Preparatory School Education.

HOSE who take an interest in the Entrance Examinations for Public Schools, will like to know that in future there will be no German or Latin verse papers in the Common Entrance Examination; instead we are putting in French Dictation and English Literature. This is undoubtedly another step forward, for practically no Preparatory Schools offer German now-a-days, all experts agreeing that three languages-English, French and Latin—are quite sufficient for all boys under fourteen. With reference to the Literature paper, we have drawn up a list of books, which all Preparatory Schools are advised to adopt and the paper will be set chiefly on these, with the addition of such books as an intelligent boy may be expected to read out of school. It is only a short time ago that an English Composition was added to the Examination, and that the French paper was set on the only possible lines which could test any capacity in the spoken language. From this—and also from the growing importance attached to English and French in the Scholarship Examinations, it will be seen that the blind importance formerly placed on Latin and Greek alone, is now giving way to a more temperate view as to the value of other subjects. Mathematics, of course, have for some time held almost as high a place as Classics, but now other subjects are being given the prominence they deserve. The way in which these things are arranged is as follows:-The Preparatory Schools Association has a Council of twenty-two members; on that Council we discuss all questions relative to education as affecting our boys and those of Public Schools. The conclusions arrived at are then placed before a Standing Joint Committee, composed of our own representatives, and those of the Headmasters of Public Schools. The final decisions are then communicated to all Schools, and the Examinations are based on such decisions. A great deal of most valuable work has been accomplished during the past few years; a very good instance is the syllabus for teaching Divinity. The instruction in this

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subject six years ago was chaotic: now it is well-regulated and continuous. Every subject is graded wisely and carefully, and though it would be idle to pretend that perfection has been attained, it is well that people should know that an immense amount of trouble is taken, and that there is now a really sound scheme of education for every boy from the years of nine to nineteen. There is no question that the method and organization of our teaching at the present time is infinitely superior to anything that has ever been seen before. More remains to be done, but that it will be done, no one can doubt.

- Major P. G. Mason, 3rd Dragoon Guards, won the D.S.O. for conspicuous gallantry at Hooge in June last. He fell in action on September 26th. He fought through the South African War, and won the Queen's Medal with four clasps. His conduct at Hooge is described as follows in the "Gazette":— "Whilst in command of Hooge fort and the adjoining trenches, he shewed conspicuous gallantry and ability in holding the village and defence line allotted to him, notwithstanding a terrific bombardment for several hours every day from May 30th till June 2nd, 1915, in which practically all his trenches and dug-outs were blown in."
- C. L. Raymond-Barker, who was killed in the action at Loos' left S. Ronan's in 1906 and proceeded to Harrow. At S. Ronan's he was a Prefect, and one of the best players in the Cricket XI. At Harrow he did well, only just failing to gain his "flannels," and there as at S. Ronan's, he had a really good reputation in all respects. To some of us he was a very great personal friend; the affection he bore his old School was most warmly reciprocated, and in his frequent visits to see us he was always enthusiastically welcomed. Boy and man, he was one of unimpeachable character, generous, warm-hearted, and keen. When he came down to see us he was fond of being with the boys, and they liked to have him. He never lost touch with us, and his gallant death leaves a gap which it will be hard to fill; but he died as he had lived—a very perfect gentleman. He was never ashamed to do what was right, and he was never afraid of putting down what was wrong.

The following is an extract taken from the letter of a brother officer:—

"His men simply loved him, and he was without exception the pluckiest fellow I have ever seen. This may seem a big statement to make, but everyone will tell you the same. He took the first line of the battalion over the parapet to the German trenches."

Raymond-Barker was shot while taking a message from his Colonel; he was under heavy fire all the time, and was almost in safety when it happened. He had a very strong sense of humour, and was always cheery. Our very deep sympathy is with his parents to whom his death was a terrible blow. We shall always remember him with affection and pride at S. Ronan's.

