

CURRENT EVENTS.

The very numerous friends of Father James Robinson, who had been Minister at the College until the close of April last, will have learnt with great regret that he has been obliged by ill health to relinquish his work for the time being. He has been ordered three months' rest, which he is taking at Beaumont College.

Father Edward Colley, S.J., another old Stonyhurst man, who has just finished three years' service as Military Chaplain in Gallipoli, Mesopotamia, and France, has been appointed to replace him. No member of the present College staff has had as long a connection with Stonyhurst as Father Robinson.

As a boy his coming dates back to 1864. In September, 1877, he was a Prefect at Hodder, and from 1878 to 1884 he was on the teaching staff at Stonyhurst. At the conclusion of his Theological course he returned to Stonyhurst as First Prefect, an office which he retained until 1907, when he was appointed Minister.

Both as First Prefect and Minister he has left his mark on the College buildings and institutions.

To mention but a few of the improvements due to his energy and initiative we may instance the building of the Higher Line Cricket Pavilion, the construction of the upper cricket field and two football fields, and numerous improvements in the playrooms and playgrounds. To him, while First Prefect, was also due the introduction of Association Football and the foundation of the College O.T.C., or Cadet Corps, as it was called in its infancy.

As Minister, his improvements are to be seen in every portion of the fabric of the College buildings, the panelling of the Boys' Refectory, and in other rooms, the increase and tasteful arrangement of pictures in every part of the College, and other beneficial modifications and innovations too numerous to be mentioned. But we are happily not writing his obituary notice. He has, we trust, many years of good work still before him when he

makes the complete recovery which we all sincerely wish him. And we hope that he will come and spend them at Stonyhurst.

The boys returned from the Easter vacation on May 20th, an extra week having been added to the holidays by reason of a mild epidemic of colds.

An account of the Stonyhurst Association Dinner, which takes place this year at Stonyhurst, on June 21st, will appear in our July number, as our June issue will have been already in print before the dinner takes place.

The annual inspection of the O.T.C. was held on June 5th. The War Office had written kindly offering us the choice, as Inspecting Officer, of any officer of field rank among our old alumni whom we should like to select. Brigadier-General Walter Maxwell-Scott, D.S.O., was invited by us, and, although in command of a British brigade on the Rhine at the time, he applied for special leave, and came over from Germany to conduct the inspection.

Should the illustrated account of the inspection reach us too late for insertion in this issue it will appear in our July number.

We are sorry to have to announce that Sergt.-Major Marchant, who, during the past sixteen years has given universal satisfaction in his work of training the O.T.C., has decided to retire at the end of the summer term.

His successor, Sergt.-Major Lucas, Grenadier Guards, who has been training O.C.B.'s during the war, is already with us attending parades and preparing to take over the training of the O.T.C.

In our July number we hope to give a detailed account of Sergt.-Major Marchant's services, together with a portrait of him, to commemorate one who has been among the most popular and efficient of our Directors of Military Training.

An old College retainer who has a long record of service on the College farm has recently retired.

Bob Eastwood, the woodman, came to us from Chaigeley forty years ago at the age of twenty-seven. On the death of his wife, last April, he decided to go and live with his married daughter at Clitheroe.

Bob "Tite," as he was generally known, was an expert tree-feller, always in charge of the felling in our woods. A reliable, hard-working man, he frequently discharged the office of deputy farm bailiff, for which his general knowledge of farm work fitted him well. He was a cheery, genial "owd lad," always ready to crack a joke with everyone, and universally liked and respected by all who knew him.

As overseer of the coal distribution in the College he was a familiar figure to boys and community, who will miss their merry little red-bearded carrier of "coyles" and his quaint Lancashire sayings.

Many of our farm men and College servants have now returned from military service. The results are already becoming apparent in the restoration of lawns and tennis courts, which had reverted to meadows during the war, and the improved appearance of the gardens and college precincts generally.

During the war from time to time we printed the names of the Stonyhurst servants from the College and the farm who had joined the Services, together with brief obituaries of those who were killed in action. We hope, later, to supply a more complete record of their services.

In Memoriam.

ERNEST O'BRYEN (1878).

In our April number we published a brief notice of the death of Ernest O'Bryen, which occurred on April 27th, deferring a more lengthy appreciation till the present issue. But it proved too great a shock for a constitution undermined, no doubt, by the extra stress of war work undertaken in addition to the claims of his private business. Not many men retain the vitality, after years of service in the East, to throw themselves vigorously and successfully into business. Ernest O'Bryen's success as a business man and a member of the local administrative bodies of his borough was conspicuous, as evidenced by his repeated election as Mayor of Hampstead throughout the whole period of the war.

After leaving Stonyhurst as a boy he entered Cooper's Hill College to prepare for the Indian Forest Service. His service in the East was spent in Upper-Burmah. He retired from this in 1897, and married Miss Gertrude Pursell. From 1913 till his death he was Mayor of Hampstead, being the first Catholic to hold that position. In 1916 he was president of the Stonyhurst Association and a vice-president of the London Circle of the Catenian Association. His activities during the war included much good work for the feeding and accommodation of Belgian refugees in his borough, and the organization and equipment of hospitals of the British Red Cross and St. John's Ambulance.

During his terms of office as Mayor of Hampstead he took a prominent part in raising the 183rd Howitzer Brigade and the 138th and 139th Heavy Batteries of Royal Garrison Artillery.

