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# Editorial.

The well-wishes of the School go with these two brilliant students to Oxford, where they are expected to distinguish themselves still further.

D. O. Williams stormed Jesus College, Oxford, with success, while H. W. Spurrell and D. A. Evans successfully represented the Historical side of the School at Worcester College, Oxford, and Downing College, Cambridge respectively.

The efforts of our Hockey team and League enthusiasts are recorded elsewhere in this number.

The only remaining things to be said are that the weather has caused unusual strength and vividness of language, that the health of the School has been unusually good, and that St. David's Day passed without any untoward occurrence.

Such is, briefly, the account of this term, and despairing of ever arousing the latent literary talent of the School, we beg to present vet another number of the 'Mag.'



# The Football Season, 1912=13.

HE XV. of 1912–13 played ten matches, of which four were lost, five won, and one drawn. Our first and worst defeat was experienced in an opening match, that against a very strong side captained by the Rev. R. H. Roberts (O.L.I.), which we lost by 25 points to 8. Still far from being unsatisfactory, it was a most promising start. In the first place there was practically only a week in which to get a side together; in the second place our opponents were extremely good; their forwards were big and clever, while their three-quarter line, which included three of Swansea's three-quarters—two of whom being present day Internationals—was fast and skilful.

Our next defeat was that by St. David's College, Lampeter, at Lampeter. In this match the score was nine points to nil. Although outweighted and very much outpaced the School played well and pluckily, and, apart from the first twenty minutes, had fully as much of the game as their opponents.

We suffered our third defeat by the narrow margin of three points in the game v. Swansea Grammar Old Boys, and our fourth at the hands of Mr. R. K. Green's (O.L.I.) XV. Our opponents on this occasion, too, were very strong, a large number of the Neath XV. figuring in the side, while unfortunately the School were not at full strength.

As to our victories we won against Mr. D. P. Davies' (O.Ll.) XV. by 33 points to 6; against the Rev. G. I. R. Jones' (O.Ll.) XV. by 12 points to 8; against Sherborne School by the narrow margin of 3 points; against Christ College, Brecon, by 13 points to nil; and a distinctly lucky win over a strong side of Old Llandoverians of 5 points to nil.

The drawn game was that v. The Druids (Llanelly), neither side scoring.

The annual 'A' team fixture v. Lampeter College School proved to be a somewhat easy victory of 20 points to nil.

Our 2nd XV. played two matches—loosing badly against a good side from Gowerton County School, and winning easily against Swansea Grammar School.

This season 'Middle' Leagues were played in the Xmas

Term. They were splendidly contested, and made the selection of both fifteens a comparatively simple matter.

Junior Leagues were also played in the Xmas Term, and this year were brought to definite conclusion somewhat earlier than usual. After which two teams of twelve aside were chosen to play a series of championship games, and on the form displayed the 1912 Junior League Team was selected. It was as follows:—

The Senior League matches were played during the first month of the Easter Term, and were productive of some good football: but on the whole the back play was not as good as in former years. At the outset the sides were very even, but owing to the absence (unavoidable and otherwise) of some prominent players a few runaway games were witnessed. H. J. Powell's team again emerged victorious, and deservedly so. It comprised the following:—J. R. Samuel (full-back), G. G. Roberts (XV.), W. E. Harries, and H. M. Herbert (three-quarters), W. B. Powell and S. R. Griffith of the forwards, W. B. Morgan and D. S. Jones of the backs, were especially prominent, while the skilful 'hooking' of I. G. Williams contributed in no small degree to the success of his side.

#### IST XV.

H. I. Powell, Captain (1910-11-12-13).—A fast, big, powerful forward. An extremely clever dribbler and a sound tackler. If only he puts a little more 'go' into his play, he will be fit for any company. He has proved himself a most energetic team captain, and his keenness on the future football of the School was perhaps the most prominent characteristic of a most successful captaincy.

T. P. Williams (1910-11-12-13).—A clever and untiring in-half, who knows the game thoroughly. Full of resource and skill. A splendid tackler and kick—should be heard of again.