Captain C. D. Wynter was one of the early members of the School and little known to us. He was the son of Colonel Wynter of Loughborough, to whom we offer our deep sympathy. He also was killed at the battle of Loos. He was very severely wounded and died later. His two brothers, also Old Boys, are both fighting.

S. Ronan's Debating Society.

At the last meeting of this distinguished Society, the following motion was discussed, "That in the opinion of this House it would be greatly to the advantage of Preparatory School Training if lessons were done away with." Mr. H. C. P. Havers, who was Proposer, said he moved this motion under protest; that it would be a matter of very great grief to him to give up any lessons, especially French, in which subject he was profoundly interested, but that as no one else could be found to do it, as a matter of public interest, he had undertaken the task; he felt, however, that at least one hour a day should be devoted to sitting quite still in class doing no work, that everyone should be allowed to play to his heart's content with pieces of string, knives, jujubes and other instructive articles. The motion was vigorously opposed by Mr. S. J. Pope, who condemned all sports except that of Boxing; he personally would regret any abolition of work, and felt strongly that several more hours a week should be added to the present curriculum (at these words there was a loud groan from Mr. Hope Falkner, who fainted), Mr. Pope continuing, said that he set great store on cultivation of the mind, and pointed out the Hon. Proposer as an instance of the lack of such cultivation. Mr. Pope repeated his opinion that Boxing was the only Sport, and offered to give anyone who disagreed with him a left-hander on the jaw. Mr. F. W. Vogel (the Seconder) strongly deprecated the heat and tone of the last speaker's speech; he firmly believed in games as a good training for character; he pleaded guilty to one or two slight defects himself (cries of No, No). Yes, indeed, he must do so, but he found games most useful in curing such defects; it was said he liked a nice armchair near the fire; well, he admitted the soft impeachment, but the sudden discovery that he could play a good game of footer made a great difference to him. Moreover, he had been able to overcome to a great extent carelessness in his work, and he put this down very largely to the great accuracy he had been forced to acquire in kicking the football. Mr. N. A. M. Swettenham, rising in great majesty, said he had never heard such awful rot in all his life; he could not chuck Maths, and he was jolly well blowed if he was going to, so there! He thought the last three speakers silly asses, and he hoped no one would pay any attention to the motion. Mr. Walsh said he was pained to hear such slang in this House; his ineradicable opinion was that the multifarious sentiments expressed in this edifice should aspire to a height of rhetoric from which he personally never descended. The national pastime of propelling the sphere should be indulged only so far as the constitutional requirements of each individual exacted; especially did this maxim apply to the fairer sex (loud

cheers); he trusted that his confreres in this educational establishment would undoubtedly approve the meticulous antithesis of any digression in his utterance, for as La Rochefoucauld so truly said, "Les vertus ne sont que les vices déguises. Mr. Hoyle asked what this last speech meant, and having received no answer, remarked rudely that he hoped the hongentieman himself knew, because nobody else did; he thought Latin jolly nice, and often did some out of school (cheers). Mr. Williams, ma., then rose to make a statement on behalf of I.B. (loud hoots-all the Masters swoon). I.B. as a hody opposed the motion; they liked hard work and wanted more, and if it was done away with, the last state of that form would be worse than the first. This remark was followed by loud applause, in which could be distinguished a curious squeaking noise; this was found to be the member for Class II, Mr. Griffith, speaking very fast and very excitedly; no one being able to distinguish a word of what he said, he sat down. A diversion was caused at this point by Mr. W. E. C. Davidson-Houston, who said he was tired and wanted to go to bed; after he had been sent off in charge of Mary and Uncle Podger, the motion was put and lost by 33 votes to 32.

