Trevor Cartland left S. Ronan's in 1906, and went to Winchester, from which School he passed 1st into Sandhurst, afterwards gaining the Sword of Honour and King's Prize. At S. Ronan's he was liked and respected by everyone; he was a boy of very perfect character; quiet and reserved in manner, he had, notwithstanding, a great strength of affection for those who knew him. He never did a mean or petty action, and his mind was one of unsullied purity. He was a power for good in the School, and a very perfect type of young English gentleman. In 1906, he was the best bat in a strong XI. and besides being in the Football Team, he was a prefect and a member of the Scholarship Class. We append a copy of a letter from General Sir Aylmer Hunter-Weston, on whose staff he was.

Copy of General Sir Aylmer Hunter-Weston's Letter received 11th July, 1916.

"My Dear Mrs. Cartland,

"I cannot tell you how deeply I sympathise with you in the terrible loss that not only you and your husband, but I his friend, and the country, have incurred by the death of that capable officer and gallant gentleman, your son Trevor.

"He was killed with his Colonel in the centre of the great attack on the German position, between Beaumont-Hamel and Serre, where the 1st Rifle Brigade covered themselves with glory by their discipline, courage, and determination. It was a magnificent attack. The fine training and discipline of the 1st R. B., were not a little due to the work and example of your gallant son.

"For him, himself, one cannot grieve. He has died as he would wish to die, in action, at the head of his men, gladly giving his life for his country. It is for you I grieve, and I cannot say how deeply.

W. H. V. Nelson.—" Nellie" as he was affectionately called. left S. Ronan's in 1909, after winning a King's Scholarship in Mathematics at Westminster. Ever since that time he has been a close personal friend. We knew better than most perhaps the workings of his mind. He too was reserved and not easy to know intimately, but he was an idealist, to whom everything fine and beautiful appealed irresistibly. During his time at Westminster, much as he loved that School, nothing pleased him more than a visit to us, where the frank simplicity of the preparatory school boy was a joy to him after the conventionalities of the Public School. He was one of those quiet, but sterling characters on whom our country depends, loyal, highminded, patriotic—an example of a brief life, nobly lived, bravely relinquished. The attached cutting from the "Daily Telegraph" sketches his career, and the following letters show his value as an officer.

"Lieutenant W. H. V. Nelson, Sherwood Foresters, who has died of wounds, was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Nelson, of 15, Hanover-street, London, W., and was in his 21st He was educated under Mr. S. S. Harris, at S. Ronans, West Worthing, from which school he took a mathematical scholarship at Westminster. At the same time he retired from another scholarship, which he had gained at Cheltenham. While at Westminster he won the Cheyne mathematical prize for two years in succession with full marks, an almost, if not quite unprecedented feat in the history of the school. A few days before the outbreak of the war he left Westminster with a scholarship at Trinity College, Cambridge. When war was was declared he applied for a commission in Kitchener's Army, being already a member of the Westminster O.T.C. Pending the receipt of a commission he enlisted in the Public School Corps, and it is interesting to note that he stood twelfth on the list of enrolment. Gazetted first lieutenant in July, 1915, he went to the front in

the following November. In December, 1915, he was in the trenches, and assisted at the taking of the Bluff. For four months he acted as bombing officer to the 10th Sherwoods. On July 2nd he was wounded in the great advance, and died on the 8th inst. at No. 38 Casualty Clearing Station.

Extract from Letter dated 22nd July, 1916, Capt. Wilmot, 10th Sherwoods, to Capt. Watts, 11th Sherwoods.

"About Nelson.—Nodder, Signalling Officer of the Battalion has written to Mrs. Nelson with full details, so I won't add anything. He did magnificently in the first 'strafe' and got two slight wounds in the face. I understand his name went in for a decoration for that. He came out for two days after that and then went in again when he got killed. There is no doubt that in the first 'strafe' he stood out above all others. This is the opinion of everyone."

Copy of Letter from Colonel Banbury, 10th Sherwood Foresters, dated 25th July, 1916.

"Dear Mrs. Nelson,

"Your letter of the 13th reached me just as we were moving up again. Mr. Hoyte, of ours—who is Brigade Bombing Officer has, I understand, written you all particulars he could ascertain, and I can only add that your son was buried at Heilly (Picardy), next to Capt. Fisher, D.S.O., who also died of wounds.

"I am very sorry to say that I was personally unaware of your son being wounded until after he was carried away, as I had just left that part of the field and so missed seeing him. As you know I had selected him as Battalion Bombing Officer, and I should not have done that unless I had formed a good opinion of his capabilities and keenness, and also of his private character. I was quite attached to him, and can assure you that we all appreciated his worth and feel deep sorrow for you in your loss, and it is the desire of all ranks that I should convey to you our condolence.

"If there is anything more I can tell you, do not hesitate to ask. The Bombing Sergeant who was with your boy, and also wounded, has since succumbed also.

"I had noted your son's name for mention, he did so well in the attack on Railway Trench.

Copy of Letter dated 17th July, 1916, from Major H. A. Leggett, 13th Sherwood Foresters.