He had always displayed a keen interest in his old school, to which he was a frequent and welcome visitor, and where he has many friends who deeply regret his loss.

The Tablet for May 3rd contains the following appreciation of him:—

"The Catholic body in London has suffered a severe loss by the death of Alderman Ernest O'Bryen," writes one who knew him. "The number of Catholic laymen who take a prominent share in London public life is unfortunately not very large, and the untimely death of one who had achieved such a notable success as to be elected six times in succession Mayor of the borough of Hampstead, in which he lived, must fill with deepest regret all those interested in Catholic social effort in the Metropolis. Those who had the privilege of knowing Ernest O'Bryen intimately were not surprised that he secured the confidence and the esteem of his fellow workers, both Catholic and non-Catholic. An able administrator, with a sound judgment, a strong resolution, a persuasive manner, and a power of appropriate silence—the last a valuable gift in public life, his two outstanding qualities were perhaps his loyalty and his generosity of service. He was loyal, most loyal, to his religious beliefs and practices, loyal to his country, loyal to his friends, and loyal to those co-operating with him. His fellow Catholics know of his loyalty to his religion: Hampstead marked its appreciation of his loyalty to his country at the beginning of the war by re-electing him as Mayor five times to see the war through; many like the writer have experienced his loyalty to his friends, which showed itself in times of anxiety and difficulty, not in word service but in practical form; whilst of his loyalty to those co-operating with him his record in public life and in many Catholic organizations with which he was connected will bear willing witness.

"His great generosity of service has undoubtedly contributed to his breakdown in health. Few London Mayors have exceeded his standard of effort as first citizen of a London borough throughout the difficult period of the national emergency. His achievements in connection with the Prince of Wales Fund, Red Cross and St. John's Ambulance Work, Belgian Refugees, recruiting for Kitchener's Army and the Derby Scheme, the Hampstead Tribunal for exemptions from military service, of which he was Chairman, the War Loan Campaign, the Food Economy Campaign and the provision of allotments-all are in the records of Hampstead public life, and it is to be deeply regretted that he has not lived to receive the official recognition of these services, which he so richly merited. The Catholic body in London, certainly, may be proud of the excellent record of public service for the common good which a Catholic layman has achieved.

"Of his Catholic work it is unnecessary to write at length. The Catholic Federation, in its early days, the Catenian Society, the Stonyhurst Association, Catholic elementary schools, have all benefited by his charity and able administrative co-operation."

CORNELIUS NASH (1913).

We were all very sorry to hear of the unexpected death of Cornelius Nash, which took place on April 25th. He had left Stonyhurst at the end of April, 1918, on account of ill health. It was hoped that a few months rest would restore him to health and enable him to join his class. But his malady was more serious than had been suspected, and what had been thought to be no more perhaps than a mild chest complaint rapidly developed into acute consumption. He was a quiet, good-natured boy, popular with everyone. We offer our sincere sympathy to his relatives in their sad bereavement.

CAPT. EDMUND DE PENTHENY O'KELLY (1871).

A brief notice of the death of Captain de Pentheny O'Kelly appeared in our last issue (February), on page 608. We supply here some supplementary details which were kindly sent to us by his brother Renfric:—

"Captain Edmund de Pentheny-O'Kelly, F.R.G.S., F.S.A., was born in 1861 at Secunderabad, in India, the eldest son of the late Lieut.-Colonel de Penthenv-O'Kelly, 17th Lancers and A.P.D., and of Mrs. de Pentheny-O'Kelly, of Dun Esk, Westgate-on-Sea. He was educated at Stonyhurst, going first to Hodder, in 1872, with his younger brother Raymond, who was later killed in the South African War. He spent his early years in Fiji, sugar planting, afterwards becoming Inspector of Agriculture in Australia and Queensland. In 1897-8 he commanded an exploring expedition through the unknown Hinterland of Sierra Leone, making maps, roads, and laying down light railways. He served through the Hut Tax Rebellion of 1898-9. From West Africa he came home to serve in the South African War, going out as Captain in the 6th Lancashire Fusiliers (Militia), during which period he was Deputy Commissioner of the Orange River Colony, but owing to a long and severe attack of enteric fever he was invalided home. In 1914, being above age, and holding the rank of Major, he served on home duty in the European War, being Recruiting Officer, and later attached to the Army Labour Corps, in both of which branches he did valuable work. His brother, Henry Arundell, who was killed at Ypres in 1915, was also a Stonyhurst boy. Edmund married in 1890 Sophia, daughter of His Honour Judge Forbes, and grand-daughter of Sir Francis Forbes, K.C.M.G., by whom he had one son. Both survive him."

He died very suddenly in London on February 14th, 1919, after an attack of influenza. He had been demobilised a few months before his death.

VARIA.

THE PORTRAIT OF FATHER BERNARD VAUGHAN.

The following cutting is reprinted from "The Tablet" of May 11, 1919:—

Father Bernard Vaughan, S.J., was presented with his portrait, in oils, in the presence of a crowded audience, in Our Lady's Hall, Johnson Street, Commercial Road, E., on Thursday evening last week. For many years, Father Vaughan has taken considerable interest in the parish of St. Mary and St. Michael, and was instrumental in the establishment of Our Lady's Hall as a club for the men. He spends part of his time every week, when in town. in visiting the homes of the poor; and he took a large share in the organization of the parochial Guild of the Blessed Sacrament, which, before the war, numbered a thousand men. The portrait, which was handed to Father Vaughan by Dr. Reidy and Mr. Berg, bore the inscription: "Presented with esteem, love and gratitude to our Father and Friend by East End workers and their children." It will go to Stonyhurst.

