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A Special Prize was given to H. M. Morris owing to the fact that, not only was he in the Scholarship Class, but he was in our opinion the best all-round Athlete we have had. The latter

question hinged on three names, F. W. Pink, P. S. Hadley and H. M. Morris; it is not easy to decide who was the best of these three at S. Ronan's. All three were exceptional at pure Athletics and there would probably be nothing to choose between them, but whereas Hadley was a much better cricketer than Pink, Pink was a much better footballer than Hadley; Morris, on the other hand was just as good as either of them at both games. We hope he may do as well at Repton as they have done at Westminster and Charterhouse respectively.

The competition for Mr. and Mrs. Goodall's "All-Round" Prize was excellent, but after much thought Horne, ma., was declared winner for the second time. His high place in work, combined with his excellence at games, gave him the place over the others. Goodall, though his equal, and possibly slightly his superior in work, was not in the running as far as games are concerned. Latham-Brown, though Head Prefect and Captain of Football, was not in the Scholarship Class. Morris, the best of all at games all-round, was not sufficiently ahead of Horne to make up for his inferiority in work. Whinney was very close up to this trio, but put himself out of the running, through too many drills and late appearances. It is most satisfactory, that four boys who have done so much for S. Ronan's, should have won the All-Round Prizes. Latham-Brown was an excellent and reliable Head Prefect, and Horne, Goodall and Morris have been of the greatest value to the School in every way. Grimley, another most useful member of the School, was close up, but lost a place, owing to many drills and late appearances. Hadley's absence spoilt his chances. Whinney will be Head Prefect next year and will have another chance. Let us take this opportunity of thanking our Prefects who are leaving for their loyal help, the useful work they have done, and the fine influence they have had. Where all were so good, it would be invidious to single out any individual; they know what we think without it being necessary to tell them here. S. Ronan.

So few know anything of S. Ronan, and so many inquire about him, that we think it will not be out of place to give a very brief account of our Patron Saint.

S. Ronan was born in Ireland, traditional home of most Celtic Saints ; he afterwards crossed to Brittany, where he was the forerunner of the clan of Renan. The story of his appearance is fascinating. Some fishermen on the Breton Coast were asleep in their boats when they were awakened by a strange disturbance in the water. Suddenly they saw a curious sight, a rock came sailing towards them, leaving a long quiet track behind it as though the waves trembled at its touch. It was garlanded with unknown seaweeds, and exhaled so sweet and strong a scent, that all the air and even the sea, was perfumed. On the summit of the rock a figure knelt in prayer, his head surrounded by a nimbus, the glory of which illumined the night. Such was the coming of S. Ronan to the shores of Brittany. In character, S. Ronan proved to be somewhat violent and distinctly capricious. People respected him, but owing to his determination to live alone, their respect was mingled with timidity. Such was the general fear of doing what might prove displeasing to the Saint, that at his death people were entirely undecided as to what he would have wished to be done with his body ; they therefore put it on a cart harnessed to four oxen ; the latter guided by the invisible hand of Ronan, went into the thickest part of the forest, the trees all bowing down or breaking off before their steps ; finally in the very centre where grew the strongest trees the cart stopped dead ; so everyone understood, and they buried the Saint there and built his Church over him.

Space would fail us to tell in full of the deeds of S. Ronan ; his attempts at conversion among the primitive people, though genuine, were not always successful, and his partial failure rendered him difficult of access and distrustful of mankind.

If one would learn more fully of his life and character, by far the best fount of information is Mrs. Gostling's attractive transla-

tion of Anatole le Braz' delightful book "The Land of Pardons." We only regret that space and time will not allow us to quote more extensively from its pages with reference to the legendary and mystical life of S. Ronan.

Athletic Sports.

The Sports were held on Saturday, May 18th, which turned out to be quite a nice day. They were in every sense most successful. There was a large company of parents and other friends, and great enthusiasm was aroused by some quite remarkable performances.

Morris did considerably better than even we expected, and the standard of athletics all round was probably higher than during any previous year, which on the whole is saying a great deal.

Other boys who did excellent performances were Thrupp, ma., Horne, Grimley and Chapman in the Senior events, and Byass, Barker, mi. and Swettenham in the Juniors.

The "under ten" race contained some unusually good competitors, of whom Hoyle, mi., Phipps, mi. and Barnes were undoubtedly the pick.

Sir Charles Lucas, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., gave away the prizes and charmed everyone, not only by his personality, but by the sentiments which he uttered in the course of his speech. He urged the boys to do everything with enthusiasm and with their might, never to do things by halves.

Several School Records were beaten in the course of the afternoon, Morris doing so in the Senior hundred, hurdles and quarter mile, while Byass created new figures for the Junior hundred.

100 YARDS (SENIOR).

1. Morris. 2. Chapman. Morris ran better than he has ever done before and won easily by about ten yards. Chapman just beat Thrupp for the second place. Time $11\frac{1}{2}$ secs., and a School record.

100 YARDS (JUNIOR).

1. Byass. 2. Barker, mi. A great race. There was nothing much between the first two, but Byass had just the extra bit of pace required for the short distance. Time $12\frac{1}{8}$ secs.

HIGH JUMP (SENIOR).

1. Morris. 2. Grimley. Some beautiful jumping was seen in this event, both boys being far above the average. Grimley cleared 4ft. 4ins. and Morris an inch more, both of which are quite remarkable jumps for boys under fourteen. Height, 4ft. 5in.

