The Football Season, 1914=15.

HE prospects at the beginning of the Christmas Term were by no means encouraging. Owing to the War the Fixture Card had to be abandoned. Consequently there were very few matches in which to test different players and to get the side together. In addition to this there were only two old colour men among the backs, and they had to play in new positions. There was no scarcity of material for a good pack of forwards, and in that lay the strength of the side.

Considering that the new players had no opportunity of

acquiring experience apart from the practice games, the team deserved much credit for winning the matches against Mr. D. M. Evans' XV., Lampeter, and Brecon.

TEAM CHARACTERS.

IST XV.

D. R. Williams, 1912-13-14-15.—A rather light forward who did not spare himself in the scrum or in the open. A sound tackler and good captain, who set an excellent example to the side.

R. H. Roderick, 1913-14-15.—An excellent kick, a sound tackler and a strong runner. Formerly a full back, but adapted himself to centre

three-quarter.

R. M. Jones, 1913-14-15.—A really good all-round forward who dribbles and handles the ball well, but is apt to hold on too long.

W. H. Williams, 1913-14-15.—Out-half. He brought off some good runs, kicked well, and possesses a good swerve. Rather light and sometimes apt to hold on too long.

W. L. Evans, 1913-14-15.—A dashing and clever forward in the open, dribbles and tackles well, but does not do enough in the scrum.

G. H. Gennings, 1913-14-15.—A heavy and rather clumsy forward, who worked hard in the scrum and in the line-out.

A. E. Warhurst, 1914-15.—A forward who dribbled well and worked hard in the scrum, but was lacking in dash.

M. R. Jones, 1914-1915.—A light forward with plenty of dash, who worked hard in the scrum and open, but is apt to over-run the ball.

W. B. Evans, 1914-15.—A heavy and rather clumsy forward who did not make the most of his weight. Improved considerably during the season.

S. M. Williams, 1914-15.—In-half. A strong runner and safe tackler who passes well and shows much promise.

H. G. Davies, 1914-15.—A promising centre three-quarter who doubled and passed well. A good kick and safe tackler.

S. V. Swash, 1914-15.—A forward who had to adapt himself to the wing three-quarter position. A fair tackler, but does not run with enough determination.

W. G. Roberts, 1914-15.—A full-back who tackled excellently, and kicked with judgement, but a trifle slow.

A. T. Worthington, 1914-15.—A small and light forward, who worked hard in the scrum, and tackled well in the open.

E. M. Nicholas.—Wing three-quarter, a strong runner, a fair kick and tackler, but must learn to hold his passes.

- C. G. Jones .- A light forward who played with dash. A good dribbler.
- J. R. Samuel.—A centre three-quarter who did not come up to expectations. He ran strongly but was weak in defence.

THE STEEPLE CHASES.

Senior course was the same as last year's. Some of the competitors in the Senior race seem to have been in doubt as to the exact course, which had been well laid. We should like to impress this fact on future runners, that it is to their own advantage to study the course before the race.

The Junior race was run first, and a start was made at 3.15. D. H. Davies took the lead and maintained it right up to the woods. Then he was passed by R. L. Davies, who maintained his lead. At the first railway bridge Marcus Ballinger took the second place and maintained it to the end. R. L. Davies eventually won, with Ballinger second and D. K. Davies third.

There was a large 'field' for the Senior race, which started at 3.25. Timothy, one of the favourites, took the lead up to the river, with R. M. Jones close behind him. Jones then took the lead which he steadily maintained, Timothy falling behind. W. Morgan now loomed up and took second place. Going strong R. M. Jones took the first place with ease. Morgan obtaining second place, H. J. B. Phillips, who ran very well indeed, being third.

THE MILE.

The final of this race was run after tea on Saturday, March 27th. The course was in a good condition and helped on the runners considerably. There were six competitors. At the start R. M. Jones took the lead, which he kept throughout. In the third lap he ran hard, and had over a one hundred yards lead from N. E. Evans. Eventually Jones won the race comfortably by about two hundred yards. N. E. Evans and D. H. Atwood took the second and third places respectively. The last two are to be heartly congratulated on their good running. Time, 5 mins. 10 secs.

THE HALF MILE.

This race was run on Sports day, and was perhaps the keenest race in the whole sports. The fact that it was run close after the quarter-mile was responsible for the poor time, since some competitors ran both races. A good start was made, J. G. Williams and R. M. Jones setting the pace. These two soon left behind the other competitors, and it was evident that the race was between them. Jones led all the way, with

J. G. Williams close up. In the last lap both runners were breast to breast up to the 'straight,' then R. M. Jones sprinted, and gradually drawing away from Williams, won the race, with J. G. Williams a good second. Time, 2 min. 18 secs.

Sports Day.

HE Sports were held, as usual, on the School Cricket Field. The weather was fine, though cold. The ground was rather heavy owing to the heavy rains. There was a fair number of spectators present, although nothing like the usual attendance. There was no prize this year, but this fact did not damp the ardour of the sporting element of all the School. The time of the Senior hundred yards race was unfortunately not taken, whilst the quarter mile was quite a good race.