Canon Ring, who presided, paid a tribute to Father Vaughan as the finest type of priest, whose influence (said the Canon) reached sections and communities reached by no other English-speaking ecclesiastic. Further tributes were added by Mr. Donovan (head master), Councillor Brennan, Mr. Richard Tottenham, Mr. D. Whelton, and Mr. E. Sexton.

Father Bernard Vaughan expressed his thanks, and said he was pleased to have the portrait that he might pass it on to Stonyhurst, where he had received an education which he had found very useful in Commercial Road. He was glad to think that in that great refectory there would be one portrait of an old Stonyhurst boy as a memorial of his close and affectionate relations with the East End of London.

He hoped that he should have started a tradition at Stonyhurst and that when he went to the West. sinking like the sun, others brought up at that College would follow in his steps and carry on the tradition which he had tried to start. It was rather a serious matter for a man to look back over seventythree years, but he was comforted by the thought that, after such long service, God would treat him generously and chivalrously. He had tried to inspire the people of the East End with a sense of their mission on earth, to teach them to be full of pluck and courage, and to energize for God and country. They must push to the front-not wait to be pushed there. Father Vaughan went on to speak of the relations between capital and labour, remarking that capital was beginning to realize what labour had realized long ago-that they must be partners in the firm. Men did not want to be mere pistons, cogs, or wheels in the machinery. They wanted to understand the machinery of life; they wanted an ethical position as well as an economic one. Democracy and labour were coming into their own. Speaking of the Peace terms, he said: "We are top-dog; the Peace terms are before the country, and if they are enforced they will do well enough. But, of course, the Hun never did wrong; he never wanted war; and it is he who is being imposed upon. Our terms to the enemy, compared with the terms which he would have imposed had he been top-dog, are chivalrous and magnanimous."

Father A. L. Cortie, S.J., said he had lived most of his life in the stars, and it came as a revelation to him to see the affection which everybody in the East End had for Father Vaughan. He had observed through the telescope stars of various magnitudes, but he had never observed a "star" of such magnitude as Father Vaughan. All at Stonyhurst would prize that picture of their distinguished alumnus, and it would be a great link between the College and the parish of St. Mary and St. Michael, and an incentive to the boys to do something for their poorer brethren.

The presentation was made during an interval in an attractive concert programme.

CHATS WITH THE "ADMIRAL."

With Two Illustrations by ROBERT FRÉMOND, of the French Field Artillery.

The "Admiral" who figures in these reminiscences is no naval dignitary in blue and gold, but a simple Norman fisherman. A facetious French journalist, describing a portly German general at the Armistice meeting, referred to him as a "colosse à l'allure d'hippopotame." My burly, jovial, rubicund friend, Léon Duclos, the so-called "Admiral" of the Etretat fishing fleet, combines the heavy build of the hippo, with the vivacity of a very young monkey. As a raconteur his gesticulations and expressive facial contortions would make his fortune on any stage, and his yarns are always salted with a racy sense of humour. Force of character, geniality and superior seamanship have raised him to a position of unsought influence among his fellow mariners, or "loups de mer," as he humorously describes them, and this, although he actually owns only five of the total of some thirty craft on the beach.

By the inhabitants of the town he is also regarded as their premier citizen, whom they annually elect first of the members of the "conseil municipal."

Alone of all the Etretatais he wears the Médaille d'Honneur de la Marine, conferred on him by the French Government for eminent qualities as a man and a citizen. Yet the good fellow remains a simple, unspoiled, hard-working fisherman; for he loves his trade, which he would not exchange, he never tires of telling you, for the office of President of the Republic. He is the first up in the morning, and goes round calling all his mates. Nothing bores him more than to have to rig himself on Sundays in a landsman's kit. "Oh! those collars and ties and coat, how uncomfortable they are! I cannot

"When Louis and I went to Paris for the Exhibition in 1900 (Louis Duclos, the "Vice-Admiral," is his cousin and alter ego, a sort of Watson to his Sherlock Holmes), "oh! how we were ennuyés! We went at the invitation of our friend, the Senator, M. Casimir Périer. To keep ourselves alive we must take a row on the Seine in a small boat for two hours every day. Enfin, I could not stand it any longer. The last day of our visit we were to spend with the Casimir Périers at Maisons Lafitte for the races. But I sent them word that I was indisposed, and returned home two days earlier."

breathe freely till I throw them off." During his rare

visits to Paris he feels himself a fish out of water.

You will meet many of their countrymen who regard Norman fishermen in general as mere thriftless, bibulous rum-puncheons—picturesque appendages of the seaside, no doubt, when viewed from a distance, but not worth closer acquaintance. A few chats with the Admiral would speedily change their views.

Discerning visitors to Étretat soon discover that he is the character of the place. Well-known statesmen, artists, and men of letters have found him out and enjoyed his company.

He alludes to some of these rarely, and only when their names arise naturally in conversation. Thus, speaking of Canada, he would say to me, "Did you ever meet a Mr. Laurier, a Canadian-a politician, I think?"

"What, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada?" " C'est ça'; well, he used to come in here and chat with me over a cup of coffee. A 'brave homme,' He used to spend all his time with us fishermen."

