EDITORIAL.

"Forsan et haec olim meminisse iuvabit."

HE remembrance of the gallant deeds performed by Old Cuthbertians in the Great War will assuredly afford the greatest pleasure to all future members of the School, and not least appreciated will be the story of the bravery of one who has just lately received the highest honour a soldier can covet. Captain William Barnsley Allen has been awarded the Victoria Cross "for most conspicuous bravery and devotion

to duty," and as the account of his gallantry is mentioned elsewhere in this issue, we shall content ourselves by expressing our regret that he is unable to visit us, so that we could show him how much we appreciate the great honour he has done the School.

We started this term with numbers full even to overflowing, and with every prospect for a successful year, and so far at all events our prospects have not been belied.

Football has come back to his own again, and both teams, though probably smaller than in previous years, have started quite successfully; while the dormitory teams are busy practising in every available moment, and, as they think, in secret from the others, to pace well and shoot hard, in anticipation of those great events of the Christmas Term—the dormitory football matches.

We have lately been visited by three gentlemen who came down to inspect the school life in all its branches. Coming into each form with ponderous note-books, which struck terror into the heart of the new boy, they solemnly observed all the proceedings, and even turned out in a driving rain to watch the Corps forming platoons regardless of the weather. They represented the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board.

On All Saints' Day, according to usual custom, we had a whole holiday, but it was somewhat marred by the fact that it rained almost all day. However, in the evening, as if to compensate us for the inconveniences caused by the weather, we were treated to a first-rate concert, the singing, especially in the case of one small boy with a very big voice, being excellent, and the antics of the nigger troupe most amusing. We were pleased to hear again some old English songs and melodies. In these days of world-warfare we sometimes hanker, perhaps wrongly, after our quondam.

insularity, and the simplicity of a "Here's a health unto His Majesty" seems to strike a note in quiet harmony with our fondest memories of Sherwood Forest.

SPEECH DAY.

Speech Day this year fell on the Feast of S. James, and the Eucharist was sung at 10-30. Early in the afternoon there was a parade of the O.T.C., and in the South Field a demonstration was given by the Scouts. The Commemoration Service was conducted by the Provost, and included the singing, at the altar, of Stanford's *Te Deum*. The preacher was Dr. Kempthorne, Bishop of Lichfield, who taking for his text, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness," said that though the Nation was at last coming to realise that a life without a purpose was not worth living, yet there was still a danger of putting National greatness in the place of God. The service concluded with the Singing of Semper ad Coelestia.

The presentation of the Certificates and Scouts' Shields was performed by Lady Mountgarret. Mr. W. H. Mason proposed a hearty vote of thanks to her Ladyship, whose name, he added, seemed to be written on every wall and stone in the school. He himself felt that it was a great privilege to have Lady Mountgarret's presence that day, and he was sure she was doing that of which her late husband would entirely have approved. The oftener she came, the more would she be welcome. Lady Mountgarret then departed amid hearty cheers.

The Provost was the next speaker. He expressed his opinion that the attempt to unify schools would not prevail. He believed that a certain amount of independence was good, and was sure that the Woodard Schools would grow.

The Headmaster, in an interesting address, commented on the progress made during the past year, especially in the Lower School. He was glad of that, for it was there that he had decided to put his best energies when he came to S. Cuthbert's, and those energies had borne fruit. He only regretted that the school had suffered from a German attack—of measles. However, a counter-offensive had been quickly set up, and the enemy driven out of the midst. He was proud of the O.T.C., and he complimented the Scouts.

Speaking of the future, he said he did not think parents always remembered how necessary brains were for business. The battles of the future were going to be won by brains rather than by muscle. Therefore parents must recognise that boys and girls would require a somewhat longer school life than they had enjoyed hitherto. There would also have to be greater diligence among the pupils. There must be no divorce between religion and education, and the Germans had suffered in failing to develop character. Grit and character, hard work and sobriety—such were the qualities that would be required far more in the future than they had been in the past.

The Archdeacon of Halifax, in a facetious speech, proposed a vote of thanks to the Bishop for his presence that afternoon, and Dr. Kempthorne agreeably replied.

Tea was served in Hall, and during the meal the choir, under the able direction of Mr. Harris, rendered some charming glees, including "Bright and Buxom Lasses," and "How softly the Evening."

