Editorial.

THE Editors have rather a pleasant task before them, when they undertake to review the work of a Summer Term. If they had been requested to draw up conjectures as to the nature of the summer session at the end of the Easter holidays, they would have been confronted by insurmountable difficulties. Thoughts of early school would haunt and dim the foresight: visions of hard work for the Board, coupled with persistent practice at the nursery of all great cricketers, would paralyse the imagination to such an extent that inspiration would become an impossibility. As it is, all this has been experienced, and, contrary to expectations, has not proved as formidable as it appeared.

We have come to the end of another term pleasant in some respects, disappointing in others. It has been pleasant in that no untoward event has befallen the School. We have succeeded in avoiding all epidemics and serious illnesses. On the other hand our disappointments are many. The weather, with the exception of about a fortnight in June, has been most unfavourable for cricket and bathing. Further we were robbed of the much coveted contest with Brecon through misfortunes that befell our rivals. Such were the decrees of fate, and, willingly or unwillingly, we had to acquiesce.

Our inability to play Brecon through no fault of our own was most galling. How much more so must it have been to our cricket master, Mr. May, who spent so much time and energy in bringing the Eleven to such a pitch of excellence? He may find some consolation in the thought that the 1st XI. compares quite favourably with those of preceeding years. The fruits of his labours will not be in vain, for just as examinations are not the final test of a man's merits, so too Brecon matches are not to be regarded as the sole object of careful and diligent coaching. The Eleven, their able coach and captain may congratulate themselves on a very successful season in spite of the bad luck and difficulties they had to encounter.

The monotony of an otherwise comparatively uninteresting term was relieved by an amusing entertainment given by Mr. Brough in the Gymnasium on the occasion of the Old Boys match. His allusions to 'Pike,' 'Moses,' and others were fully appreciated. Mr. Brough touched some of us very tenderly in his graphic description of how 'a lapin' goes in to bat, takes guard and finds after the first ball 'dat der stumps were not w(h)ere dey were.'

With these prefatory remarks we present the summer number of the School Journal to our Readers, wishing them and the School at the same time all health and prosperity in the future.

Letter from Lord Roberts.

Englemere, Ascot, Berks.,
5th July 1912.

To the Editor.

Sir,

WILL you kindly allow me to send through your columns the following message to the boys who are leaving school at the end of this summer term?

You boys are about to take your places in a larger life than that which you have hitherto led, and your minds must be greatly exercised as to what the future may have in store for

you. I would like to remind you that, while you are working for your own advancement, you must never forget that you owe a duty to the Country and the Empire of which you are members.

You have had great advantages as British public school-boys, and as British citizens you will have even greater privileges. What do you mean to give your country in return? It is in the power of every one of you to give personal service, that is, deliberately to work for your nation as well as for yourself; but personal service means some sacrifice of self, the giving up of some leisure and of some amusement.

At the present time your personal service is needed to persuade your fellow-countrymen of the great necessity there is for every able-bodied man being trained to defend his country in time of need. It is difficult to convince people ignorant of war of this necessity, or to make them realize that it is unpreparedness that leads to war, but the lessons of history will have taught you that disaster assuredly awaits the nation whose sons are unable to defend her, and I would earnestly beg of you to do all in your power to bring home people the fact that if we continue to shirk this, the first duty of citizenship, we cannot hope to retain our great heritage.

As you know, some of our fellow-countrymen across the seas have already adopted the principle that it is the duty of every man to be trained in the use of arms; believe me, boys, you can give no greater service to your country than by doing your utmost to procure the adoption of the same noble principle in the Motherland.

THE Season has been a satisfactory one in all respects, and although the climatic conditions have often made it an easier matter to catch a cold than a cricket ball, yet the play all through the School has been refreshingly keen, and the results good.

The 1st XI. lost 3 matches. Against the Town, several badly judged runs and a fine stand by D. T. Jones and P. H. F. Wiseman caused our downfall by 46 runs. Dr. E. T. Morgan very kindly brought a side up, but found us out of form in batting (the one collapse of the season). This match was lost by 89 runs. Against Plymouth Merthyr the XI. was at its best. The fielding and bowling were excellent. Plymouth Merthyr scored 131 and the School made 102, a most exciting match. Our 6 victories were against Lampeter College by 137 runs, the Masters by 162 runs, Pontardulais by 10 wickets, Old Llandoverians by an innings and 97 runs, The Town (on their ground) by 1 wicket, Pontyberem by 121 runs. The drawn game was with Rev. G. I. R. Jones's XI. It was a great but unavoidable disappointment that the Brecon match had to be scratched.

The slowness of the wickets has militated against brilliant

fast scoring batting displays, but there are blessings which will reap even from the eccentricities of this year's weather. All through the School improvement in this respect has been noticed. Our strength has lain in the evenness of the batting rather than in individual excellence, and it is pleasant to note that never once did our 'tail' fail us a good test of a sound XI.

The bowling has been steady and at times very good. I. G. Williams was always the most deadly bowler, and H. O. Williams bowled extremely well as a rule. Both of these did extraordinarily well against Plymouth Merthyr. E. M. Jones more than once bowled excellently. There were other bowlers on the side, but so effectively were the changes rung, that the School bowling was mastered, and it says much for our bowling and fielding, when it is recorded that the highest score against the School was 151.

The most pleasing point about the play of the XI. has been the fielding. In every match it was good and at times it rose to brilliancy. There was style as well as dash in the way the fielders moved in to meet the ball, and though at times the returns were inaccurate, the ball was as a rule sent in very quickly. Many of the XI. showed considerable improvement in returning catches to the wicket keeper, the low wrist action, which saves time and runs.