"How the English love swimming! Take your English minister, Mr. McKenna, for example. 'Ah! s'il était nageur!' He used to go in my boat for his morning swim. From the Falaise d'Aval to the Falaise d'Amont he would swim and back, and many times; 'un phoque, cet homme.' 'Mais les Anglais,' they do not fear the water, 'ni messieurs

les Américains, non plus.' When the waves are mountainous and the sea moutonneuse they will say, 'Père Léon, the sea looks nice; I go swim.'"

"You remember last summer the two American nurses who missed being drowned. It was a storm, but they would bathe. One fainted, and the other could not beach her for the waves. My brother Achille and I must plunge in to save them. Pouf! how it was cold! Mais (with a sly twinkle in his eye), 'c'était un beau sauvetage, parcequ'alles étaient très belles, toutes les deux "—a sally which was greeted by a laughing chorus of "Oh! Pappa!" from his three daughters, Marie, Victoire and Blanche.*

The Admiral is an enthusiastic admirer of the English; "for, are we not the same race, we Normans and you other English; we are also both gens de mer, we."

The exploit of the British Fleet at Zeebrugge delighted him.

"Oh! Oh!! Oh!!! Quels marins!" (Three Oh's crescendo always introduced an expression of intense admiration or astonishment).

And how eloquent was his disgust at the surrender of the German fleet.

"Quelle rendition! Comme votre amiral l'a bien appelée horrible!"

Many of our English ways appealed to him. "I like your English customs. For example, what you do with the mistletoe at Christmas. I find this very beautiful. Indeed (with a quizzical glance), I wish I had known of it in my youth."

Another "Oh! Pappa!" from the three daughters, and the merry old sea-hippo shook and wriggled with laughter.

He loved the give and take of chaff with his family, but he knew how to play the skipper on his own quarter-deck. In the midst of the merry chatter, if he heard an unkind word about a neighbour, his smile would vanish, and a curt, stern, "no criticism of neighbours in my house, please," would check the shamefaced offender.

"When I was young," he continued, "I served my time in the French navy. My admiral chose me to be his 'ordonnance' (batman), and I well remember meeting then your Queen Victoria.

"The admiral, he said to me one day, 'Duclos, I am going to Cherbourg to-night to meet the Queen of England; will you come?"

'Mais, volontiers, mon amiral.'

"Well, behold us waiting on the pier at midnight, the admiral and I, in the middle of a group of 'grosses tetes et gros légumes.' The boat arrives, the admiral advances, and I behind him. I hear a 'magnifique frou-frou' of a silk dress, and behold the admiral bowing low over the hand of a 'grande dame' in black. I slipped my hand down beside the admiral's leg and touched her skirt. Afterwards the admiral said, 'Well, Duclos, did you get a good view of the Queen?'

'Yes, Admiral,' I said, 'and I even touched her skirt with my hand.'"

Père Léon's three stalwart sons, Léon, Henri, and Léopold, are serving in the French navy during the war. In this connection his fellow-citizens relate with affectionate pride the story of the return of his son Léon on leave after two years' absence, and how Père Léon accorded him a reception "vraiment digne d'un père romain."

Henri Duclos had been one of the crew of the ill-fated *Provence*, torpedoed off Gallipoli, with the loss of many lives.

Young Duclos, on reaching home, was confronted on the doorstep by his father who, to his surprise, coldly motioned him to stand back.

"Before I welcome you," said the old man, "explain to me how it was that so many of the passengers in your ship were drowned, and yet you, a member of the crew, saved yourself?"

"Mais, Pappa," replied the boy, " avant de me sauver, j'ai sauvé dix-sept passagers."

Then he got a warm welcome.

Young Duclos was an expert swimmer, and in describing his escape to me afterwards, he told how, after four hours in the water, he joined a boatload of survivors, and spent the best part of a day and night in a small open boat in heavy weather before they were picked up. An engineer petty officer, the senior member of the crew present, took command, and in his ignorance of navigation ordered them to make for the nearest land, 150 miles distant. Duclos and his sailor mates knew better. Pretending to obey, they rowed in circles over the spot where the ship went down, knowing that the S.O.S. sent out after she was struck would attract the rescuers.

Many of the pleasantest evenings I passed in France were spent at the Admiral's fireside, discoursing of fish and folk.

"Entrez, M. l'Aumônier, assoyez-vous," he would say in his Norman patois; or, if we arrived together he always stood back with the polite "donnez-vous la peine d'entrer le premier," a courtesy no fisherman ever omits.

I remember one occasion on which their politeness was put to a severe test. I had arranged a little dinner to some local originals, the characters of the town. Of course the Admiral and Vice-Admiral were invited, with the Brigadier (corporal) of gendarmes, the Deputy-Mayor (a plumber), and the Syndic des gens de mer (coastguard official responsible for the enforcement of the Fishery laws), and mine host, the inn-keeper of the auberge, who dined with us. Some American officers were present, including their Colonel. The latter, wishing to propose the health of our guests in French, asked me sotto voce the French for "to clink glasses."