Other Business.—Messrs. Havers and Pope settled their differences outside, and Mr. Vogel bagged the best armchair; Mr. Hoyle retired to read Latin, and Messrs. Swettenham and Hale rolled wheels at each other across the floor. Mr. W. W. Horne gave a selection of hymns on the piano, and Messrs. Cameron and Malcolmson an exhibition of billiards; Mr. W. E. H. Grylls put the Library in order, and Professor Rouse worked the gramaphone. Mr. Harris having taken the best place in front of the fire, life then resumed its normal course in the S. Ronan's Reading Rooms, the only discordant sounds being those of a scientific exposition of modern warfare in the adjoining room.

The Entertainment.

Encouraged by the success of our play last year we once more tempted the fates this Christmas, and on Friday, Dec. 10th, presented two plays, viz., "Shock-headed Peter" and "Browne with an E." Practically everyone who had accepted came, and the Gymnasium has never been so full—there were over 150 people present. It may be said at once that the evening was a complete success, both the performances being well acted, and meeting with strong approval. As far as the acting was concerned there was not a single weak spot, though naturally some stood

out as especially good. In the first piece Rouse was excellent as Papa; Fulford made quite a good Mama, and Vogel a most attractive Harriet. Great excitement was caused when a vouthful admirer presented her with a bouquet. Caccia acted very well as Frederick, and Montgomery made a good Shock-headed Peter. Conrad was particularly well played by James. Especial mention must be made of the Song and Dance by Havers, who took the Blackamoor's part: he sang extremely well, and was encored. Admirable work was done in the Dances by Harrow-Bunn, ma., Molson and Sandwith, the star performer being undoubtedly Harrow-Bunn. All the rest did well in their respective parts, Stone in particular exciting much attention. The second play was a good foil to the first. All were good, and Vogel, who had a most difficult part, was by general consent a great success. He is quite natural, and speaks very clearly. Williams, ma., was also extremely good, and is a natural actor; his rendering of Mrs. Neroesby caused great joy. Walsh is the only boy in the School who could have played the Baron's part, and he did it uncommonly well, though a French part would of course have been better suited to him. Rouse, though he acted well, and amused the boys immensely, was not so well suited by the part of Mr. Brown, as by his part in the other play, or in that of last year. Beal made quite a pleasant little Mrs. Robert Browne, and looked very nice, but does not speak very clearly. Hale made an excellent Frenchman. His accent is correct, he acted well, and looked the part. We must not forget to mention the exquisite skill with which Swettenham and Malcolmson worked the curtains. and the tact and grace with which Hoyle and Horne showed people their places. We feel we must pay a tribute to the excellent teaching the "dancers" received at such a short notice. It is only fair to Miss Grey to say that either in fancy or ordinary dancing it would be hard to provide a better mistress than the one whom we are lucky enough to have.

Boring.

On the evening of Thursday, Dec. 16th, a Boxing Competition was held in the Gymnasium. Boxes of chocolate were divided amongst those who entered. It is impossible to describe the different rounds. Most of them were evenly contested, and even where science was lacking great energy was displayed. Some boys shewed that they had the ability, and, what is more important, all shewed that they were able to take it smiling.

Swettenham boxed very well indeed against Havers. He is quick with his hands, uses his head well, and should make a very

useful heavy-weight in a few years.

Garrett is the most finished boxer in the School. He put up an excellent fight against Pope, whose greater strength and longer

reach made him a formidable opponent.

The boys who have improved most during the term are Swettenham, Molson, and Vogel, ma. Unfortunately Vogel and Barnes were unable to box in the Competition owing to damage done during the "Cake Match," or by the cake. Goodbody has also made a most promising start.

The past football Season.

After a somewhat uncertain start, the eleven found their form and finally developed into a very good side indeed, very much better in fact than at one time appeared possible. Had it not been for one pronounced weakness, they would have been almost equal with the best teams we have had here. As it was they were right above the average, and showed themselves superior to every other side we encountered. The weakness to which we refer was that of shooting, usually such a strong point with the S. Ronan's teams, but the fact remains that this season not a single one of the forwards could be relied upon to shoot with any accuracy. This is all the more curious as the forwards were such an extremely good line in mid-field play.