With regard to the organisation, there have been regular First, Second, and Junior games, the rest of the School being divided up into sets. Owing to the plethora of Masters willing to sacrifice their time and energy to the School cricket, these three games have been run keenly and coached carefully, so that there are three distinct 'generations' of cricketers being carefully brought on for future years.

The 2nd XI. played 5 matches; Lampeter College School and the Town 2nd XI. (twice) were defeated, and our losses were against Mr. Lockyer's XI. and Gowerton County School. The batting has been fair and more than promising, the bowling moderate, and the fielding very keen. The Junior XI. won both their matches against Llanyre Hall with ease, and were as keen as ever. Several of this year's Juniors should before long be found in the ranks of the 1st XI.

Our best thanks are due to Messers Lockyer, Ivor Jones,

and Tilly, who have given their valuable help unceasingly. Without them it would have been impossible for the Cricket to have been managed as smoothly as has been the case,

A word is due of the captaincy of O. M. Williams, whose keenness and powers of organisation have been most praiseworthy.

SCHOOL v. MASTERS.

THIS match was played on May 14th and 15th, and resulted in an easy win for the School. The Masters, batting first, were all dismissed for 100, Mr. Calcott being the top scorer. CRICKET CHARACTERS.

1ST XI.

O. M. Williams (1911-12) showed all the qualities and tact essential for a good captain. Improved remarkably in the art of changing his bowlers and of arranging his field. As a bat, took a long time to settle down. Has some fine free strokes on the off, and hits well to leg; uncertain in back play. A fair medium paced bowler, apt to bowl too short, but has a deceptive slow ball. A brilliant and safe field anywhere, especially at third man. He has done much for the School cricket both on and off the field.

B. A. Jones (1911-12), a left hand bat with several excellent punishing strokes, but he lacks determination when he first goes in. 'Turns' too much in playing back, and is too tame in hitting to leg. Would be a very good field if he were always on his toes.

C. B. Davies (1910-12), a slow wicket bat of great patience and consistency. Very sound on the leg side, and improved in driving. Far too apt to 'feel' at fast balls on the off. A useful but not stylish wicket keep. Took fast bowling very well, and has improved in taking slows on the leg side. Needs more 'life.'

H. O. Williams (1911-12), as a left hand bowler has done consistently well. Should cultivate the 'natural' break after swinging in. A hard hitter with very little discrimination. A splendid field with a quick return and a safe pair of hands.

J. F. H. Williams (1911-12). For the last two months he lost all form, and fulfilled none of last year's promise. He has acquired several radically bad habits, which he will quickly get rid of if he shows the necessary grit and patience, for he is very young and has plenty of cricket in him. A safe catch, and he stopped hard drives at mid-off. Must improve in starting and throwing in.

D. O. Williams (1912), has developed into a most useful and consistent bat. Very sound on the leg side and at placing the ball. Has a fair off drive, but does not get over the ball enough in playing back. A very safe short slip, in fact an excellent field. A very steady medium paced bowler, but his arm is too low.

D. T. Williams (1912) would have been worth his place for his fielding alone at extra cover. Always good and generally brilliant in this respect; he made some sensational catches. As a bat he has improved, but he likes fast wickets. Lacks life and firmness when he first goes in, and his back play is still weak.

I. G. Williams (1912), a young leg-break bowler of great promise. He has had a most successful season even though he has never had the fast wickets that he needs. Still might aim at a higher flight and a concealed off break. A confident bat with a nice style and fairly sound defence. Needs more dash at short balls on the off. A good, clean fielder at point.

E. M. Jones (1912) has improved a great deal as a batsman. With faster wickets to help his pace he should develop into a good fast bowler, provided that he maintains his present accuracy of length. As a bat he plays very straight and hits a half volley well. Much improved in back play. A good, keen field.

H. J. Powell (1912) has come on a lot in batting, and his defence is sound. Plays back well and hard, and is good with slow bowling. He still does not make enough use of his great strength and reach in driving and in playing forward. A safe, keen fielder, but not dashing enough.

R. T. Howells (1912) improved considerably in batting, and was good at a crisis. Moves about too much in back play, and does not make enough use of his height in driving. A safe, stylish, and dashing field with a quick accurate return.

2ND XI.

Sir J. A. Owen captained the side keenly. Bowled very successfully, and showed considerable improvement in batting and fielding.

E. E. Roberts has improved remarkably in batting. Has a powerful off drive; still uncertain in back play. A most dashing fielder.

R. G. Rees. As a bat he is cramped, but played some nice innings when the wickets were not slow. A brilliant cover point with a lightning return.

T. J. C. Davies, with practice at slow bowling, will develop into a very good wicket keeper. Takes medium bowling on the off cleanly, and is at times quite brilliant. Undeveloped as a bat.

R. Roderick has some nice free strokes when he gets his left foot right to the ball. Disappointing as a fast bowler, as his arm is so low. This can still be remedied. A good, keen field.

A. P. Davies, a steady, plucky bat with a nice style. With more strength will be very good. Much improved in fielding.

T. P. Williams, an excellent fielder. Has some really brilliant strokes on the off, but he should not try these off straight balls. Defence weak.

S. R. Griffiths has come on a great deal, and should be most useful next year. Weak on the leg side, but sound in back play. Needs more strength. His fielding has improved considerably.

E. M. Forster, a most promising bat. At times fielded excellently, but his returns are wild.

D. F. Jones, a useful all round cricketer. Weak at balls on the leg stump. As a bowler he must pitch them up more. A keen field.

R. S. Humphreys, a free bat with rather too much flourish. Still weak on the leg stump. Improved remarkably in fielding. With patience he will become a good cricketer.