"Choquez," or "trinquez," I whispered. Unfortunately he mixed the two words, and raising his glass, shouted "Crachez" (spit). I saw the Ad-

miral's neck swell and his face take on a deeper shade of purple. The others were making similar efforts at self-suppression. Leaning over to the Colonel, I hastily "put him wise." His hearty laugh broke the spell, and the guests roared with uncontrollable merriment.*

The moment an honoured guest enters the Admiral's cottage he is assailed by an avalanche of alcoholic temptations. "Un verre de bon cidre, de vieux Cavados," wine, rum, cognac, or a "chassebrouillard," or "fog-chaser." This last, a cup of hot coffee laced with rum or brandy is a "pick-me-up" which all good Etretat mariners consume at the Café des Marins before a cruise, and repeat the dose on their return.

"But you must not think that we fishermen are heavy drinkers. Of course there are vauriens in every community who warm their ears too often, but few are really zig-zag. A little rum is good to keep out cold by land and sea, and a sovereign remedy for la grippe. We fishermen, as becomes people constantly in danger, are very dévotieux. Every boat in the fleet has a religious name taken from the titles of the Blessed Virgin, or the saints, or such invocations as 'Dieu le Protège.' As we push off from land the patron (skipper) of each boat says a pater and ave, and all the crew respond. On Sundays, when the mauvais temps prevents us from going to sea, we all attend mass in the morning and vespers in the afternoon.

"Le bon Dieu made cider as a drink for mariners. It goes well with all things, especially fish. We call cider 'boisson,' the drink 'par excellence.' And you know our proverb: 'Poisson sans boisson est poisson.' In fact most other drinks go well with fish also, especially rum, and if a devil helped to make rum he was no very bad devil either, for rum is the liquid fuel of the mariner when the seas put out his stove."

And here he mentioned a quaint little example of the rum ritual. "The first herring caught by each boat every season is lifted up solemnly and

receives a mouthful of rum. This fish is called 'le Dieu bénit.' Then the rum jar is passed round, and all the fishermen in the boat drink his health."

The herring season of 1918 has beaten all local records for the prices realised. During last November in two successive nights, fishing with one small smack, the Admiral made 7,000 and 10,000 francs. All herrings are sold on the beach the moment the boat lands, whether by day or night, the auctioneer being called out of bed for this purpose by the "mousse-de-terre," or land cabin-boy, a curious term to use for a woman, as soon as she sights her boat signalling off the land.

The mousse-de-terre of the Admiral's firm is his sister-in-law, tante Blanche, an apple-cheeked, weather-beaten dame. This tough old mermaid keeps watch in all weathers through the night in a "caloge," or superannuated, roofed-in fishing smack perched high on the shingle. When she sees the signal, so many flashes of a torch from the boat at sea, she trudges round to call the wives of the crew, knocking at their doors or windows with the cry, "Allons viller" (patois for virer), which means, "Come and turn the capstan," by which the boat is hauled up the steep incline of shingle out of reach of the waves.

Each boat must provide so many women to work its capstan, and the "mousse-de-terre" shows a coloured light at the water's edge to guide her to her own moorings.

In all weathers the "mousse-de-terre" is at her post in her "caloge," with her feet on a "chaufferette" (a metal box containing live charcoal), * and her eyes scanning the horizon. For this service she receives a substantial share of the proceeds of the catch.

Owing to the steep shelving beach and unprotected harbour of Etretat its fleet cannot set sail or land in rough weather. Naturally these fishermen are expert weather prophets, especially those among them who have made the eight months' trip

to Newfoundland with the Fécamp cod fleet. These old salts can predict bad weather from the very bearing of the sea-gulls, as a shepherd foretells rain from the behaviour of his sheep.

"Ah, v'là les muettes," one would say, pointing to the gulls. "How they fly listlessly and their wings droop. "Ils ont pris un ris." We shall have "sale temps." They have taken in a reef, and we may expect dirty weather.

Many and strange are the yarns they spin of the "Terreneuviers," or Newfoundland fishermen, whose fleet has sailed from Fécamp for two hundred years and more to visit those distant fishing grounds.

How hard the life was of old, and how in one season as many as eighty out of their 130 vessels were wrecked by the storms. This happened off Iceland in a snowstorm, when all their compasses went wrong. There is some magnetism là-bas which unsettles the needles. And they had other enemies besides storms—thrasher whales, who smashed their dorys as one would crack nuts, etc. Strange fish they encountered there—the Espadon, or swordfish, who pursued whales till their pathetic "gémissements" could be heard for miles.

The "Estimbecque" (I cannot identify this fish), if pricked with a knife, or otherwise "embêté" will crush his own liver out of pure spite.

But the war raised up other and more formidable foes to the sadly diminished fleet that sailed from Fécamp for Newfoundland during the past four years. The German submarines took their toll of these poor slow sailing craft. But there were bold men aboard some of them who snapped their fingers at the pirates, trusting to good seamanship and the keen-eyed marksman behind their long, quick-firing gun.

In a fishing-tackle shop at Fécamp I met one of these sturdy heroes, a stocky little skipper named Maillat. Across the breast of his black Sunday jersey he wore the ribbon of the Croix-de-Guerre and the Médaille Militaire.

Three times attacked by different U-boats, he had beaten them off and made them plunge, perhaps damaged them—who knows? Anyhow, more than

one had dived, leaving the tell-tale "tache d'huile" on the surface, he told me.

When I met him he had been promoted from the post of fishing skipper to the command of "La Dame Blanche," the yacht of the late King Edward VII., now converted into a patrol boat to convoy his fellow "Terreneuviers."

During the first months of the war a German submarine, the U-16, bobbed up beside Léon's boat in the little cove of Étretat. In those days the Huns did not sink fishing smacks.