C. B. Davies (1911-12-13) .- A centre three-quarter who has quite fulfilled his earlier promise. Has improved in pace beyond all recognition. Makes elever openings, but is apt to hold on too long. Is safe with his hands and is a good kick. He must, however, learn to go down to rushes.

T. J. C. Davies (1911-12-13).—A much-improved forward. Dribbles cleverly and is most dashing. Very good on the line out, but is

clumsy at heeling.

B. A. Jones (1911-12-13).—A fast and very dashing forward.

Dribbles at a great pace. Tackles well and falls on the ball.

D. G. Williams (1911-12-13).—A very clever, fast forward. Can turn and dodge very cleverly. Falls on the ball and is a fine tackler.

Handles well, but is liable to hold on too long.

W. A. Harries (1912-13).—Although new to the position of centre three-quarter he soon became a fine player. He is fast and splendid in defence. A good kick, but is inclined to under-rate the importance of accurately thrown passes.

C. R. L. Humphreys (1912-13).—An out half who has fulfilled his earlier promise. A skilful attacking player, with as good a pair of hands as can be desired. Has improved very much in defence, and

is a fine kick.

I. F. H. Williams (1912-13).—A most promising young forward. He is fast, big, and clever. Is a much-improved dribbler and good on the line out. Although a young player he possesses a knowledge of the game, which usually is only acquired after long experience.

D. R. Williams (1912-13).-A most dashing and hard-working forward. An excellent tackler and rush stopper. A poor dribbler, and

is still too inclined to grovel.

T. W. Powell (1912-13).—A forward who has come on amazingly. He dribbles well, tackles well, follows up hard, and is a good scrum-

R. T. Howells (1912-13).—Full-back. Although this was his first season in any position other than half-back, he did excellent work. He became a long and accurate touch finder, a safe field, and a plucky and determined tackler.

D. A. Evans (1912-13).—A big forward who improved very much. Good on the line out and a fair dribbler. A good kick. Can tackle.

Made a very useful 'hooker.'

E. M. Jones (1912-13) .- A fast wing three-quarter. Much im-

proved both in giving and taking passes. A poor kick.

G. G. Roberts (1912-13).—At present suffers from inexperience of the wing three quarter position. He has the makings of a good wing. He is a fast, determined runner, and has good hands, but must learn to fall on the ball and rush his passes.

G. M. Evans .- A much-improved three-quarter who combines cleverly. A good defensive player. Should practise sprinting,

G. Williams .- A fair three-quarter. His form was very uneven.

At times he was dashing in attack and excellent in defence. S. R. Griffith .- A light but very dashing forward. An excellent

tackler. Has a distinct gift for leading. Should practise dribbling. J. G. Williams .- A most promising young forward. A hard and

untiring worker. Dribbles well, and is a sound defensive player.

Should be very good next season,

R. Roderic.—A most promising full-back. Should practise left foot kicking. A safe field and good tackler. Should endeavour to rid himself of the habit of throwing up the ball when punting.

W. B. Morgan,-A most plucky in half. A good rush stopper and

tackler. Passes out well and can feint.

I. A. T. Nicholas .- A most promising wing three-quarter. Handles well and turns either way. A good tackler. Should do much sprinting

R. S. Humphreys .- A promising out half. At times handles ex-

tremely well. An excellent kick and fair tackler.

E. A. Nicholas .- Has come on a lot. Good out of touch. Should

practise dribbling, and learn to tackle low and fall on the ball.

D. S. Jones .- A most promising attacking centre with a clever turn. A good left kick. Is much improved at handling. His defence at present is weak. He must learn to fall on the ball and tackle.

R. M. Jones.—Has not improved very much. He is a clever drib-

bler and good rush stopper, but must go harder.

G. H. Jennings.—A big forward who is improving every game.
Should practise dribbling. Good out of touch.
T. D. Davies.—A small but dashing forward. A clever dribbler.