SWIMMING SPORTS.

The Swimming Sports were held on Monday, July 24th, and after the gloomy days of June and early July, the bright spell of weather which we enjoyed just at that time came all the more welcome. The Bean Cup was won by the Crown once more, with 135 marks, the Fleur-de-Lys coming second

with 70. The Victor Ludorum helt went to Pratt (35 marks). The Ten Lengths, which took place a few days beforehand, produced a good race between Livingstone and Pratt. The Water Polo provided a victory for the Fleur-de-Lys after a good game with the Cross. The Dormitory Team Race also fell to the Fleur-de-Lys, who had the same team as in 1915; the Cross won the second place from the Crown by a few inches. The Tylden-Wright Cup thus went to the Lion, who won the Dormitory "Lengths" Competition. Pratt won the Five Lengths, and Revington-Jones the Two Lengths in good style; they ought to train on to become fast swimmers. The two Handcocks and Cochrane showed us some good diving. The younger Handcock looks a promising junior, and he too should make a good swimmer if he perseveres.

At the end of the Summer Term, 14 Cadets left the contingent, including Coy.-Sergt.-Major Steemson, who had been senior N.C.O. for the previous twelve months, and had done splendid work. He is now posted to an Officer Cadet Unit in Devonshire, where we wish him the best of luck. This term we have no less than 42 recruits, the total strength of the contingent having risen to 144, all ranks.

The Annual Inspection, of which a full account is given elsewhere, took place on June 28th. The Report, which was received during the holidays, speaks well for the high standard of efficiency of the Corps as a whole. The Hall Cup Competition was held in July, and resulted as follows: I Fleur-de-Lys, 2 Cross, 3 Crown, 4 Lion. The Fleur-de-Lys also won the Dormitory Shooting Cup, but the Mellish Cup, for the best shot in the Contingent, went to the Crown, Corporal Monkhouse scoring 52 points out of a possible 56.

So far as this term's work is concerned, there is not very much to report. There has been no falling-off either in the amount of work done on parade or in keenness. The recruits deserve special mention for the enthusiasm they have shown in the first weeks of their training. Even the "150 paces to the minute" seems to be no hardship to them. Most of our parades have been devoted to close-order drill,

but on Saturday, October 14th, the whole company turned out for night operations. Imaginary trenches were occupied on either side of a ploughed field, and a demonstration was given of sniping at night, at such a target as a cigarette-end casually lighted in an enemy trench. This was followed by attempts to carry out raids, with a view to securing one or more prisoners for purposes of identification.

A word must be said about the Certificate "A" Class, which is a new feature of our work this term. In the sixth Form, two periods a week are now devoted to the study of field operations, as laid down in the O.T.C. Regulations, and in view of the special concessions now granted to O.T.C. candidates for Army Entrance Examinations, those who attend this class will do well to take full advantage of it.

A Field Day has been fixed for Wednesday, November 15th, against contingents from King Edward VII. School, Sheffield, and Nottingham High School. According to present plans, the operations will take the form of a Rear-Guard action, in which it will be our lot to carry out the difficult duties of a Rear-Guard. After the fight we hope to have the pleasure of entertaining the "enemy" to tea at the School.

A ninth reprint of the list of Old Cuthbertians serving in H.M. Forces has just been issued. It contains the name of Captain Allen, V.C., M.C., who has recently won such a great distinction for himself and his old school; and of whom we are all so proud. The Officer Commanding is anxious to keep the list quite up-to-date and would, therefore, be very glad to hear of any additions or corrections.

The Annual Inspection took place on June 28th, and Major Coppin, D.S.O., of the Sherwood Foresters, was the inspecting

officer. He was very pleased with the Corps on the whole, and thought that great improvement had been noticed on the work of the previous year. He said that the Officer Commanding had done a great deal to improve the general efficiency. He thought the attack was very good except that it was rather hurried, and that the assault was carried out at too long a distance from the enemy. The drill and turn-out he thought very creditable. He remarked on the high standard of discipline which we had attained, and said it was of the utmost importance, at all times, to have a well disciplined body of men.