The team were defeated on three occasions only. One was early in the season after a very close match against Cottesmore, who had easily the best side they have ever possessed, and who were well beaten by us nevertheless in the return on their own ground. The other two were on occasions when we were without two of our most valuable players, and even then we deserved to

win the game.

The characteristic of the side was the usual one at S. Ronan's, namely, that they were never beaten, and whatever the odds against them they went their hardest from start to finish. The most remarkable instance of this was in the return against Cottesmore. Our opponents were leading by 2—1 twenty minutes from time, and we collected three goals in those last twenty minutes. Against such a very good side as Cottesmore, this was no mean performance. On one or two other occasions the recuperative faculty of the eleven was much in evidence. The side benefited by having no particularly weak spot. It was very level all through. Possibly, the most noticeable feature was the excellent combination of the forwards, who, however, rather spoilt their efforts by poor shooting. Both backs were exceptionally good, and the half-back line was a sound one, with Havers as the pick.

The Second Eleven had, as was anticipated, a most successful season. They played seven matches and won them all, scoring 37 goals against 3. In all probability it was the best second eleven we have had at S. Ronan's. The forwards were unusually good, and there were a very good pair of backs in Harrow-Bunn, ma. and Williams, mi. Walrond was a most promising goal-keeper, and Horne, in the half-back line was of course very much above the average of the ordinary Second Eleven centre-half. Vogel improved greatly this year, and showed good form at right half. If he could only learn to kick he would be quite a good player. Hoyle, mi., showed promise on the other wing. Of the forwards, Hale and Williams were a very dangerous pair on the inside, and Graham at inside left was quite a good player when he let himself go, but is far too lacking in confidence and vigour. Fulford is quite useful at outside left, and Mansell is promising on the right. At present, however, he is much too frightened of being knocked over. When he lets himself go with more disregard of the consequences he will be a really good player. Of the other members of the School, great promise is shown by Caccia and Norwood, though the latter will have to develop more enthusiasm. Many other members showed promise, but it would be invidious to single out any particular player. Finally, Hoyle made a very good Captain, and the whole side played their football in the right spirit, thoroughly enjoying it, and putting the last ounce into the game.

- R. I. Hoyle, Capt. (inside right). Turned out a very good forward, with plenty of go. Showed much skill in passing and dribbling. His shooting was good at times, but very erratic.
- H. C. P. HAVERS (centre half). A really good player. Feeds his forwards well and very clever with his head. A good tackler and an untiring worker.
- G. H. Barnes (left back). Promises to be one of the best players we have had. Very fast and quick, and a good kick with either foot. Goes in much harder now than formerly.
- N. A. M. SWETTENHAM (centre forward)- His pace and weight make him a dangerous player. In addition he uses his brains, and keeps his forwards well together. Passes well but is a poor shot.

- J. H. Bovd (right half). Improved a great deal as the season went on and is now a very useful performer in this position. Passes well to his forwards and kicks nicely. His tackling, however, might still be improved.
- J. A. B. GRYLLS (right back). Another very promising player. Fast, and a very good kick with either foot, but still has something to learn in the way of tackling.
- A. F. Malcolmson (goal). Developed into quite a good keeper and frequently brings off some brilliant saves. He is not yet, however, absolutely reliable on straight ground shots.
- J. S. GARRETT (inside left). A very promising little player. He goes straight and passes nicely. An accurate shot, but without a great deal of power as yet.
- G. R. W. Beal (outside right). Found his place at outside where he both passes and centres quite nicely. Though slow in actual running, he makes up for this by quickness in footwork and good dribbling.
- J. M. CAMERON (left half). Though still occasionally lacking in vigour, he is in all other respects a really good player Passes well to his forwards and plays an intelligent game.
- J. V. Phipps (outside left). Very fast and hard working. He also centres and shoots excellently, but he gets far too excited in a crisis, and has not sufficient control of the ball.
