed, votes of thanks were accorded to the Lord Mayor and to the Sheriff, and the proceedings were concluded by the singing of the National Anthem.

THE Eighth Annual Charity Sports by the Norwich High School for Boys, held under the direction of Mr. J. G. Chapman (the Principal) and his Staff, provided a capital afternoon's enjoyment for a goodly number of people on the Newmarket Road Cricket Ground yesterday afternoon. Though the sky had a leaden hue, and there was a bite in the air, the proceedings were such that these were forgotten, the various events occasioning much excitement. The boys were keenness itself, while a wholesome sporting spirit prevailed throughout. The entries for the various events numbered 652, but as the heats were run off previous to yesterday, practically only finals were decided. The Secretarial duties were admirably carried out by Messrs. G. T. James and A. H. W. Marsh, and with regard to other official duties several gentlemen, well known in athletic circles, rendered aid. The sports were successful from every point of view, and the school is to be congratulated on possessing several promising youngsters. In the course of the afternoon the band of the 7th (P.R.) The School Cadet Corps.

THIS term's work with the Cadet Corps has been quite a different one from last term; then it was a quiet term for progress and building up; this term has showed the results of the steady work of the preceding term. There have been three outstanding features of this term: the presentation of the Lucas Tooth Medals by the Lord Mayor (Sir George Chamberlin), the sending of a picked squad to London to form a Guard of Honour to Mrs. Lloyd George at the Private Schools Exhibition at Caxton Hall, Westminster, and the competition for the Lucas Tooth Medals for this year.

The presentation of the medals took place early in the Term on the School Lawn. The *Eastern Daily Press* reported it in the following terms:—

"The Cadet Corps of the Norwich High School for Boys were awarded medals in the Lucas Tooth Competition for being the most efficient Corps in Norfolk, and yesterday at the school the Lord Mayor of Norwich (Sir G. M. Chamberlin) presented these medals to

the lads. The function took place on the School Lawn in the presence of a company, including, in addition to the Lord Mayor, Col. Currie, Major Grehan, the Dean of Grahamstown, Capt. G. N. Herbert (C.F.), &c. The Sheriff (Mr. H. P. Gowen) wrote regretting his inability to attend.

"The Lord Mayor was received by a guard of honour with the general salute. He then inspected the ranks, following which the squad to receive medals marched past, and returned to their position opposite the saluting base. The Corps were under the command of Captain E. J. Tench.

"Mr. J. Geo. Chapman (Principal of the School), having warmly congratulated the Lord Mayor on his knighthood, mentioned that in the first year of its existence the School Cadet Corps came second in the Norfolk 'competition.' They were first in each of the two following years, and last summer won the biggest triumph of all at the Cadet Camp of 2,000 at Marlborough from the schools of England, bringing away the Walton Shield, the first time it had ever been brought to Norfolk. Speaking of the Cadet training, Mr. Chapman said that at the school they were not trying to infuse the military spirit into the boys, but only to develop them physically, and to make them strong and sturdy, and obedient and respectful citizens and subjects of the King.

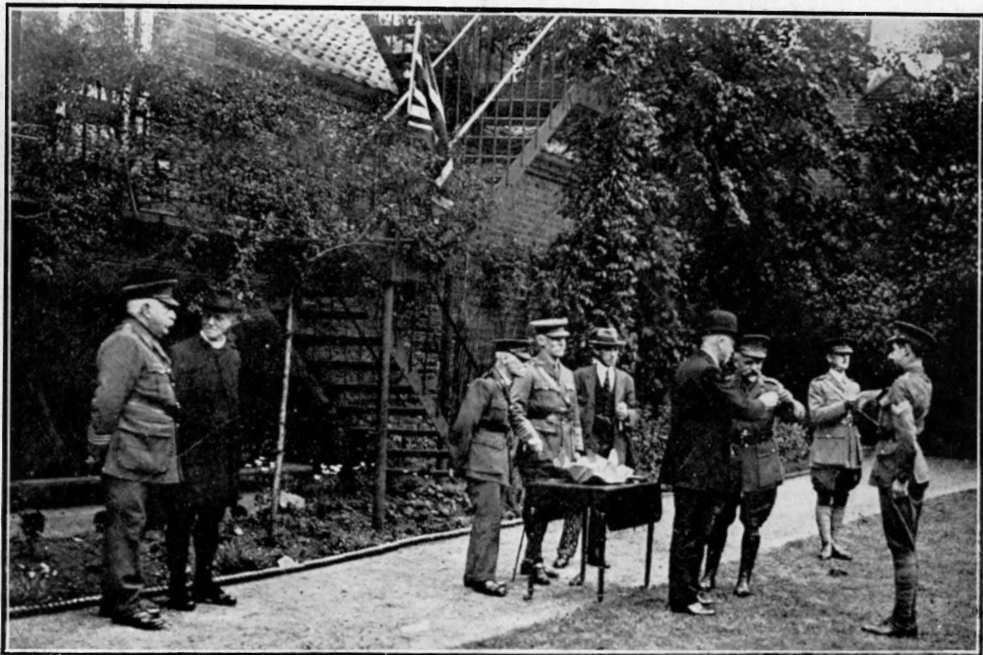
"The Lord Mayor congratulated the Head Master on the result of his endeavours to get together a Cadet Corps which was a credit to the school and the city. From his own knowledge and experience of military matters, said the Lord Mayor—he had been a soldier since he was 16 years of age—he was able to say with perfect honesty and truthfulness that he considered the Corps to be a very smart body of young