" Dear Sir.

"I have read with very great sorrow the news of your boy's death, and I hope you will pardon me for my intrusion at this time; but I wish to bear witness to one of the finest characters that I have ever met. As a senior officer in the 11th Battalion, I first met the 'Admiral' at Frensham in 1914, and I knew him thoroughly from that time until he went out. His keenness was magnificent; one instance I give you as quite typical. He expected to go out with the 11th in August last year from Borden, and was bitterly disappointed at being told he must wait behind, but he packed his things and went to the Station (Liphook) four miles away, just on the chance that some officer might fall ill, or be absent at the last moment, and he might go. No young subaltern ever identified himself so closely with his men; he knew them all, their records, their characters, even their homes and families, and no one ever did his duty more conscientiously. It is very easy to say these things for they are so abundantly true. No one was ever more honest than he, transparently, simply, solely, honest. He was with Mr. Lander all through his service, 11th, 15th, and 2nd and 10th, and I shall probably hear from him about recent events.

"My very heart sympathy goes out to you and his mother in

your loss. Yours very sincerely,

Copy of letter dated 13th July, 1916, from A. J. N. Lander, 10th Sherwood Foresters.

"Dear Mr. Nelson.

"Your Son has been one of my best friends since we both joined the eleventh battalion, and I should like to tell you how much we thought of what he did before his death, though that will not make up to us for his loss. The company I am in took part of a trench by night assault from a flank, and our right got held up by a 'stop' in the trench. Your Son, alone with our company bombing officer, protected our right flank all night, and he kept on bombing after being twice wounded slightly in the face, till the next morning another regiment came up on our flank. He would have been recommended for the Military Cross, and certainly many of our company owe their safety to his efforts. Three days after, he was hit while taking his men into another attack. He was always cheering us up, and I know the Battalion will not seem the same to his friends without him. If there is any other information it is in my power to send you, please let me know. Yours sincerely, A. J. M. LANDER."

Copy of letter dated 18th July, 1916, from F. C. Nodder.

" Dear Mrs. Nelson,

"Please accept my sincerest sympathies in the loss

of your son.

"We knew each other very well indeed, having both been at the Headquarter Mess ever since he joined the Battalion. I am afraid I cannot give you a detailed account of his doings in those first six days of the great advance.

"I can only tell you that he instilled the greatest confidence

into his men and they would have done anything for him.

"He was wounded slightly in the nose and forehead, on, I think, the 1st July, it was very slight, but quite enough to have gone to Hospital with, had he not been of such hard metal.

"Then on July 7th he was hit very badly in the leg, his Sergeant at the same time being hit in both legs This is only

hearsay. I never saw him after he was wounded.

"He set a fine example of pluck, on hearing that there was only one stretcher near at hand he refused to be taken away before his Sergeant. This I'm afraid is all I know, except that on July 8th I heard he had died.

"May I as a brother Officer of the Sherwood Foresters express my deepest sympathy with you on the loss of your Son. Although I had only been with the Battalion since March, I had come to look upon him as a personal friend, we had

many walks and talks together.

"I know how splendidly he behaved in the "strafe." I was wounded early myself (July 3rd), and did not see him myself, but I remember what I heard in the train from another fellow who was with him. He said Nelson did splendid work and will get a V.C. or a Military Cross; however, his reward I am sure will be a far better one.

C. R. Heygate left S. Ronan's for Radley in 1902; he was the 2nd of three brothers, all of whom were valuable members of the School, and who have been all in the Regular Army. Claud, during his time at S. Ronan's was the leading boy in the School; not only was he Head Prefect, but he was by far the best athlete, and was unusually good in all branches. After leaving Radley, he used to play for the Warwickshire Gentlemen at Cricket. He was a very promising officer, and his loss will be a serious one. We all at S. Ronan's give our deepest sympathy to Captain and Mrs. Heygate, who have been such good friends to the School.

P. V. Cornish (S. Ronan's, 1897) went to Wellington in 1902. He had a good career at that School and went into the Army through Sandhurst; though he has had several relations at S. Ronan's, we knew little of him personally as he was before our time, but all that we have heard is creditable and good, and the

country has lost in him a promising officer.

D. B. Richardson, who left S. Ronan's in 1907, was staying with us only a few months ago, just after his return from France, in order to join the R.F.C. When he left S. Ronan's, he was a Prefect and in both teams. He was sound rather than brilliant, both in work and games, but everything he did was characterised by sincerity and honesty of purpose. He was a boy with a great sense of humour, and a very affectionate, though somewhat sensitive nature. He always thoroughly enjoyed his life, and was a very excellent fellow to have in the School, and he was always grateful for anything which one could do for him. When he came to us recently, he impressed us as a very promising young officer, who combined enjoyment of his life with a real keenness for his job.

The Past Term's Work.

