## Editorial.

E propose in this number to devote our opening remarks to one aspect of educational work at a Preparatory School. For some time past the Headmasters in conference have been discussing the question of the premature study of Greek; no concerted action has been taken hitherto; but now at length some of the great public schools have decided not to make Greek a compulsory subject at the Entrance Examination to the Classical side. This is a step in the right direction, but it is a step which, as it stands at present, is for all practical purposes quite useless. Ten or twelve years ago the conditions of teaching at Public Schools were such, that if a boy was a sound Classical Scholar, it made precious little difference what he knew besides: Mathematics were persevered with only in the case of promising boys, English literature, History and Geography were hopelessly neglected, and French was frequently taught by a master who did not know the difference of pronunciation between "u" and "ou" or "en" and "on." Things have now changed and rightly so. Careful attention is paid to all the above-mentioned subjects, and modern languages are taught by men who know something about them. The "crux" of the position, however, is this: the Preparatory School has to endeavour to send its boys up to the Public School well taught and grounded in all these subjects and a few more besides, and at the same time to attain to as high a standard of Classical Scholarship as was expected twelve years ago, when all these subjects were neglected. The reason for this is that in all public school Entrance Scholarships, a large majority are still given for

Classics alone, usually about two for Mathematics. For very clever boys this feat is difficult, for ordinary boys it is an impossibility, and every master knows it. We repeat, therefore, the step recently taken is in the right direction, but we want more; we want to see (1) Greek and Latin verses cut out of the syllabus required for Entrance Scholarships and started in all cases at the Public School; that will give the Preparatory Schoolmaster a chance of paying proper attention to the other subjects. (2) We must have the Scholarships more evenly divided, a smaller number given for mere Classics and a larger proportion for ability in allround subjects, such as English, French, and Mathematics. Personally, we feel that there is a growing tendency in this direction, and that before long the Scholarships will be given at Public Schools much on the lines indicated; when this is done, we are sure it will prove an advantage to education generally. Much more could be written on this subject, but space will not admit of further reasons which would make our argument more complete.

# Jootball.

For the second year in succession the football team has covered itself with glory. S. Ronan's has now gone through two complete seasons without suffering defeat. It is doubtful if the eleven, at all points, were quite as good as that of last season; they were in any case not quite as consistent. Probably the defence was stronger, but the attack was weaker.

Horne and Harris are an excellent pair of backs who thoroughly understand each others' play. Horne is slightly the

better of the two, but there is not a great deal to choose. He is faster and a safer kick; but on the other hand, Harris is much better with his head.

They have an excellent goalkeeper behind them in Whinney, and there is no reason at all, if he continues to improve, why he should not turn into a player of high class.

The halves were quite a sound line, Latham-Brown was not only an excellent captain but he kept his team well together. His tackling was first rate, and he fed his forwards judiciously. Grimley, though inclined at times to be a little clumsy, was a most useful member of the side and used his weight to great advantage. He always went his hardest from start to finish. Byass, at right-half, is one of the most promising players in the School, and has done very well for his first year in the team. All three halves were always ready to pass back when pressed, a most excellent habit.

Among the forwards, Morris shares with Cobbold the distinction of being one of the two best forwards S. Ronan's has ever had. He is not quite so steady as the latter, nor has he such a perfect control of the ball. On the other hand, he is infinitely more dangerous, being very fast and an exceptional shot. Moreover his control of the ball is quite good enough for most people, and his passing is very neat. Delap, ma., at outside right, was one of the most improved players of the side and learned to combine exceedingly well with his partner. He has been responsible for many of the goals scored by Morris; he passes nicely and uses his pace to advantage. Abraham is a neat little player who understands the game and can keep his forwards together; he is of course somewhat handicapped by his lack of size and weight. Leathes was a useful member of the side and always worked hard, he is a very fair dribbler, but weak with his left foot. Hadley did not come on as much as was hoped, he has plenty of pace and knows how to use it, but his control of the ball is not good, and he is also rather too careful of himself.

Everyone was in excellent form, though Morris was without doubt the outstanding figure, he shot no less than nine goals himself, the other two being scored by Leathes and Abraham.

During the first half our opponents' forwards rarely broke away, and on the few occasions that they did manage to make headway, they found our own defence much too strong. On the S. Ronan's side, one of the most noticeable features was the excellent understanding which prevailed between the halves and the backs. The former, instead of trying to extricate themselves from almost impossible positions, were always ready to pass back, with the result that the back was able to relieve with a long kick. Among the forwards, Morris was of course the pick; both in passing, dribbling, and shooting, his form was excellent. Delap, ma., at outside-right, who has played very well and consistently all this season, once more showed what a useful member of the side he is, while Leathes, Abraham, and Hadley, all did a lot of good work. Whinney was as usual quite safe in goal, and after the match, he, Leathes and Byass all received their colours.

Delap, ma., took the ball down the line, and just at the right moment passed inside to Morris, who scored with a beautiful oblique shot. Later on, Morris himself scored two more goals and Abraham one. Our opponents were a very fair side. but were completely dominated from start to finish by the S. Ronan's defence, all of whom played well, Harris being the pick. The forwards were not in quite their best form, but Morris was of course dangerous, though we have often seen him play better. Delap, ma., was very good indeed; Abraham and Leathes were fair only, while Hadley was distinctly off.