"We stared at them, and they at us, and then they plunged, and we went quick, I assure you."

In the summer of 1918 another U-boat appeared off Étretat, rising this time among the fishing smacks of Yport, the neighbouring fishing village. A rifle shot from the deck of the submarine summoned all craft to heave to and stand by. Then the Germans came alongside each in turn, took off the crews, robbed them of their jerseys, boots, caps, watches, etc., and seized all their fish and food. From one who was better dressed than the others they took even his trousers.

Then they photographed them, "pauvres malheureux." Meanwhile a wrecking gang from the submarine had gone on board each smack, and after collecting everything useful scuttled the boats with blows of an axe.

The crew of this submarine were very badly dressed, including the captain, whose trousers were a network of patches.

"Oh! how they were hungry; and they threw themselves upon our food. Like wolves they were. And the captain, he was old, old with grey hair, and yet he was polite and even 'sympathique.' Seeing a little 'mousse' who was crying with fear, he patted him on the head, saying, 'Don't cry, my child; I am going to put you all ashore in one of your own boats."

"Suddenly a French armed trawler hove in sight and fired a shot or two. Three smacks had been sunk, and a fourth was being stripped at the time, "The submarine captain promptly ordered us into this fourth boat; we were twenty-two in all, and a tight fit, but happy to be alive, I assure you.

"Then he wished us 'bon voyage,' and moved off 'à la surface' without diving, returning the fire of the trawler from his deck guns. Seventy-six shots the trawler fired at the submarine, and all misses; and the submarine she escaped, still all the time on the surface."

I gleaned the details given above from the crew of one of the sunken smacks. They had come to Etretat to take over a boat which "le bon Père Léon," as they called him in their gratitude, was providing to replace their own. He had first taken them to his cottage and drowned their sorrows in kindly rum. When I last saw them he was chaffing them as he took them aboard for a sail to Fécamp to hand them over the boat's papers at the Ministry of Marine.

"Will they be able to pay you for the boat, Léon?" I heard someone ask.

"Some day, perhaps, if they can. If not, qu'importe? C'est la guerre."

The old man's generosity was well known, and every needy French "poilu" on leave in Etretat would drift into the Admiral's house before leaving for the front and be sure of receiving a "chasse-brouillard" and a present of money.

For "les patriotes" who fought for France he could not do too much, but how he despised "les embusqués."

"Why don't you write to M. X—," I said to him once, mentioning a mutual friend, an influential old gentleman who visited Étretat every year.

"You must know, M. l'Aumônier, that in France when one writes a letter to a friend politeness demands that one ask after his family—his sons, for example. Now the son of Monsieur X— is an 'embusqué.' He is a strong, healthy young man who has shirked military service. He sits at his ease in a bureau in Paris. He suffers from 'battements de coeur. Pensez-vous! un grand jeune homme comme celui-là, battements de coeur!' We fishermen are 'fiers,' self-respecting. We cannot ask after

such a one, so I don't write to his father, though he is my friend."

"You have heard of the rich Monsieur N—, who owns property here, and is a judge in Paris, but still young. He came here in a beautiful smart uniform, a captain of the État-major, a soldier but a soldat de bureau—a Parisian bureau. He meets old Père Tonnetot, who has two sons in the trenches. 'Ah, bon jour, mon brave Tonnetot,' he says, and how are your sons?' 'Not so smart as you are, my captain, when they came to me from the trenches.' The old Père Tonnetot said it to him straight, just like that."

"When I was a lad," said the Admiral, harking back to herring, "the approach of the herring shoals was heralded by the spouting of whales, who followed them.

"As-tu vu le gros pesson?" one would ask another excitedly. In our patois we say "pesson" for poisson." The whale was the "big fish."

"The herring is a very punctual fish, usually keeping his annual engagements to the very day. If the weather is fine and cold you may expect him here exactly on the first of November; if stormy, within ten days after that date, but never later.

"On February the 22nd, never a day sooner or later, they all disappear, going north. You may fill your nets with herring on February 21st, but never a fish will you catch next day. This is the very truth. I tell you 'sans serment.'"

In an article in the Fishing Gazette for July 6th, 1918, entitled "Human Fish Sleuths," I described the peculiar faculty these fishermen claim to possess of perceiving, while at sea, the proximity and probable direction of the herring shoals by their sense of smell. In each boat during the herring season one of their number, selected by reason of the superior acuteness of his sense of smell, is placed on the watch for the shoals. He is called the "odorateur," or "senteur," and on receipt of his signal that he smells herring the nets are let down under his directions.

"We expect to get mackerel about April 1st, when the gorse is in flower, but they are not so punctual as the herring.

"The reason why you can net him in Spring is because he goes blind in winter, and a film—in patois 'la taie'—covers his eyes. While the film is complete he rests on the bottom, and then only trawlers can scrape him up. Later on an everwidening half-moon shaped crevice opens in the film, and then he can see a little and swims higher in the water. Then the drift nets and the seine nets get him, for he cannot yet see well enough to avoid them altogether.

"Towards summer the film falls away, and he sees the nets and then you can only catch him with the baited hook, though occasionally you may sweep him up in seine nets along the beach if the water is not too clear.

"Cod, conger eels, dog-fish and bass come and go with the herrings, but with no such regularity as to arrival and departure.

"How the dog-fish swarm after the herring! Ma foi!! The water at night is often phosphorescent with their wicked little gleaming eyes. Until they disappear the fishermen do not expect heavy hauls, for these pirates disperse the shoals and tear the nets to get at the captive fish."