100 YARDS (UNDER 10).

1. Hoyle. 2. Phipps. Another excellent race with barely a yard between them. Barnes was a good third. Time, $14\frac{2}{5}$ secs.

HURDLES.

1. Morris. 2. Grimley. Morris won by six or seven yards. There was a good race for the second place between Grimley and Horne. Grimley had the best style but Morris was quicker and had more pace. Time $16\frac{1}{4}$ secs. and a School record.

220 YARDS (UNDER 10).

1. Hoyle, mi. 2. Phipps, mi. Barnes left his effort until too late, or he would probably have been placed.

LONG JUMP (SENIOR).

1. Morris. 2. Horne. The jumping was quite good in this event, though not in any way to be compared to that accomplished by Hadley three years ago. Distance 14ft. $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins.

LONG JUMP (JUNIOR).

1. Swettenham. 2. Barker, mi. A fair jump for juniors, and quite a good one for a boy of Swettenham's age. He ought to do excellent junior jumping next year. Distance, 12 ft. 1 in.

QUARTER-MILE (SENIOR).

1. Morris. 2. Thrupp, ma. This was an interesting race as Thrupp was not content, as had been the case in some years, to let Morris have matters all his own way. He hunted him round well both laps, and was probably not beaten by more than eight or ten yards. Time, $67\frac{2}{5}$ secs. and a School record.

200 YARDS (JUNIOR).

1. Barker, mi. 2. Byass. Barker, though defeated by Byass in the hundred, was fully expected to win this event, and both were expected to easily beat the record, as they had already done so several times in practice. The time, however, though good, was $1\frac{1}{2}$ secs. outside that made by the younger Hadley two years ago. Byass was bothered by his foot, and consequently did not give Barker much trouble. Swettenham ran a good race and was not far behind for third place. Time, $48\frac{1}{2}$ secs.

THE "BOB-WOB."—Another fine big specimen. It is generally to be found chasing rabbits in the vicinity of Worthing. Caterpillars are its favourite food. It has big blue eyes and a nice face. It is very faithful to its friends and, like the bull-dog, is pertinacious; it is very fond also of playing with wood, and having games with socks and ties. It is also of a most affectionate nature, and is a useful animal to have with one in a difficulty.

THE FISHER-PUSS.—No relation to the bird. This is a very fine caterpillar, which, unlike others, has a cry, which is "Hoop-la." When this sweet melodious sound is heard, all the grubs from far and near come as fast as they can wobble. It is much admired everywhere, and tho' regarded as somewhat of a curiosity, it is much liked by those who look after it.

Cricket.

THE PAST SEASON.

Our first eleven during the past season have emulated the deeds of the football teams of the two preceeding years, in so far that for the first time for some ten years they went through the season without suffering defeat. On the whole the team was probably the best that the School has had. Its strongest points were undoubtedly the bowling and fielding. The latter was particularly smart, and very few catches were missed, while not only were there a number of useful bowlers but the first three were unusually good. As an all round cricketer Morris is as good as any we have had. He and Grimley were undoubtedly the best bats in the team, and Morris was certainly the best bowler, though followed very closely by Grimley. Horne was a good all-rounder, and though not such a stylish or finished bat as were the other two, he watched the ball well, and after much perseverance, actually came out at the top of the batting averages. He is also a useful medium-pace bowler and a very good catch in the field. Of the others, Byass is a promising bat and should be a useful bowler. Latham-Brown was the safest field and catch on the side, and he also bowled leg-breaks quite well. Whinney was an unusually good wicket keeper, while Abraham and Cameron both showed much promise. The side altogether was an evenly balanced one, and as has been the case with the teams of the past few years, showed great ability for pulling a match out of the fire.

Characters.

- H. M. MORRIS (Captain) A most promising player both as a bat and a bowler; has any number of strokes all round the wicket, and provided he is not tempted into wild hitting, nothing can stop him from being a very fine cricketer; he is also an excellent fielder and catch.
- E. H. D. GRIMLEY. One of the soundest bats we have had at S. Ronans with a taking style and many good strokes; also a useful fast medium bowler with a big swerve, and good in the field.
- G. T. W. HORNE. A very sound "all rounder." In batting, bowling and fielding, he has been invaluable.

- A. LATHAM-BROWN. A very fine field and catch; bowls leg breaks rather well; batting crude but on occasions effective.
- B. O. BYASS. A most promising bat with plenty of strokes; should also bowl well; a good field and a good catch.
- H. C. D. WHINNEY. A very sound wicket keeper; ought also to make a useful bat, but has one or two bad faults.
- R. H. DE M. LEATHES. Watches the ball well and doesn't neglect to hit the loose ones; a greatly improved catch and field.
- A. L. CAMERON. A promising all-round player, though as yet not at all sound; he should, however, be quite good next year.
- G. A. ABRAHAM. A useful left-hander who watches the ball well; lack of inches handicaps him against fast bowling.
- J. D. BENNETT. Has much improved during the term and may be a good cricketer; at present he is still too stiff in his batting, and his fielding, which is really excellent, doesn't always do him justice in matches; wants a little more determination.
- G. R. BARKER. In the team solely for his fielding and catching, both of which are extremely good. He may be a useful bat next year.