In conclusion he told us several episodes of his adventures in the Boer War. One of his illustrations was most amusing. During the closing days of the war he was encamped with his regiment in a hilly part of South Africa. One very hot day, news came in to the Commander that a Heliograph had been sighted on a hill some miles away. The Commander chose Major Coppin and a party of men, and sent them to capture this Heliograph. After some hours the party arrived at the place where it had been sighted. There were no signs of a Heliograph there, but Major Coppin was soon confronted with a war-worn British soldier who had been lost for some weeks. This soldier, in want of clothing, had repaired the seat of his trousers with the lid of a biscuit tin. Thus was explained the supposed Heliograph.

THE SCOUT CAMP.

The Scout Camp, July 25—August 2, was spent at Lady Carnarvon's Scout Cottage, Kneeton, Nottingham, situated in a pleasant spot near the Trent. Two officers and twenty-two scouts formed a fairly satisfactory number to attend camp, and the week was, on the whole, a great success.

From the point of view of Scouting Work, the time was perhaps more recreative than was originally planned, though the Cooks and Cook Orderlies for the day hardly found it so.

The bathing was particularly delightful. We received many warnings as to the dangers of the Trent, and were cheerfully informed that our bathing spot averaged at least one fatality per annum. We escaped with colds.

A most impressive feature of our stay was the Sunday morning Eucharist celebrated in the woods with a simple but dignified ceremonial that recalled the best traditions of the days of Robin Hood.

On the Monday we were very kindly entertained by Mrs. Kirkbride at Lowdham Hall, and we all felt on breaking up camp that we had spent a useful and pleasant week. Especially pleasing to the officers were the willingness and unselfishness displayed throughout by several boys, of whom before camp we should not have expected so much.

SCOUT NOTES.

There are several events of last term to be recorded. Especially enjoyable was the visit to Hodsock Priory, the home of Colonel Mellish, District Commissioner, who gave us a royal time. The field day ending at the Aviaries was quite a success. A remarkable number of proficiency badges was gained, totalling over one hundred by the end of term.

As usual in the Christmas Term, we have lost many of our best Patrol Leaders and Scouts. But our loss is the gain of the O.T.C., in which we know that they will serve with the same keenness and loyalty that marked their efforts during the past year. Above all, we have lost our Scoutmaster, to whose enthusiasm so much of our efficiency was due. We thank him for his work and also for the Shield that he presented to the Wolf Cubs.

The Scout Challenge Shield was won by the Ram Patrol, under P. L. Taylor max, and the Wolf Cub Shield by the Brown Pack, under P. L. Taylor ma. It is whispered that the Rams are going strongly again this term, but others are not far behind. Already nearly thirty Efficiency Badges have been gained, and we hope to have still more before the end of term.

CRICKET REVIEW.

It is hard to be called upon to write a review of a season which has hardly existed. Ten matches were originally arranged but only two were played.

The Eleven of 1916 was expected to be weak both in batting and bowling, as there was only one First Eleven colour man left, and not a great supply of material to draw upon.

So far as the season went, it was a very promising one. We were beaten in the first match of the season, when the team was incomplete and unsettled. From that time the improvement was steady; but the Eleven had not an opportunity sufficient to show its merits and demerits. At the end of the season the second match was played, in which also we were badly beaten. The main cause of this result, however, was the lack of confidence through want of experience in playing matches. The lack of matches, and so of interest in the Second Eleven of 1915, was realized only too well this year, when vacancies in the First had to be filled with utterly inexperienced players; and such will be the case next year.

The Second Eleven has had no chance of distinguishing itself.

In the matches played, Stephenson was first in batting, and Stephenson and Palmer in bowling. Linton, Sykes, and Hudson, have proved that they have considerable ability with the bat. Position at the wicket has been fairly grasped by all; the great weakness is chiefly on the off-side, as there is a tendency to "pat" loose balls instead of punishing them.

We were also terribly handicapped by the want of a respectable bowler in the Eleven. The bowling throughout the season was consistently bad. Change bowlers are more numerous than deadly.

Fielding—with one or two exceptions—has reached a good standard, but constant practice is still necessary.

As regards net practice, the keenness and desire to learn has been very pleasing. We are grateful to those who have turned out and helped us in our games. There is plenty of excellent material, and we look forward with all hopefulness to a good season next year.