folks. He was also glad they had been able to bring that Shield to Norwich, and knew they would do their best to keep it there. He for one felt they were doing the right thing, said his lordship, in training young men in physical science and physical drill. It was good to give them an idea of what discipline was and of what it would effect. He was glad to know they were attached to the Norfolk Regiment. Some of those present would say, 'There he is again, at his favourite hobby—always Norfolk and Norwich first.' (Laughter.) We had reason to be proud of the Norfolk Regiment. They had done wonders and had had heavy losses in stemming the advance of an unchivalrous enemy. All honour to the Corps—descendants of Norwich citizens and Norfolk people—who had held the standard high. Having congratulated them on winning the medals, the Cadets, at the Lord Mayor's call, gave three cheers for the King and one for the Prince of Wales, who, said his lordship, was rapidly winning his way into the hearts and affections of the English people.

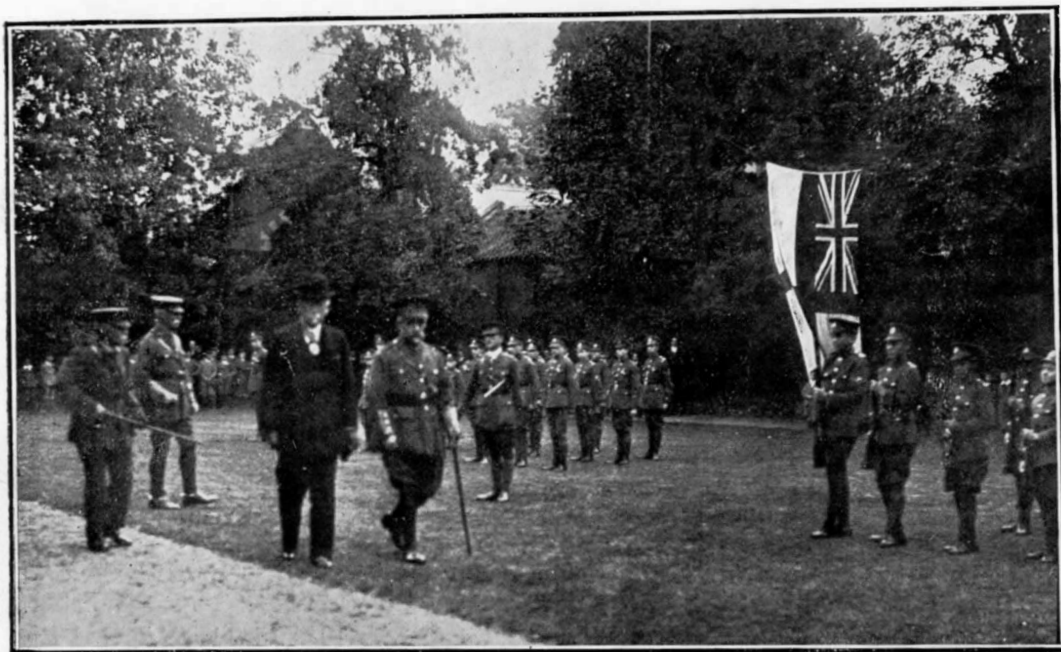
"At the close of the ceremony three cheers were given to the Lord Mayor at the call of Colonel Currie.

"Captain G. N. Herbert (C.F.) paid a tribute to the Lord Mayor. He also mentioned in an address to the boys, that when he was 14 years of age he was a Cadet. He was attached to the 'Robin Hoods,' and wore a red Garibaldi shirt and green trousers. The Cadet movement would help to make men of the boys."

The greatest event of the Term as far as the Cadets were concerned was the visit to town. A picked squad was sent, consisting of eight rank and file, one sergeant, and one bugler, under the command of our excellent and popular Sergeant-Major, R. Anderson,

Monument was a great feat. Luckily the Cadets were in excellent fettle, or the 312 steps up would have sorely tried them.

The competition for this year's Lucas Tooth Medals was held on the School Lawn on Tuesday, the 22nd July. The members were again a credit to the Corps, but the result will not be announced for several weeks yet. The Inspecting Officer was Colonel Currie, accompanied by Captain Creasy, from the Norfolk Regimental Depot.

Now that the war is over and peace is signed, it is hoped that the War Office will allow us to turn our Cadet Corps into what we originally intended it to be—a Junior Officers' Training Corps. We could not do it before, as none were allowed to be formed during the late war.

To be able to do this we must have a guarantee of eighty members all over fourteen years of age. Those under that age will remain in the present Corps till old enough for the Senior Corps.

Ex-members of our present Corps and Old Boys of the School will be heartily welcomed as members of our proposed new Corps.
