

EDITORIAL.

"Business as Usual" is, we take it, a motto no less applicable to Editors than to other people, hence we set about the task of composing our third Editorial with determination; but all the same we find it rather difficult in these stirring times to avoid filling our first column and a half with an exposition of our own, doubtless, valuable views on the war and the strategy thereof. Such seems to be the privilege and self-conceived duty of most of the Editors in this country at the present time, but though this may be right and proper for them, there is no doubt that for us to follow their example would be "Business as very Unusual"; so we shall content ourselves with our ordinary topics, only mentioning the war as it concerns Ellesmere past and present.

To begin with, then, we have undertaken the publication of a Roll of Honour, containing the names of Old Ellesmerians serving in the Army in any capacity, and this number contains at any rate the first instalment of it. The list cannot be considered complete of course, but all Old Boys of whom we have any information are included in it, and we hope to hear of more as time goes on, so that at the end of the war a complete Roll may be in the possession of the School as a permanent memorial.

And there is to be no Play! We are in hearty agreement with the decision, but it is not to be denied that the sacrifice is considerable. For twenty-eight years without a break the Christmas term has had its Play, and perhaps there is no event of the school year to which we look forward more eagerly; during the latter half of this term we are accustomed to live in the atmosphere of stageland. We shall miss

it, of course, but we venture to prophesy that there will be no grumbling. All of us can realise that when villages and towns are being devastated and thousands of people ruined, it is no time to indulge in costly amusements. Money can be spent to far better advantage than that.

We are getting so used to living in a state of war that it requires quite an effort to recall the sensations of last term when Germany still stood where she did: but we can still remember that the weather was generally speaking magnificent, and all our summer functions were successful. Accounts of them will be found in these pages, so there is no need to dilate upon them here; perhaps the one thing that calls for our Editorial comment is the fact that the Cricket XI. never really came up to expectations—why, we cannot say, as the team was always thought to be on the point of doing great things. Perhaps our experts were at fault—perhaps our opponents were abnormally good—there are many possibilities, but the fact remains. So far as this term's game—Rugger— is concerned, the second season's XV. finds itself at present with three losses and one win to record, but in estimating the value of this performance it must not be forgotten that we are still rather strange to The team possesses an enthe game. thusiastic Captain, and we hope it will set a good precedent for future generations.

The Debating Society has commenced its Session very successfully, despite the fact that it lost a large number of its most energetic members last term. We have no doubt that their successors will carry on the good work and make the fortnightly meetings as entertaining as they have previously been.

Two Lectures have been given, one by the

Chaplain, and we hear rumours of a Prefects' Concert for the end of the term, so we are not like to become victims of melancholia.

We close with a word or two as to our own special care—viz. the "Ellesmerian." We are glad to think that our changes have justified themselves so far, for we find that we are compelled this term to increase largely the number of copies printed in order to meet the increased demand. But there are further improvements in which our readers can help us if they will, chiefly in the way of sending us matter for printing; for instance, even if they are not poetically or imaginatively inclined, they can at least write us letters on subjects of interest to the School, such as have already appeared in our pages, and those who leave would do us a great service if they would hand in their school record for the "Valete" column before they go. Once they have departed it becomes, in some cases, extremely difficult for us to get the requisite information. We have secured the services of Dormitory Correspondents also, and we hope that all events of interest will be communicated to them as they occur; in this way the "Ellesmerian" will become a real record of the School life, as it should be. Finally we urge once again that all Old Boys should become subscribers and keep in touch with the School by means of its Magazine.

SPEECH DAY.

The annual Commemoration and Speech Day was held, as usual, on St. Oswald's Day, July 16th. The day began with a choral celebration of the Holy Eucharist at 8 o'clock. The commemoration service was held at 3 p.m. The special Collects and Thanksgivings were said by the Provost, the Rev. Prebendary Talbot. The outstanding features of the service were the Te Deum from Walford Davies' festal setting in G, the special hymn 'St. Oswald '—composed by the Chaplain for the occasion—and a practical and impressive sermon by the special preacher, the Rev. Prebendary Paice, Vicar of Walsall. In spite of rather dubious weather, a large gathering of visitors had assembled; and the accommodation. always inadequate in the present temporary building, was strained to its utmost limits, so that the chapel was, it must be admitted, uncomfortably crowded.

After the service, the annual distribution of prizes took place in the Dining Hall. The Provost, in his introductory speech, referred to the special work of the Woodard Schools in combining definite religious training with efficient secular education: this he affirmed to be more necessary than ever in view of the increase throughout the country of Secondary Schools in which

definite religious teaching occupied no prominent place. He also alluded to the hopes which are now entertained of beginning the building of an adequate and permanent Chapel for the School at no distant date.

