Æditorial.

VERYONE seems to have been complaining of the " measly " weather. Not so we at S. Ronan's. Lectures.

We have been fortunate in hearing three most interesting lectures during the past term. The first one was held in Miss Fisher's Hall. It will be remembered that we frequently amalgamate with her on these occasions. The Honble. R. J. Yarde-Buller came down and delivered a most interesting and instructive address on "Life in the Navy." In these days when the tendency is so much in the opposite direction, it seems to us to be of the utmost importance to foster everything connected with patriotism, and for that reason alone the lecture would have been pronounced a success.

The second, by Mr. J. A. J. de Villiers, was on the subject of "Holland." Mr. de Villiers is a prominent member of the British Museum staff, and previous to his visit to S. Ronan's had been touring in Holland, where he lectured before the Queen and Royal Family, the Universities, and various other learned institutions. It was natural therefore that we looked forward to this evening with considerable eagerness, and we were not disappointed except in one respect, and that was not Mr. de Villiers' fault. The wretched light from the lantern completely spoilt many of what were obviously very beautiful slides. The lecturer, however, did not seem in the least put out, and beyond remarking that some of the slides were nice if only they could be seen, went on quite imperturbably with his subject. Though in parts, rather above the heads of some of the more youthful

members, to most of us the lecture was in every way most interesting, and it was in any case a very kind action on the part of such a busy man to take the trouble to come down to S. Ronan's for this purpose.

The third and last Lecture, by the Rev.G. Remfrey Brookes, was entitled-"With a Camera in Switzerland," and was in a sense the greatest success of the lot. It undoubtedly appealed very much more to the boys than any other lecture which has been delivered at S. Ronan's, and as far as those older ones present were concerned, though it may not have been more interesting than the one on "Holland," it certainly was quite as much so. The fact that the lantern was much more powerful too rendered the whole thing more attractive. We were all of us pleased to see Mr. Brookes, and as the father of one of our boys he was doubly welcome. Next year he has promised to come and lecture to us on "Italy." When, as in his case the slides are the lecturer's own work, and his views the result of his own travels, the subject is always much more interesting, and our only regret is that we shall have to wait a whole year before listening to him again.

CHARACTERS.

A. M. G. COBBOLD (Captain).—Quite the best forward S. Ronan's has ever had; possesses perfect control of the ball, is a clever dribbler, passes with precision and is a very fair shot.

- A. LATHAM-BROWN.—A very good and sound half back; strong in his tackling and accurate in his passing; will be captain next year.
- G. T. W. HORNE.—A very fine and most promising back; a good kick with either foot, a clever tackler, and fast and dashing.
- J. S. T. Mansell.—A very energetic and sturdy half; quick in his movements and always works hard.
- H. M. Morris.—A forward of the most promising type; a fast and good shot and a clever dribbler.
- G. H. COLDHAM.—A very sound goalkeeper with a thorough knowledge of the game; can also play with success out of goal.
- N. G. HARRIS.—A most improved player this season; good with his head and a useful tackler; a very fair kick with either foot.
- K. G. Malcolmson.—A useful goalkeeper, if he can learn to be more accurate in his kicking; should also turn into a good back.
- P. A. S. Hadley.—Though somewhat uncertain, is quite young, and shows considerable promise; possesses plenty of pace.
- J. F. B. Delap.—A very useful outside right; is fairly fast, centres well, and uses his head in passing.
- E. H. D. GRIMLEY.—Another promising player; strong and fairly fast, with good tackling powers; his passing is accurate.
- R. H. de M. Leathes.—Has played on many occasions in the absence of someone else, and shows considerable promise.

The Cake Match.

A. M. G. Cobbold's XI. v. A. Latham-Brown's XI.

This match produced by far the most exciting struggle of any we have witnessed in this historic series. Cobbold's Eleven at one time appeared to be easy winners, and were three goals ahead. Nothing daunted, the other side set about their business, and Morris, mi., playing with great dash, succeeded in bringing the scores level, mainly through his own efforts. Cobbold scored again in the last five minutes, and gave his side the victory by five goals to four. Both teams played with ceaseless energy and dash from start to finish. On the winning side, Whinney was in excellent form in goal and saved many good shots. He has learnt to throw himself full length, which is the last acquired, and most important attribute of a good goal-keeper. Mills, mi., and Harris were very safe and steady at full-back. During the first half the latter and Grimley were too much for Morris, but as already mentioned, after the interval the latter managed to break through on various occasions. Of the forwards on the other side, Cobbold himself was of course the pick, but Delap, ma., showed excellent form at outside-right, and made many good runs. On the other side, Coldham brought off some brilliant saves in the first half, but though doing quite sound work afterwards, he might have saved one of the goals which he misjudged. Malcolmson and Chapman played right at the top of their form, and had every reason to be satisfied with themselves. Latham-Brown, needless to say, was in excellent form till he slightly damaged his foot. During the whole of the first half he completely held Cobbold. Finally, the game was played on both sides in the right sporting spirit, and hard knocks were given and taken with thorough good feeling.