Apart from a satisfactory condition in the work of the School as a whole, last term brought us some very good definite results. In the first place, Havers in the Scholarship examination for Cheltenham, won the highest award which was open to him. His actual marks in Mathematics were about 450 out of 550. This, considering the extreme difficulty of the advanced Mathematics in an up-to-date Scholarship examination, was a very unusual performance. The fact that Havers is also an athlete and a leading member of both the Rugby and Association Football Teams, as well as being Head Prefect, makes his performance all the more creditable. Some ten days after his success, Walsh, by winning a Winchester Scholarship, achieved the greatest success a Preparatory School can gain. It is not easy to find out the details at Winchester, but we know that in addition to a fine performance in Latin, French, and English, he was a long way a-head of all the other candidates in the History examination. among his victims being the Prime Minister's son. His Latin prose paper also called for special mention. Towards the end of the term Flale successfully passed into Osborne, thus making our third Naval Cadet within a year.

Apart from these out-standing successes, during the whole of the past year, an unusually high place has been taken by the boys in their ordinary entrance examinations. Those of the previous two terms have already been mentioned in this Magazine. During this term Vogel passed 14th out of 50 into Harrow; Cameron, though not yet 13, 18th out of 78 into Wellington, though as a matter of fact, he will not be joining till Christmas; Pope went into Winchester on the strength of the Scholarship examination, and Beal, at the same School, passed at least one Form higher than any of us expected. The Headmaster of Greshams writes that Rouse has taken an uncommonly good place at that School, and did a most satisfactory examination, while Horne at Sherborne has also been placed higher than we thought likely. Helme though not in the Scholarship Class was 14th out of 76 in

To turn to the general work of the School, it is obvious that the standard of the Scholarship Class from an all-round point of view, is now as good as it can be. I.A. which was not an interesting Class in the Easter term made a great advance, and good all-round work was done. Shell, on the other hand, which was so good in the preceding term was not by any means so interesting to teach, with the exception of the top five boys. These changes are due of course to the shifting of the various boys owing to removes. I.B. continued its steady improvement of the preceding

term, and there is plenty of cause for satisfaction in that direction. Class II. also made a considerable advance, especially in Latin,

and many boys in that Class were most promising. Class III., the lowest in the School, were fully up to standard, and indeed the all-round work done in the lower half of the School gives distinct cause for satisfaction, and is better than has been the case for some time. There are of course a few slackers in the place. That probably is inevitable. One can only endeavour to change their point of view in the shortest possible space of time. Generally speaking, however, plenty of interest is shown in the work, and it has almost always been the case at S. Ronans, that those who are keen in their work are keen in their games, and indeed that their keenness extends to nearly everything which they take up.

The Swimming Races.

Norwood was promising, but he would have done better still if he had stuck to the same stroke throughout, instead of trying about ten different styles.

The Past Cricket Season.

This year the Cricket Eleven was undoubtedly one of the best we have seen at S. Ronan's. In actual batting it was certainly equal as a team to any we have had. On the other hand the bowling was not so good as has frequently been the case. Atkinson, though he did not get the highest average was probably the best bowler. His length was excellent and he had a very good slow ball; but he was not enough on the wicket to be in any way deadly, though he sometimes sent down a very dangerous ball. Horne, till quite the end of the season, was not such a good bowler as he had been last year. He was still very dangerous for the last half of the side, but he did not present any great terrors for the leading batsmen. As a pair, however, he and Atkinson were distinctly good, and probably above the average, though neither of them were by any means so dangerous as several bowlers we have had at S. Ronan's. The fielding of the team was again excellent. With the exception of one or two off days, they were smart in their ground-work and safe in their catching. Helme was a very good wicket keeper. The batting, however, was without doubt the strong point of the eleven. There were at least seven people who were capable of making fifty at any time. Only once throughout the season did they fail badly, and that was undoubtedly due to a bumpy wicket more than anything else. They possessed the S. Ronan's characteristic of rising to the occasion and pulling a game out of the fire. Moreover, they were not merely a good batting side, but they were good to look at, and combined power with style. Horne developed his batting enormously, and was quite in the front rank. His defence was excellent, and he had plenty of strokes all round the wicket. He and Atkinson were undoubtedly the two best bats on the side; the latter improved by leaps and bounds after the first fortnight of the season. He always possessed a fine hitting power, with strong strokes on the off, but after the first month he added to these qualities a fine defence and good leg shots. Beal, though not really such an accomplished bat as either of the first two, was the most consistent player on the side, and came off not only when things were going well, but what is far more important, when matters were in a critical state. He was a nice bat to watch and a quick scorer. Grylls, of whom much had been expected, was, with the exception of two innings, disappointing. He lost his form through bad foot work, and though he fully recovered his defence before the end of the term, he did not get back the fine off drives which usually characterise The rest of the team were all of them quite useful in their various ways, and there is no reason why each one should not be a very good cricketer. As to the future, as far as one can

see, next year's team should also be a powerful one. The Second Eleven is full of promising cricketers, of whom one may pick out in particular, Williams, mi., Norwood, Mansell, Harrow-Bunn, ma., Garrett, Walrond, and Barnes. Besides these, there is much talent in the lower part of the School.