The fishermen here eat the spotted dog-fish, 'Vache-de-mer,' or 'Roussette,' and profess to find it good, but they will not themselves eat the grey dog-fish, though it is sold on the beach for country folk and the fish shops in large towns. Fortunately, at the approach of cold weather the dog-fish disperse to seek warmer seas.

Another who dislikes extreme cold is the conger eel. Many a time in the course of a continuous hard frost one can pick up dead and dying congers on the surface of the water along the coast. The cold has swelled or burst their bladders."

Père Léon was the first in this part of Normandy to discover that turbot could be caught by hand lines similar to those used for conger. Hitherto they had been netted. "We know the bottom of the sea off this coast," he tells me, "better than a farmer knows his fields. At considerable depths we can drop our lines exactly into the 'creux,' or sandy crevasses in the rocks where turbot, plaice, soles, etc., congregate, with absolute exactness, or drop nets round the 'creux' to catch them as they come out.

"Turbot are very regular in their habits. They are to be found in the 'creux' until June 15th, when they all leave to spawn on the flats.

"Plaice, sole, brill, and ray arrive about May 23rd, and leave to go out further to sea at the end of August."

"Why did you not get as good a catch as Léon Vatinel to-day, Léon?" I would ask him. "Because j'ai manqué les creux." He missed the crevices; the current had swept his nets past these fish caves.

The Vatinels are an old fisherfolk family in Etretat, and also famous boat-builders. All the boats on the beach were built by the Vatinel family, even the blunt-nosed old tubs now used as 'caloges,' or sheds for fishing tackle, with penthouse roofs and doors in the side. Formerly the fishermen all lived in these ancestral thatched caloges, which had been the sea homes of their great grandfathers, and now served their descendants as houses ashore.

Gervais Vatinel, the present boat-builder, surveys the beach with legitimate pride as he points out that everything on it was built by himself, his father, his grandfather, his great-grandfather, and greatgreat-grandfather, all of whom were boat-builders of Étretat.

"Before the war," said the Admiral, "I had almost given up going to sea, and my three sons worked my boats. When they were mobilised I began again at the age of fifty-five. But it is a hard life for an old man, and when my sons come back I shall not go so often. But then, 'après la guerre.' I shall attach motors to my boats, and then life will be easier.

"I had one motor boat before the war, but it blew up in Havre docks. When I came to after being stunned by the explosion, I said to the gendarme who supported me, 'How are my men?' 'All safe, Père Léon,' said he. But I answered, 'Look at Jouan; he is wounded; his face is covered with blood.'

"What do you think it was? My good Jouan was a little burnt on the face, and they daubed him with gooseberry jam. It is a wonderful remedy for burns, they tell me, but it looked very terrible."

"At one time the lobsters of Étretat were famous for size and quality, but some ten years ago came a vast horde of large cuttlefish and wiped out all the lobsters along the coast, so that for some years there were very few. You must know that the lobster fears the cuttlefish above all else. When the 'homard' sees the 'pieuvre' he falls down in a faint.

"I have often seen a cuttlefish near a lobster pot and all the lobsters inside lying in a dead faint with their claws extended. The cuttlefish sucks the lobster quite empty, and when you pick him up there is no meat inside.

"Oh, the 'pieuvres,' they are 'malins.' They will build themselves little houses of gravel with a small hole for a window, through which they look with one eye only. But the fish-offal outside these houses give them away, and we look for the eye and kill them.

"Happily for us the winter which followed the invasion of the cuttlefish was very cold, and the chill water killed them all. But for some years after we had very few lobsters and crabs."

The local fishermen much prefer crabs to lobsters, and on their rare picnics in the country they always take crabs with them for lunch.

During a dinner which the Admiral gave in my honour on my return from the front in the latter part of October last, I observed a delicious salmi of crab prepared by his daughter, Marie, an expert cook. "But, Léon, if you will pardon me," I observed, "you told me that crabs were out of season after August." "But you must understand me, M. l'Aumônier," he explained, "that I spoke of crabs caught at sea. These are rock crabs, and they are good always. There are families here who have the secret of many creux among the rocks along the coast where you will always find crabs. In the rock

sides of the flaques d'eaux, or pools, left among the rocks at low tide are little holes, or crab-caves, artificially made hundreds of years ago by those who knew where crabs like to live. These hiding-places are handed down for generations in particular families, and the secret is jealously kept. When they are searching these hiding-places they will stop if they see anyone approaching. I myself do not know them. And it is curious, too, that of two pools side by side within a few metres of one another, the holes in one will always contain good, eatable crabs, and in the other inferior, watery beasts. These crabs for dinner are good. They were given me by my friend, Père Tonnetot, whose family has inherited many secret crab creux."

Like all well-to-do Norman fishermen, the Admiral can give a surprisingly good dinner. But oh! beware the insidious custom of the "trou Normand," or Norman hole or gap. This is a liqueur glass of rum or brandy served between each course. It is supposed to make or stop a gap between the courses.

The Admiral, however, is a temperate man, and never expects his guests to attempt too many "trous."