THE WORKSOP RETREAT.

"There was a multitude of persons gathered together—about a hundred and twenty." It carried one's mind back to the Upper Room in Jerusalem, where the infant Church of Christ was waiting for the promise of the Father ere it went forth in the Master's name to bear witness to Him. The gathering in S. Cuthbert's College was in many ways different from that earlier one, but like it those present with one accord continued stedfastly in prayer and supplication. As we carry the memories of that time into our future work, may we, and the Church we represent, experience a like sequence in the pouring out of the Holy Spirit in Pentecostal Presence and Power!

The arrangements for the Retreat had been carefully thought out and very thoroughly prepared, and everything worked smoothly and happily. Everyone soon settled into his place in the commodious and spacious building generously placed at our service by the Provost and Governors. The

surroundings were helpful for quiet meditation, and the beautiful weather made the time healthful and restful to body as to soul. The Chapel, the centre of our Retreat, was full of inspiration and devotion, with its beautiful and harmonious lines and its undistracting unison of adornment. The large Hall was an excellent refectory, where a quiet attentive staff of helpers ministered to our bodily requirements. If a note of criticism may be allowed, the reading during meals was not very audible to many, the Woodard Foundation probably not anticipating the necessity of providing perfect acoustics for their large Dining Hall. The books read were "The Book of Wisdom" and Father Congreve's "Interior Life."

CAPTAIN W. B. ALLEN, V.C.

Captain William Barnsley Allen, M.C., M.D., Royal Medical Corps, has been awarded the V.C. for most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty. When gun detachments were unloading ammunition from waggons which had just come up, the enemy suddenly began to shell the battery positions. The first shell fell on one of the limbers, exploded the ammunition, and caused several casualties. Captain Allen saw the occurrence, and at once, with utter disregard of danger, ran straight across the open under heavy shell fire, commenced dressing the wounded, and undoubtedly by his promptness saved many of the men from bleeding to death. He was himself hit four times during the first hour by pieces of shell, one of which fractured two of his ribs; but he never mentioned this at the time, and coolly went on with his work till the last man was dressed and safely removed. He then went over to another battery and tended a wounded officer.

It was only when this was done that he returned to his dug-out and reported his own injury.

New prefects were admitted at Evensong on S. Matthew's Day, September 21st, when the story of the saint gave the Headmaster a subject for his earnest address on "Business Capacity and Self-Dedication."

Sunday, October 8th, was kept as a day of Thanksgiving for the fruits of the earth, and for all God's daily blessings to us. Harvest hymns were sung, offerings of corn and grapes were made, and the collection was given to the British Red Cross Society.

The call of the National Mission to Repentance has come and gone, and it is still to be hoped that resolutions for the deepening of the spiritual life will result from it. The Vicar of Worksop was our messenger, and his addresses on Sunday, October 22nd, and the night before were full of teaching and inspiration. The first one (to Communicants) was on the Eucharist and its grace. The others were on Sonship, Duty, and Prayer. The special call was continued on the last two Sundays in November, and the Chaplain hopes that boys have responded earnestly to his appeal to make a resolution with which to begin Advent.

On November 2nd, before evensong, the new Chaplain (Rev. P. E. Barnes, M.A.) was installed by the Provost, after making his declaration as to faith and practice.

The daily Eucharist has been continued this term and is well attended, especially on Saturdays, when it is a Requiem. On Saints' Days the Eucharist at the High Altar takes the place of the weekly school Eucharist at 7-15.

Stringent lighting regulations have made it necessary to have Evensong at 3-30 or 4. It will be a great blessing when Peace or Summer allows of a return to the usual hour.

LECTURES.

On Sunday, October 8th, Mr. Alexander Watson entertained us with a Dramatic Recital; it was the first of the term, and it was thoroughly appreciated by everyone who heard it. The first part of his programme consisted of scenes taken from Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night"; they were so well acted that at times it was very difficult to realise that the stately Malvolio, the boisterous Sir Toby, and the timorous Sir Andrew were all the same man. The latter half of his programme was occupied by recitations of short poems, including three or four of Rudyard Kipling; he concluded a very enjoyable evening by telling the story of Mark Twain's famous European guide.

