REPETITION of the same sentiments year after year favours of banality, and one is apt to look askance at oft repeated praise, and yet in reality there is nothing finer, nothing more inspiring than the knowledge that, after a thorough test and trial, one can repeat with warmth and conviction the commendation of a year before. Year after year we have felt that we could say nothing good enough to those who were leaving us, that we could not too strongly express the confidence inspired by their influence and actions at S. Ronan's, a confidence which they are now, one and all, justifying in the most complete manner. And now we are once more in the same position. The boys who are leaving us now have filled right well the places of those who left a year ago. must stick to it through thick and thin ; we must have pluck, grit, enthusiasm ; we must never admit defeat ; we must not be discouraged by failure or annoyed by petty incidents ; cheerful, full of fun—mischief if you will—we may be, but we must all of us try to do what we believe to be our duty, and above everything we must try to acquire what is most important of all, the faith, the sure knowledge that if we are honestly trying to do our best we shall succeed, no matter what happens.

If we can all of us, big and small, obtain this determination, this pluck, this never-failing courage, we shall be able to uphold and increase the prestige of the School, and maintain her in the position she now holds, and which we mean her always to keep, a position unsurpassed amongst the preparatory Schools of to-day or any time. We do not wish to instil any feelings of conceit or boastfulness, but self-confidence from the right motives. You may be modest, quiet, reserved, and yet full of self-confidence, and this is a necessary quality for those who wish to do their work in the world : “ In quietness and confidence shall be your strength.”

Ronan's.

Old Boys' Column.

M. M. Sayer (Rugby and Oxford) has added one more distinction to his now already long list. Last term he was placed in the first-class of Honour Mods. in Mathematics.

K. G. Malcolmson (Charterhouse) has been placed in the Army Class. His House Master recently described him as “quite a genius in mathematics.”

Old S. Ronan's cricketers have been going very strong this summer. F. R. C. Cobbold (Westminster) has played for the third successive year in the team, and is admittedly the best medium paced Public School bowler in England. He is now playing with success for Suffolk in the Minor Counties Championship.

F. W. Pink, of the same school, has crowned his already very long list of athletic distinctions by getting into the cricket team. This means that he has been Second School Monitor, Captain of the Football Eleven for two years, Captain of the Shooting Eight, winner of most of the athletic events in the Sports, and a first eleven cricket colour. He has also just passed Smalls, and goes to B. N. C., Oxford, in October.

Cobbold, in addition to his cricketing ability, represented the School at Queen's Club in racquets and is also in the first eleven at football. As these two left Westminster last term theirs will be difficult places to fill.

P. S. Hadley (Charterhouse) got in the cricket eleven last term, and, as he has another year at the School, he will, by the time he has finished, occupy much the same place at Charterhouse that Pink has occupied at Westminster. He is already a House Monitor and the finest athlete in the School.

W. E. Chetwynd-Stapylton (Malvern), who will have another year at that School, has proved himself the second best bat on the side. He is also a House Prefect and high up in the School on the Mathematical side.

E. A. Barclay-Smith (Westminster), who won an £80 Scholarship—Mathematical—two years ago on leaving S. Ronan's, has now been placed in the Mathematical Sixth at the age of 15 years 10 months. This is a very good achievement.

H. T. V. Mills (Charterhouse) won the French prize in his form and also got his Remove last term. He is now in the Vth.

R. G. M. Eden (Eton) was successful in obtaining another Remove last term.

H. H. Fisher (Epsom College) who only left us a year ago, not only obtained his Remove, but won the Mathematical Prize for the Middle School, no mean performance. We were very delighted to see him at S. Ronan's at the end of last term, and to find him just the same as ever.

We were very pleased to receive a visit last term from a very old "Old Boy" C. E. Holberton, who was at S. Ronan's over twenty years ago and had not been down since.

Our congratulations, though somewhat belated, are due to E. A. Steed (Wellington), who qualified for the King's Indian Cadets; and to F. N. Maltby (Wellington), who passed high up into Sandhurst some months ago.

J. S. T. Mansell (Wellington) has again got his remove for the seventh term in succession.

A. A. Havers (R. N. C. Osborne) keeps up his high place in his term; he had a first-rate Report and has been 1st in Mathematics ever since his entry to the College. He also won his first fight in the Feather Weight Boxing Competition, against a fifth termer nearly two years his senior.

A. B. Smith (Bradfield—Scholar) was 3rd in his form last term and has got his Remove into the Upper Classical Remove.

R. L. Thrupp (Repton), after only one year at the School, is our first School Representative there, being chosen as one of the Shooting Team at Bisley; he shot in the Cadets' Trophy. It will be remembered that Repton won the Ashburton Shield.

Athletic Sports.

If the day had been made for us we could not have had more perfect weather for our sports on Saturday, May 17th. There was a brilliant sun which kept everybody warm, and a gentle breeze at the same time which kept us all cool, and which, moreover, was blowing in the right direction for the competitors.

Sir James Mackenzie Davidson, M.D., kindly came down to present the prizes.

The standard of performances, from an all-round point of view, was quite as good if not better, than in previous years. Indeed year after year the tendency seems to point towards greater excellence, and that in spite of the fact that we had no all-round athlete who was so good as Morris, Pink or Hadley, but there was a much keener competition in consequence, and in many of the events a higher standard was reached than is usual.

