Editorial.

ANOTHER term has passed and still we are not, to all outward appearances at any rate, very much nearer the end of the war. Yet assuredly there is not on this account any cause for despondency. Despondency and gloom are not the qualities which are going to win us this war, but determination and faith. And neither surely is there any need for us to be otherwise than cheerful. Most of us, it is true, have lost relations and friends—often very dear friends,—but they have given their lives in the greatest and grandest of all causes, and we owe it to them to do our duty with our utmost energy, and to make ourselves by every means in our power worthy to take their places. We can only do this if we hold our course cheerfully and faithfully, unaffected by reverses or disasters, sure only of the end. The mind which is downcast by every adversity is not the true English mind, and it is one we can do without.

We are proud at S. Ronan's of the share our Old Boys and parents are taking in the War, and we believe that the best way in which we can contribute *our* share is by doing our very best all-round in a natural, cheerful spirit. Moreover, with boys, one should be careful as to the kind of sacrifices which are made; the real value of sacrifices lies in those for which unselfishness of character is required, and thought for others. Money sacrifices should be encouraged whole-heartedly up to a certain point, but one must be careful that they have not the effect of doing financial injury to other people. Such a result would be caused, for instance, by the abolition of School Prizes. Besides, when the boys have been as generous as ours in their War Subscriptions and in other ways, we do not think it fair to deprive them of all rewards.

If we can feel that they realise the great meaning of this war, that they are determined to make the best of themselves for the sake of those who are gone, and that, with that end in view, they are trying harder than ever before, to be upright, manly, straight and honest—if we can feel all this, then indeed we may know that we are doing our duty in the highest sense.

The Inspection.

At our request the Board of Education sent down at the end of the term two of their Inspectors. These gentlemen spent two whole days at the school, and speedily made it very obvious that they had a thorough knowledge of their business. Probably they were the only people who were not extremely nervous. Be that how it may, they conducted their inspection first of the school buildings, secondly of the teaching, thirdly of our general methods, and every mortal thing connected with them, with a thoroughness and detail which left nothing whatever to chance. The result, however, was exceedingly gratifying. We were, of course, under no compulsion to have this inspection, and the ordeal was somewhat severe, but we not only obtained some useful information but had the satisfaction of receiving a whole-hearted approval of our methods, both in teaching and other ways. Nevertheless, if anyone imagines it to be a pleasant thing to have an Inspector sitting in the room and helping to conduct one's class, let them try the experiment.

Dummy rifles and a machine-gun have been made in the workshop ; trenches have been dug in the playing-field ; each corps is drilled by its own boy officers in close and extended order."

The Sports.

The Sports were held on Saturday, May 15th, and were as usual favoured with beautiful weather. Sir Alexander Swettenham, K.C.M.G., was good enough to give away the prizes, and considering how many people were kept away owing to the war, there was quite a good crowd present.

The standard attained in the various events was as high as ever, and in fact distinctly above the average. Swettenham had come on to such an extent since last year that he was able to defeat both Churton-Taylor and Hale, both of whom had been too good for him in previous years, but whereas Churton-Taylor was a year older, Hale on the other hand was a year younger than he. In the quarter-mile Swettenham would probably have held his own with anyone we have had at S. Ronan's, with the exception of Morris.

The juniors were again a very hot lot indeed, but Barnes, who was rather expected to win both races, did not seem to be at his best on the actual day, and was defeated by Grylls, mi. and Phipps. Grylls, mi. was a much stronger runner than last year, while Phipps improved by leaps and bounds all through the practice, and was easily the strongest runner of the trio on the actual day. Grylls showed very good form in the junior high jump, and the same remark may apply to Beal in the seniors. The latter was quite the smallest competitor, and jumped exceedingly well. Churton-Taylor and Hale would both have been winners in an ordinary year, and deserve much credit for the good race they put up with Swettenham.

The hurdles, though the time was good, was by no means up to the standard of previous years from the point of view of style.

The S. Ronan's team, in spite of their inexperience, played much better than had been expected. The third pair showed surprisingly good form, and the others in every way did themselves justice. Walsh played quite well, and was probably the best.

The past Cricket Season.

This season has in some ways been a most interesting one. As in the case of last season's football team we only had one colour left, and on paper therefore it appeared likely that we should be very weak. As a matter of fact, though no doubt the team was weaker than any we have had for some years, it did actually turn out considerably better than anyone had expected, and quite good enough to win most of its matches. Even those it lost were, with one exception, lost by a very small margin indeed.

The school as a whole is full of cricket, and in view of the fact that this year's team has done so well with only one old colour, there is little doubt that next year, and in the following year, the standard of the eleven should be up to the very high level which has been attained for a good many years past.

In one respect this team was worthy to rank with the best of its predecessors, and that was in the fielding. Every man on the side was a "trier" to the backbone, and though one or two were physically slow in their movements, others on the contrary covered a great deal of ground, and came in to meet the ball at full speed. Hoyle at cover-point was quite the best fieldsman we have seen at St. Ronans. He was in addition a safe catch. The bowling, without being deadly, was very reliable. Nourse shows signs of being a really good left-hander, and Horne can always be depended upon to bowl a good length. Collis was also a useful bowler, and Graham showed distinct promise.

The batting was really better than it would appear to have been by the results. With one or two exceptions every member of the team is promising. But they all suffer from the same failing namely lack of experience, and as a result were all very apt to get out just at the moment they should have been nicely set.

Looking at the season broadly however, we have every reason to congratulate the eleven on having done themselves full justice, and having risen to a considerably higher standard than anyone had expected. There is a great deal of cricket, too, in the rest of the School, and among the most promising may be mentioned Boyd, mi., Williams, ma., Hale, Williams, mi., Norwood, Walrond, Mansell, and many others whom it would take too long to particularise.