S. Ronan's v. Southey Hall.

This match, on our own ground, produced a fairly good game, which was won however, fairly easily by S. Ronan's, the score being seven love in our favour. Had it not been for some most brilliant goal-keeping on the part of the Southey Hall custodian, the score would have been very much larger. As it was our opponents never looked like getting a goal.

S. RONAN'S v. THE WICK (BRIGHTON).

We journeyed over to Brighton in order to play this School. as they also had an unbeaten record. At the end of the match their record was not intact, but ours still was. It cannot be said, however, that our team displayed anything like their best form, for though winning by two goals to one they ought to have scored many more times as we were very much superior at all points of the game. Cobbold, however, had an off-day, and Morrison, mithough in splendid form during the first half, went clean off in the second. There is no doubt that if the team had been playing at their best the score would have been seven or eight love. It is, however, satisfactory to have beaten the best School team in Brighton.

S. RONAN'S v. SOUTHEY HALL.

The return match, on our opponent's ground, provided us with a still easier victory, the score being eleven love in our favour. Morris and Delap were in splendid form on the right wing, but Cobbold, though he did many good things, was prevented by a strain from showing his best form. All the defence were good, Harris and Latham-Browne being the pick.

S. Ronan's v. Malvern House.

Our opponents had several people away, and consequently our victory was of the easiest possible description, the score being twenty love.

S. Ronan's v. Rottingdean (Rugby).

This match was played on Wednesday, March 22nd. It was a bold move on our part to tackle Rottingdean, who have played Rugby regularly for six years, whereas we had played exactly eight games in our lives; but nevertheless, the game was a splendid one

from every point of view. Indeed, had it not been for one abnormally large and well built boy who scored all their tries, the match would without doubt have ended in our favour. As it was we gave them a rare fright, and scored eleven points during the first forty minutes without reply. At that stage, however, the great efforts which the eleven had put forth began to tell their tale, and Rottingdean, helped by their obviously superior knowledge of the game, and the superior bulk of the above-mentioned three quarter, scored four or five times, making the result a win for them by twenty-one points ro eleven. We have not the smallest doubt that next season the result will be the other way round.

S. Ronan's v. Rottingdean (Rugby).

The return match with Rottingdean, on their own ground, provided a more easy victory for them. The whole of their scoring, however, both as regards tries and place kicks, was done through the agency of their one big boy, without whom there is no doubt that the match would have been an extremely even one. As it was, the game was well-contested, but whenever this young Hercules got hold of the ball he rushed through everything like a battering ram. It was nevertheless an excellent game played in a good sporting spirit.

S. Ronan's v. Windlesham House (Rugby).

This game, which was played on Friday, March 31st, ended in a win for us by twenty points to three. Our opponents had also started Rugby for the first time this term, and as they have almost exactly the same number of boys in the School as we have the conditions were as even as possible. Nearly all the damage was done during the first half, as we scored no fewer than seventeen points, quite the best piece of work being Cobbold's try. He ran through from the half-way line and dodged several opponents on the way. During the second half each side scored once. The game was not such an interesting one to watch as the two former,

each side being somewhat prone to infringe the rules. Still, considering that neither School had even thought of Rugby till this term, the display was by no means a bad one, and though of course we have no intention of adopting the Rugby game except during the Easter term, the progress already made augurs well for the future.

S. Ronan's v. Windlesham House (Return).

Owing to snow, this match did not take place at S. Ronan's on April 5. It must have been about 2.45, when Cobbold, not having won the toss, missed his effort at kick off. Windlesham House, who did not appear too happy on a level football field, failed to pack smartly, with the natural result that they can hardly be said to have pressed S. Ronan's during the early stages of the game. After a spell of negative play, Coldham, who was apparently unmarked out of touch, refused all requests to pass the ball, and didn't score quite behind the posts. If Delap, mi., had been entrusted with the kick, a goal might have been scored. Windlesham House again failed to fill the picture, and if Cobbold had dropped the ball over the crossbar, an additional four points would have accrued to the home side. Nothing more of any importance occurred before the end of the game. Perhaps we ought to say candidly that Hadley collared no one, and that neither of the halves gave their three-quarters a single chance.

Editorial.