Handles well.

W. H. Jones .- A very energetic and dashing forward. Is a much improved dribbler and a good tackler. With more experience should

I. G. Williams.—A promising clever forward. Dribbles well and is an excellent 'hooker.

C. G. Jones .- A hard-working forward. He must learn to tackle and keep the ball close when dribbling.

were never tested. Altogether the School should have won by a far greater margin had the half-backs understood anything of attack and feeding of the forwards.

# The Sports.

THE STEEPLECHASES.

HESE were run on Saturday, March 22nd. Originally intended for the previous Wednesday, they had been postponed owing to the swollen state of the river. The water was still deeper on Saturday, and accordingly the course of the Senior race was altered, the competitors finishing along the road instead of over the fields. The weather was very bad, the rain coming down incessantly.

The Junior Steeple was run first. Underdown took the lead at the Water-Jump and kept it throughout the rest of the race. He won very easily. Edmunds obtained second

place, and Renfrey came in third. Owing to an unfortunate mistake the river was crossed at the wrong place, and consequently many competitors were unable to pass it.

The Senior Steeple, as was generally expected, ended in a victory for C. R. Humphreys. H. W. Spurrell and G. H. Jennings came second and third respectively. No times were taken in either case.

Two records were created. Humphreys was the first competitor to win the Senior Steeplechase in two successive years. J. F. H. Williams was first at the Water-Jump for the third consecutive time in the Junior event.

#### THE POINT-TO-POINT.

This was run on March 26th from Cynghordy Station to Devil's Bridge. The course was open and, after the first mile, fairly level. A great deal of marshy ground had to be covered, and a way had to be forced through very thorny patches of wood and briars. C. R. Humphreys was easily first, but the honours of the race undoubtedly fell upon Renfrey, who ran magnificently throughout, and only failed to obtain second place by a yard. College House exceeded expectations, and the Town made a better fight than it did last year.

The College for this race was divided into two sections, the New Buildings (with the Studies) sending in separate representatives. On this occasion the arrangement worked successfully, for the Old Buildings and College House tied for first place, each securing 17 points. #### THE MILE.

The final of this race was run on Saturday, March 29th. There had originally been sixty entries, but a trial two days before had reduced the number of competitors to nine.

Climatic conditions were unfavourable and scarcely conducive to record breaking. Rain had made the track very wet, and a strong wind was blowing from the north-east. In such circumstances the time,  $5 \, \text{min.} \, 17\frac{1}{3} \, \text{secs.}$ , was quite as good as could be expected, and was a distinct improvement upon that of last year.

W. H. Williams led for the first two laps at a good pace, but unfortunately lost a shoe and had to drop out. Underdown then took the lead and retained it to the tape. It is most unusual for a competitor under 16 to win, and he is to be congratulated on his performance. D. R. Williams got in second and H. W. Spurrell third. Renfrey again ran pluckily and finished fourth.

#### SPORTS DAY.

The Sports were held on Tuesday, April 1st, on the cricket field. The weather was very unfavourable; it rained during the previous day and nearly all the morning. The two Cricket Balls, the Weight, and the Long Jump open were

decided beforehand. Powell reached the limit in the Weight for the first time in four years, and improvement was shown in the Long Jump.

It was impossible to expect any striking results under the prevailing conditions. The High Jumps were good, but the 100 yards open was not up to the usual standard, being run in only  $\frac{1}{5}$  second less than that under 16. The 440 was better, but was hardly remarkable, Powell winning with several yards to spare. Underdown and G. G. Roberts ran the Half-mile from scratch in 2 min. 23 secs. and 2 min. 27 secs. respectively. Edmunds won the Warden's Race, also running from scratch.

The prizes were distributed in the Gymnasium by Mrs. Douglas Jones. The Warden, after making a few general remarks on the subject of sport, congratulated Mr. Ivor Jones on the success of his efforts. The latter had remained on the field in all kinds of weather with a pistol in one hand and a barometer in the other.