On Sunday, October 15th, we were treated to a very interesting lecture, by Mr. Joseph Burtt, on the animals of Africa. By means of some very instructive slides, he showed to us in great detail the various types of antelope now roaming at large on the African Veldt. He also told us some stories of elephant hunters, and showed us interesting slides of wild African lions and tigers. At the conclusion, the Captain of the School called for three cheers, which were given with hearty good-will.

On Sunday, October 22nd, we received our second visit from Mr. Edgar Bellingham. Remembering his lecture of last year, "With Caravan and Camera," the School gave him a rousing welcome.

He spoke of the past glories of the Arabic and Moorish races, telling how they emerged from their desert and became world-dominant only to retire to their sterile home once more. He then went on to describe the customs and manners of the wandering Arabs, the desert-dwellers; showing slides of their daily life. Leaving the Arab he told about the idle Moor, the city-dweller, whose one idea seems to be to do

absolutely nothing. He then screened scenes of some great cities inhabited by Moors.

Thus ended a most enjoyable lecture, made even more so by the quaint personal anecdotes which Mr. Bellingham related. The School was not slow to show its appreciation.

On Sunday, the 29th of October, we listened to a most interesting lecture on "German Intrigues in Mesopotamia," by Canon Parfit, lately returned from that district. Canon, with a very clear and impressive delivery, dwelt on Germany's aims in holding Mesopotamia. By linking up the North Sea, the Black Sea, and the Persian Gulf, the Kaiser intended to connect Germany, by means of canals and rivers, with the Far East. Canon Parfit showed several slides which proved of interest in relation to the great campaign which has just been brought to a close. He portrayed the difficulties of travel and campaigning in Mesopotamia by many excellent slides, including one depicting a desert mirage, giving an excellent idea of the delusion practised on the inexperienced. He also showed one of the interior of a Mosque during a service. This latter is supposed to be unique, for the Arabs are generally most careful to guard their ceremonies from prying eyes.

On the 5th November, Mr. Richard Kearton again favoured us with a delightful lecture on "Nature's Children," exhibiting a large variety of photographs, incomparable for their vivid reality. He displayed numerous nesting places, and comical facial expressions of many songsters, and he demonstrated the remarkable fact that many birds fail to notice any change that has purposely been made in their nests. The importance of colour in plumage as a protection against enemies was illustrated by a reproduction of a Woodcock in its surroundings, the wonderful harmony being very striking. Tenderness of affection in parent birds, too, was a fact worthy of note. The lecture was cleverly

sprinkled with photographs of other branches of animal life, showing the intense interest this hobby excites.

On Sunday, November 12th, we received our second visit from Mr. Gregorious Brown who gave us a most interesting lecture on "Montenegro and its People." He traced his journey from Cetinje to Podgeritza, showing the great difficulties of travelling in these parts. He also pointed out that the rough life led by the inhabitants is largely owing to the scantiness of vegetation. He spoke of the people's love for each other and declared that, above all, they were well-disposed towards the English.

CHESS CLUB.

The Chess Club has sustained a heavy loss through the departure of L. E. Houghton. A. Hart has been appointed Hon. Sec., and C. C. Hawkins is the new member of the Committee.

Several new sets of chess-men and draughts-men have been purchased, and two Tournaments are in progress. It is hoped that a match against the Masters will be played later on in the term.

DEBATING AND LITERARY SOCIETY.

At a general meeting held on Tuesday, September 26th, Mr. H. C. Geipel was elected secretary, and Mr. A. Hart a member of the Committee. The first debate took place on Sunday, October 15th, when Mr. Geipel, seconded by Mr. Hart, proposed that the submarine activity had had more effect on the history of the war than had aerial warfare. Mr. Lewis opened for the opposition, and he was seconded by Mr. Haagensen. An interesting discussion ensued, and all the speakers showed a good knowledge of the subject. The speeches too were well delivered, and the whole debate was of considerable merit. The motion was finally rejected by 13 votes to 6.