NE of the great advantages of a School Magazine is that the fortunate Editor has not to go searching for a subject, but can write much the same thing over and over again. There is an everlasting similarity, which though dull to some, for which we apologise, is a very real benefit to him. For instance, as in succeeding past terms, we once more have to acknowledge gratefully the fact that the three months have passed without illness; once more we have had to bid farewell and good luck to some of our members; they may rest assured that we shall not forget them. In the matter of games, we have, during the past year, kept up our reputation of being second to none; but lest any should think that it is only in games we claim this distinction, let it be said that our ambition and intention is to be second to none in all things that are worth doing well; and if there still remain some such things in which that position is not ours, it shall be our business to see to it without delay.

Simpson found it necessary to resign his post as Chaplain; he has no immediate plans, but intends ultimately to take up other work; whatever the nature of that work may be, he will carry with him all wishes for happiness and good fortune from those at S. H Day at Portsmouth.

A good number of our community were lucky enough to be able to witness the Coronation in London. Those less fortunate made the best of things at S. Ronan's. On the Thursday, a party of 40 went from Worthing to Portsmouth to see the great fleet assembled to do honour to our King. The weather was doubtful. indeed it rained nearly the whole way to Portsmouth, but fortunately it cleared and allowed us to walk to the Clarence Pier in the dry. We soon got on board and started for our 2 hours' trip. The wind was boisterous and some of us wondered whether the effort would prove too much for our internal economy. It was impossible to keep hats on, so strong was the wind. However, we got over to Ryde about 12 o'clock. Suddenly all the guns in the neighbourhood and on the ships went off in one impressive salute, and we knew that another King of England had been crowned. It was a moment not to be forgotten by any of us. After this we started down the lines of mighty ships. The Dreadnoughts were awe-inspiring monsters, and the smaller craft such as Destroyers etc., were much scrutinized. Some photographs were taken, but the light was poor and though a few good pictures were obtained, many were failures. The foreign vessels were most interesting, the Chinese and Austrian, and the American with the curious wire masts being those most noticed. By this time some of us were getting terribly hungry, and matters had to be helped by attacking chocolate in various forms. We arrived back at the pier about 2 o'clock, and then the rain began again. We had, however, only a few steps to go to the Hotel, where we were ushered into a large room and did justice to a most excellent meal. Following this we boarded two trams, as the rain was coming down now in torrents, and arrived at the station. Here we had to wait for some little while, but at last our train came in, which was fortunately a fast one, and we soon reached Worthing again after a most successful and instructive day's outing, having for once really scored off the weather.

The Cricket Season.

Although our record reads well on paper, we confess to a certain feeling of disappointment with regard to this year's team. They might have been so very good and at times they were; on one or two occasions, however, they crumpled up in very weak fashion. Paradoxical though it may seem, the batting was at once the strong and the weak point of the team. When things were going right and the players were in good form, it would have been difficult to find a boys' team more attractive to watch. On the other hand no one mastered what is perhaps the most important point in batting, namely, that not only is it essential not to draw away, but one must get well over the bat for everyone of the back strokes; the failure to do this accounted in every case for our bad performances. The bowling was quite good; the catching and fielding excellent.

Characters of the Eleven.

H. M. Morris, (Capt). Good all round; most promising bat, but still spoils it all by drawing away, which prevents him from getting set; good bowler, with a swerve, and excellent field and catch.

- K. G. MALCOLMSON. Fine hitting powers; will be good if he learns to stand up, not otherwise; good field and catch, and now promises well as a bowler.
- E. H. D. GRIMLEY. Good catch and field; bowling fair at present; has a bad flourish in his batting; if he loses it, will be very good indeed: if not, will never be any use at all.
- A. M. G. COBBOLD. One of the two most improved bats on the side; apt to drop the right knee too much; excellent catch and field; bowls a bit.
- A. Latham-Brown. Has improved his batting a lot, but is inclined to spoon up catches when trying to hit too much; very sound field and catch.
- G. T. W. HORNE. The best catch on the side this year; batting quite sound, tho' not attractive in style; he is too stiff; may be a useful bowler.
- G. D. Morris. Very promising left-hand bowler, with good length; hits a bit; fair field, bad catch.
- N. G. HARRIS. The other most improved bat on the side; also good in the field.
- H. C. D. Whinney. Will be a useful bat when he learns to stand up; very fair wicket-keeper.
- J. M. COLDHAM. Promising bat for his age; good in the field.
- J. F. B. DELAP. Very fair in the field; poor bat.
- THE SECOND XI. Contains most excellent material; Byass, Cameron and Abraham are all future cricketers of a high order. Thrupp is a useful bowler, and if only he would hit straight and get a better field, would be a good all-round player. Leathes and Coode-Adams, are also players of distinct promise, while Boyd, ma., Duttson, and Havers, ma. should all do well.
