Editorial.

HIS past Term marks the close of the School year, and on looking back we find it has been a good one; there is always more to be done, but a great deal has been accomplished, and the new year will start under the best auspices. We have a growing reputation to enhance and traditions to preserve, and we must set about doing it in no uncertain way.—Altiora petimus.

The Bishop of Chichester presented the prizes, a performance which he manipulated in the happiest manner possible; Mr. Harris bade him welcome in a few words, and expressed the great pleasure it gave all and sundry to see him at S Ronan's, thanking him most warmly on behalf of the School for his kindness in coming. The Bishop spoke for some ten minutes; he always liked to be among young people, and the fact that there were so many schools, influenced him considerably in accepting Chichester; he encouraged the boys not to be down-hearted if they did badly for a time, either in work or games; honest effort was bound to tell, but he had no use for "slackers"; he spoke warmly of the growing prosperity of S. Ronan's and alluded to his coming visit to the Chapel. It was the general opinion that the Sports were a great success; many parents were present, which was a great pleasure to us, they are more appropriate to a Sports meeting than outside people. - H. M. Morris. A very free-hitting, promising bat; weak against fast bowling; useful in the field.
- A. Latham-Brown. Useful wicket-keeper; fair defensive bat, but no scoring shots.
- E. H. D. GRIMLEY. Most promising player; bowling erratic.
- A. M. G. COBBOLD. Greatly improved bat; good field and catch.
- H. M. GOODALL. If he learns to play straight, will be good; has plenty of strokes; useful fast bowler.
- K. G. MALCOLMSON. Shows much promise as a bat, but as yet lacks experience; fair field.
- N. G. HARRIS. Sometimes makes runs; he also wants experience; fair catch, good field.
- G. T. W. HORNE. Good field and catch; may be a useful allround player next year.
- W. H. R. CRICK. Excellent catch and field; crude bat, but watches the ball.
