Colonel Herbert Clifford Bernard, who was killed on July 1st, was the only surviving son of the late Robert Bernard, M.D., R.N., Deputy-Inspector-General of Hospitals and Fleets.

and Honorary Surgeon to the Queen. Colonel Bernard, who was born in 1865, was educated at Llandovery School, and at Derby Grammar School. He passed through Sandhurst as Queen's cadet, was gazetted to the 67th (Hampshire) Regiment in 1884, joined the Indian Army in 1885, and served in Burmah until 1905, when he joined Rattray's (45 Sikhs) as second in command. He commanded this regiment from 1909 to 1914. His war service included the Burmese Expedition (1885-89), Manipur Expedit on (1891), Burmese War (1889-92), and the Chinuk Expedition (1901). In 1898 he married Miss Ina Hogg, of Melbourne, who died in 1908. On the outbreak of war he was given command of a battalion of the Royal Irish Rifles, which he trained for several months in Ireland, and England. His nephew, Lieutenant Robert Bernard, of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers (a son of the Archbishop of Dublin), was killed at Sedd-el-Bahr last year.

Cricket Matches.

LLANDOVERY COLLEGE v. CHRIST'S COLLEGE, BRECON.

Played at Brecon, Wednesday, July 5th, 1916. Result-Christ's College won by 135 runs.

This annual match was originally fixed for Saturday, July 1st, but owing to the weather it had to be postponed until the following Wednesday. Contrary to the usual custom the School was not this year allowed to go to Brecon. The day dawned very misty with thunder in the air, but became very hot towards noon.

The team left in cars at 9.20, and got up to Brecon without accident. The game started at 11.20, the School winning the toss and batting first. C. H. Morgan and W. R. Richards opened the innings for the School, but C. H. Morgan was very soon bowled off his pads by Wilkinson after only 5 runs had been recorded. The next man, C. E. Jones, was caught and bowled by Wilkinson before he had scored. D. K. Davies, of whom much was expected, was caught in the deep by Oxenham for one run, and thus three wickets were down for merely 12 runs. W. G. Roberts, who went in next, however, made a good stand, although Richards was quickly caught by T. L. Evans at cover point. Thus W. G. Roberts and G. R. Timothy were in together. Much was expected from these two, and indeed they did well; the score had been raised from 19 to 43, when Timothy went out to a full pitch ball on the leg bowled by T. L. Price. Then a rot set in, and the rest of the team went out very cheaply, W. G. Roberts alone making any score. He, however, was caught at last by R. M. Roberts off Wilkinson, and the innings closed at 12.40 for a total of 57 runs.

Brecon were then to go out to bat, but when the Llandovery side were sought it was found that only six were present, for the rest had rushed into the town as soon as their own innings were over. Thus the game was unable to proceed until after lunch, and the School lost the possible chance of getting a couple of wickets before the interval.

Brecon commenced their innings at 2 o'clock, E. J. Morgan and K. G. Evans leading off to the bowling of J. Llewelyn and

Timothy. In the fifth over K. G. Evans was caught by Timothy at silly point off J. Llewelyn. T. Ll. Evans then went in, and he and Morgan made a very fine stand. They hit the bowling about with ease, although each had several 'lives' through dropped catches. T. Ll. Evans was eventually bowled by a full pitch ball from D. K. Davies, and retired with 61 to his credit. Henshaw, who next batted, was cleverly stumped by W. G. Roberts before scoring a run. T. L. Price was next caught by N. E. Evans in the deep field for four runs. E. J. Morgan was then stumped by W. G. Roberts for 57 runs. S. E. Lewis was caught and bowled by D. C. Evans. Lloyd-Rees, however, played a good 'hit or miss' not out innings. Wilkinson was very easily stumped while strolling about outside his crease. R. M. Roberts was stumped by W. G. Roberts for 6 runs, Oxenham was caught by Richards for 10, and F. M. Pryce stumped by W. G.

