

It has been a very difficult task to select the most capable Sub-editor out of the numerous talented applicants for the post, and up to the time of going to press the final decision has not been made. We hope, however, that our next number, which will appear about the middle of September, will prove that a new star has risen above the literary horizon.

And now to a business matter,—The

Honorary Treasurer said that the Ellesmerian needed far more subscribers and that it was the duty of the editorial pen to find them for him. We, therefore, set our august brains to work, with the result that we have decided to try to make the Ellesmerian as interesting to Old Boys as it has been in the past to the school. To make this the case it is necessary that Old Ellesmerians should communicate to the Headmaster, Treasurer, or Editor such items of news concerning old boys as comes to their knowledge. We, therefore, appeal to all Old Ellesmerians to forward such particulars of their fellow old boys, even if they are too diffident to forward particulars of themselves, so that we may regularly have three or four pages, at the least, which will interest those who have, in the past, spent a part of the most important time of their lives at St. Oswald's. Of course we do not expect them to forward news alone, but also their subscriptions as well, and we, for our part, promise to print a list of subscribers at the end of every issue, in the hope that a short space of time will find every Old Ellesmerian a subscriber to the magazine as well as a member of the Old Boys' Club.

The Editor is forwarding the present issue of the Ellesmerian to those Old Boys whose addresses he can obtain, at the same time offering his apologies to those who do not receive it, and hoping that those who get a copy will pass it on to those who do not.

It is hoped it will be possible in the next issue to publish more Old Boys' news, but if not it can be promised in December. Subscription, 3/10 per annum, payable to the Hon. Treasurer. Subscribers are permitted to pay for several years in advance, if they so wish.

There is very little which calls for our Editorial comment this term. Hockey has been played with enthusiasm throughout, and we have even been lucky enough to secure two belated fixtures—one for the 1st XI. and the other for the 2nd XI. It is so many years since we had a hockey match that we justly feel elated at being at last allowed to pit our strength against that of other schools. Unfortunately, the absence of matches for so long a period is bound to exert some influence on the school hockey; we are apt to become staid and stereotyped and perhaps a little self-confident. We therefore await the matches with St. Lawrence with no little interest, fully conscious of the fact that while they give the team its only real test for years, they must of necessity reveal hitherto unsuspected weaknesses.

The Sports have been run off this term amid the usual excitement and glamour. The weather was excellent—in fact it was fine-right up till Sports' Day. Then it broke—or whatever it is the weather does -and the track on Sports' Day was little better than a glorified mud bath. However, in spite of the damping effect of a violent shower shortly after the Sports began, the spirits of both competitors and spectators seemed unimpaired, and the day was on the whole an unqualified success. Owing to the slippery nature of the ground it was thought advisable to postpone the Jumps and the Hurdles till the following Wednesday. Price i. ultimately proved to be Victor Ludorum with Shingler as runner-up. A full account of the Sports together with a list of the prizewinners will be published in our next issue.

We are very glad to be able to publish once more the photograph of an Old Ellesmerian who has fallen at the Front. There must be many still at Ellesmere who remember J. F. Woodall well, to

all of whom the sad news of his death came as a great shock. We shall always be pleased to insert photographs of O.E.s who have given their lives for King and Country, and we hope in the future that many more photographs will be sent to us for publication. After the war we shall publish a special war number of The Ellesmerian, containing a complete record of all that Ellesmere College has done in the great War, and a full account of the exploits of those O.E. heroes who have fallen at the Front. Dare we hope to see that number? We fear that most of the present generation of Ellesmere College will have passed from here ere our dreams are realised.

In conclusion, we should like to deplore the complete absence of poetic talent in the School. Where are the budding poets of yesterday? Time was when every number of *The Ellermerian* contained one or more original poems. But now? Nah-Poo! Surely the gentle Muse has not passed from our midst! There must be left some frenzied bard to carry on the good work of filling up the magazine. At all events we hope that our next issue will contain once more original poems from the pens of our youthful poets.