The Cricket Season.

N the whole the season has been a very successful one. Once more we have had excellent weather, especially in the earlier part of the season, but like all other schools our fixture list has been a very short one owing to the War.

The batting has been sound all through the team as a rule, but several members of the team would have made more runs if they had not tried to hit the cover off the ball before they had had time to see it; they must remember to be content to wait for an over or two and then, when they have learnt to time the ball, to use more freedom. We had more bowling than we really required this year, but our attack was weakened through Roderick having to bowl at medium pace, and the fact that we had no slow bowler. The fielding has been very good, and showed up very well in the Brecon match.

Perhaps the best performance of the season were wins over Aberystwyth and Brecon. In the former match Warhurst was in his best form, making 99 in a very short time, and taking 5 wickets for 44 runs. His innings was certainly the best played on the ground this season, some of his shots being quite first-class, while among his strokes were eighteen 4's.

The Masters match was lost mainly owing to good innings by Mr. Thomas and Soar. In the School second innings Warhurst made 94 in good style all round the wicket, while Swash also played well. Against Mr. Tyler's XI. Timothy bowled well, taking 6 wickets for 53 and getting the 'hat-trick.' Roderick hit up 84 quickly, though he ought to have been caught off his first ball. He hit one 6 and sixteen 4's.

In the Brecon match our opponents had first innings and were all out for 100, chiefly owing to the steady bowling of Roderick and Timothy who bowled unchanged through the innings, the former taking 6 wickets for 47, the latter 4 for 43. Our fielding was very keen, J. G. Williams being especially prominent at square-leg. We lost S. M. Williams rather unluckily in the first over, but then John and Warhurst settled down and, playing good cricket, were not separated until it was fairly certain that we should lead on the first innings. Warhurst's was the best innings of the day, but John's was the more valuable of the two, as he went in when things were not going very well and played very steadily, though at times he was rather lucky. In their second innings Brecon made 49, and we lost two wickets in endeavouring to get the 14 runs required to win, in 3 overs.

The second XI. only had one match against Brecon. In their first innings they made 28, Lloyd's deadly bowling being responsible for the most part. We made 69, as also did Brecon in their second innings. We lost one wicket in making the necessary 29 runs, of which D. K. Davies had 22 not out. In Brecon's first innings, Lloyd had 6 wickets for 9 runs, and in the second innings W. D. Evans had 6 for 25. There is plenty of batting in the 2nd XI. but not quite enough experience, and most of the team can bowl, while their fielding is above last year's standard; in this last respect, as well as in general keenness, a good example was set by the captain, W. H. Williams. Once more the thanks of the team are due to Mr. Tilly for the endless pains which he expended on them.

The Junior XI. have only played one of their matches with Llanyre Hall, and that they won with three wickets in hand. There was one big score on either side; for Llanyre Hall T. C. Jones made 65, while for us A. P. N. Roberts made 77 not out. Llewellyn had 5 wickets for 29 and C. E. Jones 4 for 52. There is plenty of batting in the side and some good bowling. Again Mr. Thomas has given up much of his time to coaching them.

CHARACTERS OF IST. XI.

- R. H. Roderick (Capt.), 1913-14-15.—Has improved immensely as a bat. Unfortunately he was prevented from bowling at his usual pace by ill-health. A very fine fielder in any position. A good Captain who interested himself in the cricket of the whole School.
- A. E. Warhurst, 1914-15.—An excellent bat, once he has settled down; is, however, apt to step away from a ball on his legs, and to cut at a short ball on the wicket. A useful bowler, and very good field.
- S. M. Williams, 1913-14-15.—The soundest bat on the side; has a strong defence. A capital cover point, who throws in accurately and smartly. Might be a useful break bowler if he practised length bowling more.
- R. M. Jones, 1914-15.—A useful bat, who hits hard; his present weakness is not playing straight at a ball on the leg stump. Fields well in the slips.
- S. V. Swash, 1914-15.—As a bat he has come on a great deal, and has played useful innings on several occasions, but he must learn to keep his right foot down when playing forward. A good field.
- G. R. Timothy, 1915.—A fair bat; he must learn to stand up to the ball and keep his right foot still. A good bowler, and sound field.
- D. M. John, 1915—A good bat; has scored consistently. He must learn to play straight at a ball on the leg stump and not try to turn it behind the wicket. A smart field.
- W. G. Roberts, 1915.—A very promising bat; at present is rather afraid of putting power behind his strokes. Has kept wicket very well. Should be very useful next season.
- J. G. Williams, 1915.—A fair bat, who would score more freely if he went in for hitting more frequently. Has always fielded well, and at times brilliantly. A useful change bowler.
- H. G. Davies, 1915.—A promising all-round cricketer. Hits hard, but is apt to play with a cross-bat at times. His bowling is too short at present. A smart field.
- R. W. Brown.—Fell off in his batting towards the end of the season, but ought to make runs when he has learned to play straight. Should be a good bowler when he has learned to keep his right foot behind the bowling crease, and thinks more of length rather than pace. A very fair field.