Moreover, the cider flows freely, and that is supposed to neutralise the more heady drinks. Fish naturally forms the staple of these meals, the meat being veal, or, when obtainable, chicken. Everything is cooked in good butter, even roast chicken being basted with it. When describing the cooking of various fish the Admiral's recipe invariably includes the item, "avec de bon beurre"—reminding one of Izaak Walton's insistence on this ingredient in his fish recipes. Mackerel and herring are always grilled over charcoal, being basted the while avec de bon beurre. Turbot is served with cream and caper sauce, and even the miserable ray or skate becomes eatable in his sauce of black butter.

All during dinner the Admiral maintains an interesting flow of conversation, enlivened by gesticulation so vigorous that he sometimes upsets bottles of wine and dishes of sauce, etc., amidst the amused, "Oh, là, là, Pappa!" of his daughters.

Of course, fish lore is his main subject, diversified with reminiscences of people he has known, and events of interest in the history of the village. "We fishermen," he will tell you, "would not thank you for many of the meals landsmen eat. For example, some of the 'grosses tetes' (important people), who come in here for a chat with me had 'magnifiques chasses,' and used to send me presents of game, such as pheasants and hare and venison and wild boar. But my wife (now dead) would not often trouble to cook them. She would give them away to neighbours and have the fish we like best instead.

"Most of the fishermen only eat meat once a week, on Sundays. Fish builds a man up, and warms his blood, especially mackerel, herring, cod, and turbot."

The mention of game suggested poachers, and I asked him if there were many about.

"Before the war I knew of some expert poachers. Rabbits and hares were their favourite game. Our most noted village poacher was a 'drôle de bonhomme, called Fatras or Fatars, quel drôle de nom, isn't it?" Here all the family laughed at the name which apparently sounds comical in French. "Well, this fellow feared no man, and all the gendarmes were afraid of him. He would stroll round the village, gun in hand, with a string of rabbits over his shoulder, and if he saw the gendarmes he would play with the trigger of his gun, and caution them to keep away from him. Of course, they could not arrest him while the rabbits were on his back; for, by French law, you cannot be arrested for possessing game till you put them down on the ground or off your person. 'Eh, b'en,' when war broke out, Fatras was called up and went to the front. He was away for three years, and when I next saw him here on leave he was holding himself proudly, his chest expanded, and on it the ribbons of the Médaille Militaire and the Croix-de-Guerre, with several 'belles citations.' It appears that he had done fine things at the front, especially at Verdun, and he was now a corporal. After congratulating him on his return and his citations, I asked him slyly, 'And how about the poaching?' Did you get any rabbits là-bas?'

He struck his chest with a mighty gesture. 'Done with! Finished!' he shouted. 'Pas encore de pareilles betises pour moi.' After the war I shall marry and take up a respectable business—perhaps even become a gendarme—who knows?'

"The only game I ever come across," the Admiral continued, "are the partridges that fly down over the cliffs on to the beach. Of course they are too stupid to know how to fly up again. They never think of flying a little out to sea and then turning and rising gradually; so they keep bumping up against the cliffs till we land and pick them up, for our cliffs are very high.

"On the highest point of that cliff you see over there we once had a strange funeral. It was a Maharajah of India, who died here, the uncle of the present Maharajah of Gwalior. His body was incinerated on the cliff, and one of his Indian courtiers, or priests, threw a handful of ashes to the four winds, thus-North, South, East, and West. And they enclosed some ashes in an old silver thurible, bought at the marchand d'antiquités, which they gave as a souvenir to our old village doctor who attended him in his last illness. You see the doctor had been very attentive and polite to him while he was ill. Being a 'savant,' and fond of reading, he had read up for the occasion all about the religious rites of the Hindus when they are sick and dying; so he knew what to do. Just before the Maharajah died the French interpreter with him asked the doctor to warn the family and servants when he thought the Maharajah was at the point of death and had only a few minutes to live. This the doctor did, and immediately the attendants threw themselves upon the dying man, pulled off all his clothes, and put under his head a stone and a bag of earth. Then they produced a bottle of water of the Ganges and sprinkled his body with it. All this the doctor watched attentively, and when they had finished he bowed and said very politely, 'And now, gentlemen, would you not like that your master die holding in his hand the tail of a cow? I have brought the cow with me, and she is even now waiting below in the rez-de-chaussée.' The Indians thanked him very much, but said that in the case of

this Maharajah it would not be necessary, as he was a Mahratta, and as such a 'simple guerrier.' Had he been a Brahmin his soul could not pass away in peace except through the tail of a cow as the doctor has so thoughtfully suggested.

"All this the doctor will tell you, and he still keeps the silver thurible with the ashes of the Maharajah as a souvenir."

I may add that the doctor's account of the episode, which he gave me afterwards, bore out Léon's, description in every detail.

These "chats" have been hastily thrown together in the leisure intervals of a busy, distracting life, and I cannot help feeling that in them I have done scant justice to a very original and charming character. The impossibility of conveying in writing, or even by illustrations Père Léon's inimitable gestures which so wonderfully enliven all he says, would alone serve to make all descriptive effort seem lifeless and unconvincing to one who knows him.

Étretat is a beautiful place and well worth a summer visit if only for the joy of knowing the "Admiral" of its fishing fleet.

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The Editor of the new edition of the Lists will be very grateful to anyone who can help him to ascertain the dates of departure of boys whose names appear in the accompanying list. Of the 8,000 names upon the books a few are still crying for notice, and it is hoped that with an effort on the part of Old Alumni, we shall be able to publish, if not an exact, at least an approximate date for the arrival and departure of every Stonyhurst boy.

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
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
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