The second meeting took place on Sunday, Oct. 29th. Mr. H. E. Witham asked the Hon. Sec. to make some explanation with regard to the delay which had taken place in opening the previous meeting. The Hon. Sec., in his defence, laid the onus on Mr. Stephenson, another member of the Society. Mr. Witham, seconded by Mr. Haagensen, then proposed the suspension of Mr. Stephenson's membership for the remainder of the session. It appeared that the latter had presumed upon his authority as Captain of School to forbid Mr. Geipel's attendance at the meeting, and had also prevented the attendance of other members of the society, including that of the seconder of the Opposition of the day's debate. Mr. J. I. Wood opposed the motion. He thought that as the Hon. Sec. had not personally informed Mr. Stephenson of the meeting in question, the latter was fully justified in his action. Mr. Geipel replied that the time and place of the meeting had been duly notified on the Society's board, and that there was no precedent for informing any member in person. Mr. Barritt seconded Mr. Wood, but on the motion being put to the House, it was carried by 16 votes to 13.

This matter being disposed of, Mr. Witham rose to move that "Polar Expeditions are well worth the trouble expended." He was seconded by Mr. Thackeray, and opposed by Mr. Geipel and Mr. Olsen. The debate did not reveal a very great knowledge of the subject, and perhaps the rejection of the motion by 27 votes to 7 is thus explained.

The third meeting was fixed for November 12th. The House was well filled and seemed to be in a state of suppressed excitement, for it was rumoured that there was to be some opposition to the confirmation of the minutes. However, as matters turned out, the few malcontents wisely stayed away, and the minutes were duly signed. The House then proceeded to discuss the question that Napoleon Bonaparte was a greater military genius than Julius Caesar. Save for occasional interruptions, the debate was well conducted, and there was a large number of speakers. The Chairman, taking the vote by voices, thought that the "Noes" had it, but on a division being claimed, the motion was found to be carried by a single vote. The House then adjourned.

KILLED IN ACTION.

Much has been written of the nobility of the soldier's death "in action," and I suppose were it possible for everyone to visit even a few of the huge cemeteries which are found at only too sadly frequent intervals behind the firing lines of the present war, much more would be written.

As a soldier, one does not go very often to such places, but there are occasions when one feels impelled to do so. "Poor old R—— was buried this morning; we brought him down last night. I think I'll just stroll round and have a look what sort of a grave he has."

I have just returned from such a cemetery, situated about four miles behind the trenches at the back of a wooded ridge,

which serves to protect it and the neighbouring village from shell fire. Along two sides runs the road up which rumble nightly the supply columns moving trenchwards. On the two remaining sides are fields containing horse lines, artillery wagons and limbers, and all the heterogeneous paraphernalia necessary to the fighters "up the line."

All the infantry columns going up to our particular sector pass this cemetery at various times, and I suppose there are many who wonder vaguely to themselves if they will ever occupy their few feet of ground therein. Not a few come down there stiff and cold.

The major portion of this ground is taken up by the graves of French soldiers, but there is already to be seen a considerable number of little brown crosses with aluminium name-plates which are erected by the Graves Registration Commission to the memory of the fallen British soldiers.

In this locality there is a great deal of soft grey chalklike rock, and on many of the French graves may be seen exquisitely carved little crosses made out of this material by the dead men's comrades, but in several cases the graves are sunken and the stonework has cracked and fallen already.

Most of these graves, too, are adorned with the bead and wire wreaths of which the French are so fond. The inscriptions thereon are singularly touching. On the grave of a colonel I remarked a large wreath, "Offert par son ordonnance," and above a group of graves was a black painted board inscribed, "To the ever glorious memory of our fallen comrades of the 97ieme d'Infanterie," and underneath was a beautifully executed little painting of the trenches, with the words "Mort pour la Patrie. They died gloriously fighting for the freedom ond honour of France."

On some of the simple crosses were hung the caps of the dead heroes, and on one grave was placed a helmet.

The graves of our own men are newly-made, but each one has its cross and is neatly and carefully arranged. The crosses are of wood, brown-stained to preserve them from the weather, and on the little aluminium strips one sees the name and regiment, with the simple legend, "Killed in Action," and the date.

O.C. NOTES.

This column, as usual at the present time, is mainly concerned with the war. First we may mention with the heartiest congratulations the great distinction which has been awarded to Captain W. B. Allen, about which we need say no more here, as it is mentioned elsewhere. His honour came only a few weeks after he had received the Military Cross.