When going in a second time Llandovery made a slightly better attempt, 114 runs being scored for six wickets, the main features of which were 17 by Richards, 16 by Timothy, and 43 not out by W. G. Roberts. Roberts and Bowen were batting in fine style when the game had finally to be abandoned at 6.40 owing to heavy rain.

Roberts for 8. Thus Brecon were finally all out for 192.

The main feature of the batting was the total collapse of the School. W. G. Roberts, Timothy, and W. R. Richards excepted, there were no scores worth mentioning. In fact the remaining eight of the team made 5 runs between them. It is quite an inexplicable thing unless one attributes it to 'nerves.' The ground, however, was much slower than the School pitch, and thus we played on an unaccustomed kind of wicket. T. Ll. Evans and E. J. Morgan both played good innings for Brecon.

In the fielding the most noteworthy feature was the fine stumping of W. G. Roberts. On the Brecon side the fielding was very smart. Another thing that could not fail to attract attention was the total lack of supporters of Llandovery.

Thus we lost the match again for the second time in four years. It is a very difficult matter to decide who was to blame, but it can be said with justice that Brecon had the stronger side. The scores were—

Bacon's Essays.

[Note.—The following, which may be of interest, is an extract from a recently discovered MSS. volume of Bacon's Essays].

OF PREFECTES.

YOME there bee that affect to find Usage in Prefectes, which classe, in the present daie is in the Minoritie; for Prefectes trulie bee in manny waies proper to the Body Politique, as needes they must else wee should bee at a stonde for disciplinne in Schooles and Acadamies of Learning. For as the opponents of this Classe urge, they do not make for advantage nor yet for Ye Pleasure of Ye Mobbe.

Fulle many kindes of Prefectes there bee; Whereof some bee very loathesome; but Others lesse so. And at the first, I do intende to speake of them which have the Pre-eminence of Action: for they do imagine of themselves that action bee the chiefest parte of theire dutie, even as Demosthenes once did saie that Action was the chiefest and most importante parte of Oratorie: These be by the many called Eccentricks, and they bee fulle of Evil Favour among the Rabble. These too the contentious and tribunitious among the Plebes do not seldome assaile in Bookes; Butte soone as they leave they become plausible; and receive abundant Laudatives, even from their former Adversarie, since they bee lefte.

In the Maine the Dutie of Prefectes is to be interessed in the Regiment of Colleges; and the Sustentation of Lawes and Rules. All manner of Noises and disturbances and contentious strivings they do utterlie abhorre and quelle; and will not listen to any Excusation thereof though the mannage thereof bee never so cunninge; butt do forcibly punish and chastise all such offences in measure; And sometime in Excesse which bee bad, both for them which suffer, and for the reputation of the Prefectes themselves.

But of others againe the Nature is fair opposite, so that they bee of a certain towardnesse and meeke humilitie; desiring alwaies to avoid the eyes of Meune; and Ostentatious pageantes. With such I would have you deal tenderly; for though they be Prefectes, they bee yet conscient of their Shame.

To speake of Ye Prefectes generallie not as individual but as a Classe; they have certaine advantages for sure; which bee in truth very few; though the worke they have to do bee sometimes in Excesse; such as Ye taking of Ye Rolle-Calle; which do have to be donne at the least twice and even sometimes thrice eache daie, Together with this commeth ye calling and distribution of Letters; which on Certain Daies do reach to very great numbers.

But it is of this Plie that the chiefest complaint do rise; that they do come at moments inopportune for the Bodie

Democrat; so that the latter when they do descrie one coming, of whom they can saie with certaintie 'Here bee Prefecte,' they straightway do sing a *Nunc Dimittis* (which is the sweetest of all canticles).

Now this that hath beene written hath by no means exhaust the Divers kindes of Prefectes; For, and if I should have the Leisure and the Habilitie I could with much Facilitie discourse thereof muche and even fille a large Volume; for they bee of suche Infinite Varietie; But Enough of Such Toyes.