THE FOOTBALL SEASON.

The Rugby Season was certainly satisfactory as regards match results, as we won all those we played by considerable margins. It was unfortunate that, owing to difficult railway conditions, we were unable to meet teams of our own calibre. Had we done so, the team with a little practice would probably have settled down into a really good one, but, as it was, a few were somewhat inclined at times to play too much for their own hands.

The two halves Garnett and Girling were the mainstay of the team—their play was consistently good throughout the season; both were good tacklers and very fair kicks, and opened up the game quickly. The only real fault to find with their game was that it was too stereotyped, the ball always going from scrum to outside half and then to the next three-quarter in line, instead of a judicious use being made of the blind side of the scrum.

The three-quarters were the weakest part of the team; we had a very useful pair in Ericson and Barrett, but the other wing was very mediocre, though no less than five players were tried for it.

Fenton at full back made great strides as the season progressed, but was greatly handicapped by lack of pace. Had he been faster he would have been really good, for his kicking, tackling and stopping of the opposing forwards were excellent.

The forwards on the whole were good; their work in the scrum was satisfactory, and they usually secured the ball. Their play, too, in the loose was praiseworthy, but insufficient use was made of the touchline when play was in their own half, and their kicking was rather weak. Price i. led the pack well and was always in the front; the others were fairly level, with perhaps Keeley, Wilkinson and Bowyer the best of them.

CHARACTERS OF THE XV.

- A. Ericson (Captain)—Centre threequarter. Played consistently throughout the term. With more pace would make an excellent centre. Dodges very well and is a good place kick.
- E. Garnett (Scrum half)—Was probably its most useful member. As scrum half he used his head well and was quick at taking an opening. An excellent kick and saved his forwards a lot. Always tackled well.
- E. Girling (Stand-off half) who never shirked a tackle—has more pace this year, but rather inclined to hang on to the ball too long. Very useful half on the whole.
- R. W. Price—A rather light but very energetic forward. Works hard in the scrum and is very good in the loose. Made a good leader of the forwards.
- W. J. Keeley—A heavy forward who came on greatly during the season. Always worked hard in the scrum and improved considerably in his dribbling.
- E. A. Vanderbilt—A dashing forward with plenty of pace, but did not use his head sufficiently. Must learn to tackle low.
- C. W. Savage.—A reliable forward, especially good in the loose. Was perhaps inclined to shirk a little in the scrum.
- L. J. Barrett—Wing three-quarter who possessed the invaluable quality of running straight. Kicked fairly well, but should learn to use the return pass.
- H. W. Garforth.—A heavy forward, who made up for some lack of skill, by strenuous work in the scrum.
- E. G. Thomas.—A hard working, though rather slow, forward, who used his weight well in pushing.
- W. A. Chaplin-Wilkinson.—A forward who did not shirk his work in the scrum. Was speedy and followed up well.

R. Bowyer.—A very useful forward who dribbled and kicked well. Might have done harder work in the scrum at times.

Fenton.—Full-back. An Excellent kick and tackler, but requires more pace. Not afraid to take the ball from the

feet of opposing forwards.

H. Griffith.—Centre-three-quarter—good at finding touch, but weak in combination. Had a great tendency to run across instead of straight. Good tackler.

G. T. Cattell.—Centre three-quarter.— Fast and big, but did not make sufficient use of his natural advantages. Should improve greatly.

D. W. Jones.—Wing three-quarter. Takes passes very well and with more experience should be very useful. Tackles too high.

MATCHES.

S.O.C. v. LIVERPOOL COLLEGE.

This, the first match of the season, was on the whole quite a good game, especially in the tussles between the opposing forwards. Our forwards were rather the lighter but made up for lack of weight in the pack by energy in the loose, and in the first half had the better of the game. Unfortunately they did not last, and the Liverpool forwards had considerably the better of the second half, but their efforts were nullified by very weak back play. Our victory was due to the superiority of our backs, and especially of the halves who overran the opposing couple. Barrett, who was playing his first game for the School was better than on any other occasion during the season and at times was excellent. Ericson also did well as his partner. The other two were only moder-The Liverpool left wing was particularly good and with a good partner

would have been very dangerous. The final score was:—

S.O.C. v. WILLASTON SCHOOL.

