# Speech Day.

HIS annual function took place on Friday, July 29th, o in the Gymnasium, the chair being occupied by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. The Warden in an opening speech read out a list of School successes gained in the preceding year. The examiner (E. C. Marchant, Esq., Fellow of Lincoln College, Oxford) next read his report. Alluding to the excellent work done by D. G. Davies and O. M. Williams, he warned us against the danger of setting too much value on mere examination results: life very often reversed the verdict of the examinations: these were only of practical service if they encouraged candidates to work in disinterestedness. The Bishop of St. Davids followed, congratulating the School on its continued progress and emphasising its great development in recent years. ### School Entertainment.

HE first School Entertainment took place in the Gyma nasium on the evening of Friday, November 4, Mr. Stafford Webber giving us a lime-light lecture on the 'Humour of Punch.' His selection of pictures included specimens of the best work of byegone draftsmen, the typical features of whose art Mr. Webber pointed out in detail. Among many excellent pictures the palm must always be given to 'Général Féorier' and 'Dropping the Pilot.' In the course of his lecture Mr. Webber recited Hood's 'Song of the Shirt,' which he rendered with very great feeling and pathos. It is impossible to describe at length all the excellent material of his entertainment. The slides were uniformly good: the lecturer has a great gift for rendering the speech and characteristics of the types he wishes to illustrate; and he makes us understand what a tender heart Mr. Punch has for the poorer and humbler of his many children.

The second of this term's entertainments took place in the Gymnasium on Saturday, November 19th. It consisted of a series of violin selections by Lieut. Col. Lloyd-Harries, and of a number of School choruses, with a humorous song by R. H. Hughes. Lieut.-Colonel Lloyd-Harries received a great reception, and he rendered his selection (especially the last item) with admirable finish. R. H. Hughes delighted the audience with his cosmopolitan verse: we suspect that one or two of his Gallicisms were unknown to Littré. The programme was as follows:—

# Football.

Played at Brecon on Nov. 26th. School took the field without Cooper and Griffiths. Brecon were at full strength; the latter winning the toss, kicked off and followed up hard, a bad mistake by O. M. Williams nearly resulting in a score for Brecon in the first minute. At the beginning the Brecon

forwards were superior, but bad handling spoiled their work. Passing on both sides was faulty, no chance being given for an open back game; the tackling was very keen, neither side allowing much scope for individual play. There were many determined forward rushes, which were stooped by grand defensive work by both teams. J. V. Rees and H. B. Davies were conspicuous on the home side, Ifor Williams and Humphreys tackling gamely. After a short break both sides settled down to more scientific work, but the teams were as nearly balanced as possible. W. N. Morgan outpaced the home backs, but stepped into touch at the last moment. Half-time arrived without a score

In the second-half Brecon began to tire; the School forwards slowly found their feet, J. T. Davies calling on his men with great confidence: from a scrum Morgan darted over before either team was aware of what was happening; the kick at goal failed. The School now began to display better work behind, one or two movements being executed beautifully. T. P. Williams was too good for the opposing halves, and with a fine pass he enabled Jenkins to slip between the posts, J. T. Davies converting. Brecon now came on with a rush, and a very fine movement, in which nearly all the backs participated, ended in a brilliant try by Hoskins. But the School were not to be held back. In the last 15 minutes they completely mastered the Brecon pack, pushing them back in the scrums; in the last few minutes Brecon were on the defensive, two fine cross-kicks by J. T. Davies and Humphreys nearly putting Morgan in. On time a great run by the two centres resulted in H. O. Williams scoring well out, the kick failing. Time was then called, the score being-

At first Brecon were much better at forward; J. V. Rees was the best forward during the game. On the whole, the Brecon handling was bad, though the kicking was very sure. Llandovery won through excellence of back play; Jenkins was easily the best back playing, while there was no comparison between the three-quarter lines; Ifor Williams and Hum-

phreys tackled unerringly, often pinning both player and ball. T. P. Williams played a grand game, passing and tackling like an old hand. The forwards were very determined, but they were outweighted. On the whole, the better team won. *Teams*—

# Debating Society.

THEN the first Committee meeting of the term was called, it was discovered that only three old members and the chairman remained on the executive committee. The first duty, therefore, was to elect new members, and after the co-option of Mr. Hewlett, E. E. Roberts, N. Griffiths, D. T. Williams and E. G. R. Hughes were chosen.

The first debate was held on Sat., Nov. 15th, Mr. Pullinger being in the chair. The following motion was discussed:—'The craze for record-breaking is to be condemned.'

Proposed by R. H. Hughes, seconded by E. E. Roberts. Opposed by E. G. R. Hughes, seconded by E. de Q. Mears.

- R. H. Hughes himself broke all records by not once reaching the point; his knowledge of record-breaking seemed to consist of looping-the-loop and high diving.
- E. G. R. Hughes whose performances on a closed-in circular track were so ably described by the 3rd speaker, treated with contempt the 'facetious remarks' of the proposer of the motion. He demanded to know what we thought of Julius Caesar, and dealt at length with the Indian Mutiny.
- E. E. Roberts spoke 3rd, playfully flicking the leaders of the opposition with the stinging lash of his tongue, and causing them to squirm beneath the invective of his bitter sarcasm.

'With his head in dints and his eye in squints His Speech abounded in subtle hints'—

to quote a parody on one of De Quincey's own works.

The appeal to the house was gracefully responded to by  $H.\ R.\ Weeks$ , who took a broad-minded view of the situation, so broad that the greater part of his discourse was taken up by a description of the discovery of America.

- D. T. Williams thereupon made some observations in a sound matter of fact manner, and then, casting a surprised look around, quickly regained his seat.
- C. Morgan rose amidst applause. This self-styled 'terrestial star' shone forth on this occasion with unprecedented brightness, and a brilliance far surpassing that of Halley's Comet, yet like that glittering orb, he sped on his luminous flight, leaving behind him an audience blinded by the brightness of the fleeting vision. His speech resembled a violin solo, in that it may be divided into 4 parts, i.e.
  - (a) Andante Moderato
  - (b) Basso Profundo
  - (c) Crescendo Pianissimo
  - (d) Diminuendo Exploso!

Part (d) was a vituperative attack on the proposer of the motion. This pleasing feature closed the debate, and on the votes being taken, the motion was lost by 32 votes to 24.

It was in a more sober frame of mind that the house assembled on Sat., Oct., 15th. Again H. R. Weeks headed the mad rush of orators eager to secure the honour of speaking first. With sound perception he recognised that the subject was a serious one, and he expressed his intention of approaching it in a serious manner. He seemed surprised that his audience did not take this remark in the spirit in which it was offered.

R. H. Hughes, backed up the theories of an 18th century criminologist (whose name he was unfortunately unable to pronounce) with topical illustrations, briefly outlined the methods adopted by famous murderers from the time of Jack the Ripper to the present day, and generally displayed knowledge of a more intimate nature than could have been gathered from second-hand sources.

E. E. Roberts was indulging in his inimitable conversational style when the 'Black Cap' was put on the proceedings, in the shape of the gas being put out. The speaker took the hint, and promptly turned off his own.

It is curious to note that during this period of enforced gloom the 'Terrestial Star' did not rise above the horizon. This thought reminds us forcibly of the poet's fervent prayer:

'Twinkle, twinkle, little star, How I wonder where you are.'

When the light was turned on, '. O. Williams made a neat speech, directing the attention of the house to another side of the question. He omitted to say which!

After the principal speakers had summed up the house divided, and the motion was lost by 32 to 18.