The casualty roll since July has been a heavy one for us, as for so many others; the knowledge of so many friends and former comrades suffering and dying is bound to have a strengthening effect on those who are left, and to make them, in a spirit of emulation, "go all out" for whatever they have to do, even if it is not quite so spectacular.

A full list of the casualties will be sent out with this issue of the magazine. We would again like to remind our readers that any information of interest to O.C.'s in general is always welcomed.

We cannot think of the casualty list without thinking of Bernard Heywood Whitley, 2nd Lieut. in the Royal Scots, who for eleven years filled a foremost place in all that went on in the school; of his work here we spoke two years ago. when he went from us to Denstone. Suffice it to say that he gave himself up at his country's call to a service which was in many ways foreign to his habits and temperament, undertaking it gladly, however, because it was the right thing to do. We venture to think that for many years, whenever O.C.'s come together, his name will be one of the first on their lips. It is almost inconceivable that he is not now as he always was, ever thinking of others before himself, and amongst the rest of those members of this school, masters and boys, whom he knew and loved, and for whom he worked. He fell on July 17th, in the Somme region. His Colonel writes as follows: "He was gallantly leading his men in a night attack; the country has lost a valuable officer, and I mourn the loss of a personal friend. The men have told me since, that nothing could equal his gallantry the night before last, and they mourn the loss of a splendid gentleman. He is buried with five others of the 11th Regt., in Caterpillar Valley just south of Longueval."

We have received the following information of the death of J. H. F. Clarke, Lieut., W. Yorks, from a fellow O.C.: "He had several bullet wounds. I was passing along the trench when he was dying. He did not recognise me, although I spoke to him. He had been leading the first assaulting platoon of his battalion. He was the first man therefore over the top. The objective was Fricourt village. You can understand it was no mean death, but of course we would rather have had him back alive. The attack took place very early in the 'Somme Push.'"

The following letter has also been received: "Sir, I am told by my Coy. Officer that you would like to be told any

details of your son's death by someone who was present. I think that as I was there myself, and no N.C.O.s are left who were there at the time, I shall be able to give more information than anyone else. I will start at the beginning and try to describe things exactly as they occurred. If my effort is poor you will excuse it as, of course, I am not quite used to writing descriptive letters. Well, you already know the date. The 7th Yorks were detailed to attack Fricourt, seize the village, and the wood beyond. The German front line ran almost parallel to our own at a distance alternating from 200 to 300 yards. The order of advance was three companies in the front line, with B Company in the centre. Nos. 4 and 5 platoons of B Company were to push forward with No 6 in close support. No 7 platoon, commanded by Mr. Clarke, were in local reserve to the Company and were not to advance until the German front line was taken. As I expect you already know, the unexpected happened, and the first two platoons were no sooner over than they were met by a withering fire from the enemy machine guns at close range. Mr. Hornsby, commanding No. 5 platoon, fell mortally wounded before they had advanced ten yards. No. 6 were now ready to advance and leave No. 7 in the trench. Mr. Hillman, command No. 6, climbed the parapet and ordered his platoon forward. He was shot immediately through the head. B Company were thus left without any officers to lead them. The Captain was wounded, and the Officer Commanding No. 8 was too far away on the left to be in touch with the right and centre. On seeing this your son immediately climbed the parapet, saying, "Follow me B. Company, I will lead." But nothing could exist under that fire, and he fell before he reached our own wire about ten yards in front of our parapet. He was brought in immediately but was past all hope and died almost at once. I think he would not have felt any pain as the wounds would

have rendered him unconscious immediately. We laid him side by side with Mr. Hillman on the fire step, and I told his servant to collect his things and send them to Headquarters. Where he was buried I could never find out, but I think that they must have both been taken away and buried behind the line. In conclusion I should like to say that no gentleman gave up his life for his men more gallantly than he did. On his own initiative he went forward to certain death because he saw the men left without a leader. He was mourned by all those who were left, as not only an officer, but also a true comrade to all his men, and I think he left a void which will never be entirely filled. Only the day before, his platoon sergeant was mortally wounded, and he accompanied him all the way to the dressing station, comforting him as far as possible. When we left, the sergeant asked Mr. Clarke to kiss him, as he had lost both arms. I know how deeply he felt that loss of his sergeant. We little thought when he re-joined us how soon we were to lose him again. Always kind and considerate to all, he still combined it with the soldierly instinct, which made him a true type of British Officer and gentleman. Now I must close, Sir, knowing how deeply you must mourn. I tender my deepest sympathy in which I am joined by the entire Company. Hoping this letter will in some way appease your natural desire for information, I will close Sir, with best wishes, yours sincerely, Pte. E. Greenwood. P.S.—Sir, on enquiry from the Reg.-Sergt.-Major, I was told that your son was buried with Mr. Hillman, near the railway which ran between the opposing trenches. The grave is marked by a white cross."

