The death of Lt.-Gen. Sir James Hills-Johnes, V.C., G.C.B., took place last Christmas. By the world in general he will be remembered as a gallant and distinguished soldier, and a particular tribute to his memory is demanded of the School, for he was Chairman and Treasurer of the Trustees. His name has been held in the highest honour by Llandoverians for the last thirty-five years, and his death is an unspeakable loss.

LLANDOVERY v. Brecon.

HIS game was played at Brecon on Tuesday, March 4, 1919, after being postponed from the former term. The day was very unfavourable for any varied play, for a heavy rain fell steadily throughout. As usual, Brecon started a series of rushes, and within a short time scored a try. Soon afterwards E. A. Evans received the ball, and running hard and well scored far out. Soon afterwards T. L. Price scored a good try for Brecon. During the rest of this half, the play remained in the Brecon twenty-five. The whole of the latter half was a monotonous forward struggle, in which our team was splendid. Brecon did not succeed in relieving the pressure for any length of time. In the last quarter of an hour Llandovery was constantly on the opponent's line, but failed to score; the Brecon defence was so good. The conditions were distinctly in our favour, and we should have won. The pity is that in such a hard game our opponents should have scored in the first case so easily, in the second try so luckily. On the other hand, had the weather been finer, our backs could not have contended with the superior Brecon backs. Result-Llandovery, I try; Brecon, 2.

IST XV. CHARACTERS.

W. M. Williams (Captain, 1917-18-19).—A keen and able forward; his hand and foot work are quite good; excellent in line out, rather slow; a little more zeal in ordering his players is required.

T. G. Jones (1917-18-19).— A heavy, strong, and very fast forward, who works hard and well in the close and the open.

A. S. Lewis (1917-18-19). A very fast and good forward. Works hard in scrum, and in handling the ball in the open is excellent. A moderate kick. Tackles well.

- E. A. Evans (1917-18-19). A beautiful runner, with great speed and dash. A prolific try-getter when given the chance. No great knowledge of the technique of the game.
- T. P. Williams (1917-18-19). A very keen and fine forward who uses all his energy. A firm tackler and strong in close play. A poor
- D. R. Phillips (1917-18-19). A very promising full-back. Rather slow, but is a safe tackler and unerring kick with both feet.
- C. E. Davies (1917-18-19).—A fast and vigorous forward, and keen tackler, who, however, does not use sufficient weight in scrum. Good in spoiling tactics, and a fair kick.
- T. I. Griffiths (1917-18-19). A moderately fast wing who tries hard. Fair tackler. He would score oftener had he not the tendency to halt when doubling. A fair swerve, and good side-step. A fair touch
- P. Williams (1918-19).—A very hard working scrum-half. Full of pluck and determination; quick in opposition. A sure tackler, and gives and takes his passes well. A good kick.
- E. G. Pritchard (1918-19).—A very hard-working and useful forward, with a good pair of hands, but slow feet. A good kick. He is seen to advantage in the close game.
- O. G. Seymour.—A heavy young forward who shows promise. Works hard in scrum., full of pluck, and good in foot-work. Rather slow.
- G. G. Jones .- A strong forward, a fair hooker, rather slow and clumsy in hand work, but who will undoubtedly improve, especially in scrum.
- F. R. Rogers. A centre with plenty of pluck. A good tackler, but much too selfish. He must learn to combine. A poor pair of hands and slow. Fair kick.
- Rahmatullah.—An out-half with a good pair of hands. Quite fast, but no knowledge of back play. Poor in defence. A good kick,
- E. A. Rowlands.—A centre who has not yet developed; rather fast and plucky, but no technical skill. A fair tackle with a poor kick, and unsafe pair of hands.

HE Sing-Songs as usual were a prominent feature of last term. They were all highly successful, and were remarkable for the excellent, albeit vociferous, rendering of the choruses. It cannot be said of them that they were intrinsically musical, yet the whole-hearted enthusiasm and spirit with which they were sung amply compensated for this defect. We were accorded an innovation in the form of the School band, which, besides doing duty as accompaniment to the choruses, gave selections from popular music, which, judging by the applause, were highly appreciated.