The less said about this game the better as our opponents were outclassed to the extent of 84 points to o. The only feature worth mentioning was Ericson's place-kicking—12 goals in a high wind and some from difficult positions—was very creditable.

A tiresome railway journey of over three hours for a distance of about 50 miles is not conducive to good football, and our form was not up to the average. The forwards were good at times, and gave the backs plenty of opportunities, but the latter were entirely off colour—the passing was weak and the running was across instead of up and down the field. We won by 17 points to o, but with the chances we had the score should have been double. The most noticeable feature of the game was the plucky display of the Ruthin forwards, who, though considerably overweighted, never lost heart, and kept going right to the end.

Manley, David Henry George Jones, Capt. R.W.F., killed in action in Palestine. (Gordon: Jan. 1908—July 1914.)

Woodhall, John Frederick, Lieut. Machine Gun Corps, killed in action in Palestine Nov. 13th, 1917. Military Cross. (Prefect of Hall. King Alfred, Sep. 1912— July 1915.)

Extract from letter of Coy. Comdr. of Capt. J. F. Woodall, M.C., O.C., M.G.C.,

killed in action, 1917.

"We started off early one morning in the highest of spirits and after a very heavy march up the seashore past Gaza arrived at the Wadi Hesi just at dusk. We attacked immediately and drove the enemy from his strong position. I then detailed your son to take his guns up to the outpost line and consolidate. night was dark but he arrived safely and got his guns into position. Just as dawn broke he found that one (as invariably happens in such a position) was in a list of a trench just over the forward slope of the hill. By this time I had received orders to withdraw all guns to support another attack. This I ordered him to do and it was during the withdrawal that your son was lost. One man was killed and 2 wounded in trying to withdraw the gun and rather than send any more men to such a dangerous job your son endeavoured to do so himself and was instantaneously killed by a shot from an orange grove 200 yards away. He cannot have had an instant's pain as he was shot through the head without the slightest disfigurement. I could not realize that he had passed away, he looked so peaceful with his own happy smile on his face. He lies buried beside the men he commanded and loved within the sound of the sea surf at Wadi

Hesi and near the orange groves of Herbieh."

Topham, Alfred James Tudor, Capt. K.S.L.I., killed in action at Zonnebeke on Sept. 26, 1917. (King Alfred; May, 1909—Dec. 1916.) His Colonel writes:—He died most gallantly at the head of his company, which he was commanding during the attack. Moreover up to the time he was hit he had been doing splendid work as indeed he always did. His death is a great loss to the battalion and to me personally. Always exceedingly popular, he was an absolutely first-rate officer in every way and I had intended to give him a permanent command of a company on the next vacancy."

Andrews, James William, Inns of Court O.T.C. (Mounted Detachment), died of injuries received in an accident while in training at Tidworth. (Heywood; May, 1913—Dec., 1915.)

Murby, Edward Stanley, Gunner R.G.A. killed in action. (*Heywood*; Jan. 1911—Dec. 1912).

Allison, Joseph Leyland, Flight Sub-Lieut., R.N.A.S., missing. (K. Harold; Sep. 1907—Dec. 1910.)

Hughes, Norman Menzies, Private, R.W. F., killed on service Dec. 29th, 1917. (King Alfred; May 1912—July 1915). He had been in the trenches over Christmas and his battalion was afterwards taken to the rear where the men were billeted. The Officer Commanding wrote: "As a "gentleman ranker" we all admired him very much and hoped to promote him and thus enable him to apply for a commission. He was killed with six other good fellows by a shell which fell in the court-yard of a farm in which the men

were billeted and where I was paying out. Death was instantaneous as a piece of shell struck him on the head."