W. F. T. Dixon, 2nd Lieut., Sherwoods, who was only just nineteen, was killed in action while rallying his men at Trones Wood, on July 20th. The majority of his men were killed at the same time. Though so young, he had already

made his mark as a smart and promising officer, and died amid circumstances of great gallantry.

- H. R. Thelwell, Lieut. in the Duke of Wellington's Regt., died of wounds on July 8th. He went to the Front in November, 1914, with the 9th County of London Regt. He was invalided home from Hill 60 with a slight wound, and obtained his commission in November, 1915. He had been at the Front for two months (for the second time) when he met his death.
- W. W. Peacock was Lieut. in the Royal Engineers, 2nd in command of the 224th Coy., not K.O.Y.L.I., as reported on the Roll of Honour. He was killed in action by shell fire on August 15th last.
- B. H. Townsley, 2nd Lieut. in the West Yorks., enlisted at the outbreak of the war, in the Seaforth Highlanders (Canadian), obtained his commission in April, 1915, and before being despatched to France had seen service at Suvla Bay.
- J. C. Hodges, on leaving the school in 1914, was a 2nd Lieut. in the R.G.A. (Special Reserve) for 13 months, and then transferred to the R.F.C. He became Flying Instructor at Castle Bromwich, and on September 17th, while in the air with a pupil, his elevators became overstrained in the course of looping the loop, and he fell 3,000 feet on to the flying ground. He was buried at Curdworth, near Birmingham.

We regret to note also among a recent list of killed, R. C. Fisher-Brown, Lieut. in the 7th West Riding Regt. He was killed in France on November 13th.

J. M. R. Ellis, who died on 9th August, of a wound received while on patrol duty in "No Man's Land" near Hill 60, had been N.C.O. in the 16th Canadian Scottish, and

was promoted to a commission on June 18th, in place of an officer killed in action on that day.

Bernard Gelsthorpe is reported missing, believed killed, on September 15th or 16th. He came over last year with the 48th Canadians.

We have received the following news of E. J. W. Gray from his parents: "He has been missing since Loos, September 26th, 1915, when doubling back with his men about 1-30 p.m. We are told he was wounded in both knees, and his men do not seem to have been able to bring him in. Three other officers and from 30 to 40 men are missing also, and we hear when the Guards re-took the Hill on Sunday night the ground had been cleared. Under these circumstances we have not given up hope."

The following news of Lieut. G. C. Woodburn, of the 2nd Leicesters (not 3rd), supplied by his father from the letter of one of his brother officers: "Either C. Woodburn is wounded, missing, or prisoner. I saw him a few minutes before he led the charge made by his company. Just before we said 'Good-bye' to each other, he promised to write home for me if I should get killed, and I promised to write home for him." Later, the same officer wrote: "I want you to see Mr. Woodburn and tell him that his son is missing. Please tell him that it does not mean killed, because I think there is a good chance of his being a prisoner. Woodburn's company was to lead the charge, and his platoon was first over the trench. He was hit in the hand, but this did not stop him. He went along with revolver in hand, under a most deadly fire. His wound was hurting, because he said to his men, 'Go on, you fellows; don't wait for me. I'm all right.' Woodburn was then last seen jumping into a German trench with two men. Some say he was wounded again before he got there; he was splendid, absolutely splendid."

Congratulations to Lieut. R. H. Trippett, who has received the M.C. for "Gallantry in action and fine example to men, and attending to wounded under heavy fire." He joined the R.F.A. as gunner at the beginning of the war, and received a commission in his own brigade. Later he was transferred to the command of a Trench Mortar Battery.