We were pleased to observe the larger number of visitors, and confidently hope that still more will come in future to give zest to the singing.

Wilkins bowled some fast, good-length balls, which broke in considerably, and he succeeded in taking 6 of our wickets for 24 runs.

Pontyberem then went in, and at first seemed as if they might be beaten, 2 of their wickets falling for 13 runs. After lunch our bowling grew worse and worse, Roberts and Wilkins hitting it in all directions. Fortunately Wilkins was caught by Pritchard in slips, with his score one short of 50. H. W. Seymour then joined Roberts, and indeed made things look very black. He hit very hard, his 'sixer' being the best hit on the ground for many years. The score reached 230 before he was caught behind the wickets. Davies, A. E. Seymour, and J. Thomas each made a brilliant stand, and succeeded in bringing the score up to 324 before their side was all out. CRICKET CHARACTERS.

- W. M. Williams.—A fine scoring bat, with weak defensive strokes. A moderate fielder, and useful as a change bowler.
- J. Llewellyn.—A really good bowler if he could keep a better length, and get more pace on his leg breaks. An ugly style of batting, but got some runs. His play on all departments lacked the touch of 'ginger' necessary for success.
- E. G. Pritchard.—A very unlucky season. Has spoilt his batting by a slight flourish, and a tendency to play the forward cut at balls of all lengths. Would be well advised to forget this stroke altogether. Has bowled well at times, but generally rather inaccurate. Has fielded consistently well. A beautiful throw in.
- D. R. Phillips.—Another devotee of the forward cut which spoils his naturally fine hitting. Could not be taught to move his left foot properly. An energetic and safe out-field, but should practise throwing
- D. P. Gwynne.-Promised very well to start with, but struck a bad patch at half-term, and went to pieces. Will make a fine bat if he overcomes a tendency to cut straight balls. A very safe fielder.

A. V. Thomas bowled well and took three fine catches. D. R. G. Davies also bowled steadily, but found the wicket too easy to get much work on the ball. Wynn Jones and P. Williams opened the School innings in good style, but both got out to straight balls with no other special merit. D. R. G. Davies, who was in 1st wicket down, batted very carefully and well, but got no support except from A. V. Thomas, who hit up 12 in a short time. The other batsmen gave a feeble show, and the innings closed for 49 when D. R. G. Davies was bowled by a full toss. Brecon thoroughly deserved their win as they batted with plenty of confidence, and fielded keenly and well. Had our fielding been anything like as good, the game would have been very even, as the School bowling was rather better than Brecon's. G. G. Jones, who was expected to do well with the ball, was quite unable to bowl with his usual pace, length, or accuracy. G. Edwards as stumper was also distinctly off colour.

- P. A. Reed.—A most useful member of the team. An inelegant bat, but has a good eye and splendid hitting powers. Always a dangerous bowler, but should learn to bowl straight. Has lost a good many wickets through bad fielding, particularly behind the wicket. Ground fielding not very good, but could always be depended upon to hold his catches.
- R. M. Williams.—Has played several very plucky defensive innings, and should when stronger, make a very good bat. Has fielded brilliantly, and taken some very smart catches at square leg.
- J. M. Hopkins.—Came into the team rather late, but has batted very nicely. Is the most promising young batsman in the School, but is handicapped by his size. A very safe and energetic field.

Rahmattulah.—No bat, but a fine field with a good throw in. Was improving a good deal in his bowling when he fell ill, and so could not play in the later matches. Might have been a great help against Brecon.

- D. R. G. Davies.—A promising colt whose batting is improving daily. Bowls a good ball, and keeps very steady. Should practise ground fielding.
- A. V. Thomas.—A vigorous hitter with a poor style, but ought to improve a good deal next season. A promising fast bowler, but rather slack in the field.