The Headmaster's speech reviewed the progress made by the school, in every department of its activities, during the past year. As regards the work of the school, eight Senior Certificates and five Junior had been gained in the Oxford Local Examinations, while there had been thirty-three successful candidates in the Preliminary examination. T. A. Toote, who had gained a third class in the Bar Final at Lincoln's Inn; K. B. Halley. who had been awarded a scholarship of £200 a year at Trinity College, Cambridge: G. H. Gallogly, who was bracketed 5th in the Midsummer entrance examination for high places at Trinity College, Dublin; and some others—received especial men-The speaker went on to say that last year he had been able to state that the numbers in the school were then greater than they had been at any period during the previous nine years, whereas he could now say that they are greater than at any former period of the school's existence. At the beginning of the term, another Junior dormitory had been opened, and very soon the addition of the new wing, to accommodate another 80 boys, would be necessary. With regard to the athletic and social activities of the school, the Literary and Debating Society, now in the hands of Mr. Saxelbye, was quite one of the most popular institutions in the school; while in the domain of the games,

the record was eminently satisfactory, the reversion to the Rugby game having been followed by several notable successes. The Officers' Training Corps, under the zealous and able direction of Lieut. Curtis, had reached a very high standard of efficiency, and had received warm commendation at the recent inspections. E. D. Greeves and P. G. Sworn had been successful in the Certificate A. Examination. The Gymnasium was now serving a very useful purpose. A boxing tournament, at the end of the Easter term, had proved a great success. The annual Shakespearian Play, thanks to Mr. Evans and the loyal co-operatoin of Mr. Saxelbye, Mr. Smith, and Mr. Searls, had been another notable success. The health of the school during the past year had been uniformly good, thanks to the unremitting attention of the Matron and Dr. Drawbridge.

Both the Provost and the Headmaster paid a warm tribute to the devoted work of the Chaplain, the Rev. R. H. Philipps, who, to the very great regret of all connected with Ellesmere College, is leaving the school to take up Missionary work in Rhodesia. The deep regret and hearty good wishes of masters and boys, and all his many friends, will follow him to his new sphere of work, in which the Ellesmerian wishes him all health and happiness.

At the conclusion of the speeches, Prebendary Paice distributed the prizes, Mrs. Paice having been prevented from coming to fulfil that function. The following prizes were awarded.

The old man sat in his front garden enjoying his post-prandial cigar with a zest undiminished by his ninety-six years of vigorous life, on a peaceful Summer evening in the year 1994, A.D. His stalwart grandsons, and one little curly-headed great-grandson, sat grouped around his chair in the pleasant shade of a big cedar tree, listening to the tales of Elles-

mere which the veteran Ellesmerian was never tired of telling—in fact he could talk of little else but his old school.

Yet, through all changes and developments, the old man (president of the Old Boys' Club) had kept himself in close touch with his old school; and only for the last year or two had the increasing infirmities of old age prevented him from making his annual visit to Ellesmere on Whit Monday.

One great ambition, one anxious hope, now dominated his life, and seemed, by its intensity added to his own remarkable will-power, to infuse into his venerable frame a force of indomitable energy which, no doubt, accounted for his longevity. He was waiting—anxiously waiting—for the *Ellesmerian* to come out. Eighty years ago, he had played hockey for Ellesmere against Wrexham, Oswestry, and Wem: he could remember the results of most of those heroic games, but he was getting a bit hazy about the actual scores; if only the June number of the Magazine for the year 1914 would come out, he could refresh his memory, verify his figures, and die content.

"The score was five goals to two against us-I know it was" he said combatively, as if challenging somebody to contradict him.

"Yes, Grandad, I'm sure it was" murmured his youngest grandson soothingly, and hoping that something would happen to cause a diversion. Fortunately something did. The old gentleman's secretary made a sudden sensational appearance, bounding down the garden steps and racing like one demented towards the little group under the cedar.

"News, sir, news!" he shrieked, and

paused panting for breath.

"Well, out with it, man," said one of

the grandsons impatiently.

"I've just had a wireless message about to-day's match," panted the secretary.
"Well?"

"Eton all out for 4. Ellesmere 999 for one wicket."

"Pretty fair that" said the eldest grandson; but the fine old man seemed lost in reverie. "I'm sure the score was five goals to two—" he murmured.

"I wish to goodness that blessed paper." would come out," grumbled another grandson sotto voce; "we might get a

little peace then."

"It was only due barely eighty years said his brother, deprecatingly. I don't think it will be long now. It usually takes about that time, you know."

The veteran's eyes flashed with sudden fire. "If anybody says that the score in that Oswestry match was not precisely five goals to two against us, he is a ——."

"Yes, Grandad, of course" hurriedly interposed the grandsons. Something had to be done at all costs to divert the old man's train of thought. "I say, Grandad," he added hastily, "when do you think the Ellesmerian will come out?"

There was a sudden change in the patriarch's countenance: the fire vanished from his glance, and he sank back heavily in his chair. He shook his head sadly.

"Not in my time, I fear" he said. "I am very much afraid that when it

comes your old grandad will no longer be here to read it. Why should it come out? It hasn't come out yet, and I have waited

eighty years;"

At that moment a motor-cyclist (a special messenger from the Post Office) arrived at the gate, covered with dust: clanging the gate behind him, he rushed impetuously towards the cedar, clutching at something of a grey colour, girdled with a newspaper-wrapper, that protruded from his pocket.

"Grandad, Grandad" cried all his grandsons in excited chorus—"it has come—don't you hear—the Ellesmerian

A meeting of the Games Committee was held in the Boys' Library, at 8-45 p.m. on Sunday evening, Sept. 20th.

Business:—

- (I) To elect a Captain of Football.
- (2) To elect a Football Selection Committee.