There was a tremendous struggle for the Victor Ludorum Cup, which finally ended in Leathes being the winner with fourteen points. He was closely followed by Delap with thirteen, and he in turn was not far ahead of Whinney, Coode-Adams, and Boyd, ma.

At the prize giving, Mr. Harris briefly thanked Sir James and Lady Mackenzie Davidson for their kindness in coming down, and expressed the pleasure of all those who were present.

Sir James, who was obviously pleased with the day, made an appropriate speech, in which he mentioned the healthy effect that sports have on the tone of our public schools, and the effect which they in their turn have on the nation at large.

The head prefect, H. C. D. Whinney, then called for three cheers for Sir James and Lady Mackenzie Davidson, which needless to say were given vociferously, and the day ended with the usual round of cheering for the visitors, masters, etc.

1. Whinney. 2. Delap. Height, 4ft. $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. Whinney was a strong favourite for this event but jumped somewhat below form, with the result that he had a very tight struggle with Delap.

100 YARDS (UNDER 10).

1. Grylls, mi. 2. Phipps, mi. Time, $13\frac{3}{4}$ secs. In Grylls, Phipps and Barnes, we have three unusually fast runners for (under 10) events. The time was much the best that has ever been done here for this event.

HURDLES.

1. Delap. 2. Leathes. Time, $16\frac{1}{2}$ secs. (equalling school record). This was a splendid race, probably the best ever seen at S. Ronan's, and equalled the record time made by Morris last year. This was no doubt largely due to the fact that three of the competitors have learnt the straight legged method instead of the old fashioned bent leg. Boyd, ma. was the favourite, and was leading by a yard at the seventh hurdle, but there he stumbled slightly, and the first three were level over the last hurdle, when it was simply a matter of pace in the run in.

220 YARDS (UNDER 10).

1. Grylls, mi. 2. Phipps, mi. Time, $34\frac{1}{4}$ secs. Another good race. The two winners and Barnes were all within two yards of each other at the finish.

LONG JUMP (SENIOR).

1. Cesar. 2. Cameron. Distance, 14 ft. 3 in. Quite a good jump, slightly better than that accomplished last year.

LONG JUMP (JUNIOR).

QUARTER MILE (SENIOR).

1. Leathes. 2. Coode-Adams. Time, $68\frac{2}{5}$ secs. Leathes made a rare hot pace and his time has only been beaten twice at S. Ronan's, namely, by Morris last year, and by Hadley in 1909. Coode-Adams ran well to get second place.

As he will still be a junior next year he will probably beat all former times. Swettenham, who beat Hoyle, mi., down the straight for second place was expected to win, but let Hale get too far ahead of him. But in any case Hale finished so strongly that it is unlikely he would have been beaten.

Swimming Races.

The swimming races were again held in the Worthing Baths on Friday, July 25th, and produced some excellent contests.

SENIORS (over 13). 1, Whinney ; 2, Armstrong ; 3, Nisbet, ma. Armstrong got rather a bad start but caught up in a few yards, and forged well ahead during the first length at the end of

which he was leading by a good ten feet. Then, however, he foolishly stopped, thinking that the race was only one length, and did not proceed on the return journey till he saw the others doing so. After this misfortune he was unable to make any impression on Whinney, who won by about two feet. Nisbet, ma., swam strongly during the last half-length, and beat Miller on the post.

JUNIORS (under 13). 1, Havers, mi. ; 2, Byass ; 3, Burd. Havers, mi., who is as much at home in the water as any duck, affected the double trudge, at which in our humble opinion he is not yet as skilful as he was last year at the single overhand stroke. He managed however to win by about four feet from Byass, who splashed along with colossal vigour on the outside, and managed to come in ahead of Burd, who stuck to a steady breast stroke all the way.

ALL CLOTHES RACE. 1, Miller ; 2, Armstrong ; 3, Whinney. The results of the previous races were entirely reversed in this contest, as Miller, who did not gain a place in the seniors, kept his nose in front the whole way, and won by about a foot from Armstrong, who beat Whinney by inches.

Mr. Montague Goodall once more very kindly presented the prizes, which were in every case silver cups.

The Past Cricket Season.

After the brilliant team of 1912, we had considerable ground for our fears that this year's XI would scarcely be up to the average. It is therefore greatly to their credit that they quickly dispelled these doubts in a most convincing fashion. The batting turned out to be the strong point, and in this respect they were very little, if at all, inferior to last year's XI. The fielding and catching too were, as usual with us, excellent, though in one or two matches they were not at their best. The bowling was really the weak point and it was this that made the difference between the two teams ; last year, if the batting broke down the bowling was so good that they could always win the match notwithstanding ; this year, in order to be safe, it was necessary for the batsmen to come off every time ; to their credit as a team be it said, they only failed once in this. The other match we lost was largely a matter of fortune. Byass and Miller were a very fair pair of bowlers—and next year they should be extremely good ; but they were in no way comparable to Morris and Grimley of 1912, and they had no bowler of any real ability to follow them. As to the

batting, Byass made great strides and was without doubt one of the best bats we have ever had ; next year he should establish his claim to rank with the very best. Leathes, who was top of the averages, possessed great hitting power and a good eye. Whinney, Bennett, Barker, Cameron, Abraham, and Miller, all proved of great use. Cameron, Leathes, Barker, Miller, and Abraham, were best in the field, the two former being particularly good, both at fielding and catching. We must not forget to mention Whinney's wicket-keeping which was extremely good throughout. The team, as a whole, was full of pluck and keenness, and these qualities alone helped them through most things.
