In Memoriam.

Capt. George H. J. Sowter was born in 1885, and was a member of the School from 1893 to 1897. Proceeding to St. George's College, a well-known Roman Catholic School in Weybridge, he passed the London Matriculation in 1902, and was articled to his father for four years, being admitted as a solicitor in 1906. After gaining experience in Leicester and Llanelly, he returned to Brigg and for the last three years was his father's partner, being Clerk to the Brigg Old Age Pension Sub-Committee and Assistant Clerk to the Brigg and Brumby and Frodingham Urban District Councils. On settling in Brigg he took a commission in the Territorials, and was a keen officer, taking every opportunity of making himself efficient. To this end he spent some time at Lichfield with the Regulars, and was about to take a course of musketry instruction, etc., at Hythe, when the war broke out. He went to the front with his regiment in February and saw a great deal of service in the Ypres neighbourhood, where on one occasion he was in the trenches 31 days. The enemy's attack was so violent that his company had to remain in support of the men who had been sent to relieve them. He was in the trenches on the famous Hill 60, and his battalion was then moved to the neighbourhood of La Bassée, when on October 13th they attacked the Hohenzollern Redoubt.

He appears to have got through the first part of the battle safely, but towards night came on a trench strongly held by the enemy, and was almost immediately killed by a bomb. His regiment suffered very severely in the engagement. Capt. Madge, the only officer who came through uninjured, wrote that Capt. Sowter died "leading his men in a successful attack on the enemy and that throughout the battle he displayed the greatest bravery." Colonel Sandall wrote that "every officer and man left in the Battalion deplored his loss, as he was always cheerful, setting an example to his men, with whom he was deservedly popular and a leader that any man was glad to follow." Many letters from the rank and file have been received to the same effect, one writing that he was "simply worshipped by his men." He will be much missed in Brigg, where he was held in the greatest esteem.

HAROLD RAYNER, who was here in 1908 and 1909, joined the 9th Lincolns. He was very soon drafted off to the Dardanelles, where he was attached to the 6th Lincs. He travelled out in the same troopship as Mr. Margetts. On November the 2nd he gave up his life for his country. A Memorial Service was held in the School Dining Room on the same evening as at the Parish Church.

Percy Alexander Margetts, B.Sc., L.C.P. joined the staff of the School when the present Headmaster came in January 1910. He came from Birstall, was educated at Batley Grammar School, of which he ever spoke enthusiastically, gained a scholarship to Leeds University, where he took his B.Sc. degree. He rendered important services to the School in the organisation of the Science and Woodwork Teaching, and later the Agricultural Science. His energy on the playing field in organising the Athletic Sports and the Football, his skill in arranging end of term Concerts, his impersonation of Shylock and Henry the Fifth in the School Plays, his help in raising the Swimming Bath Fund, and his never-failing interest in the manifold activities of school life will not be forgotten by the generation of boys who came under his

influence here. He joined a Yorkshire battalion (the Leeds Pals) as a private last January, and received a commission in the 9th Lincolns as Second Lieutenant, in the Spring. In May he married Miss Muriel Sergeant of Brigg. He went out with a draft to the Dardanelles in September. There he died a gallant death on Dec. 5th. An appreciation of his character and influence is given above.

His brother Gerald was in the troopship, Mercian, when it was attacked by a submarine in the Mediterranean. We are glad to say that he escaped injury. He is now in Egypt.

Arthur L. Patchett, who had been for some time at the front in France with the Artillery, has been in hospital seriously ill with typhoid fever.

- C. N. Herring, who is in camp in Norfolk with the Sherwood Rangers, lunched with us in the School Hall this term. He looked exceedingly fit.
- W. H. Morris has received his first stripe. Cyril P. Rhodes, in the R.A.M.C., has sailed for the East.

Hubert Ashton and Joe Neall have both left Training College to join the Army, and are now in camp at Duncombe Park, Helmslev.

- P. H. Green has been working at a Munition Factory since he left us in July.
- E. F. Mawson has entered a Bank at Southend, and C. E. W. Barlow at Scunthorpe.

FOOTBALL NOTES.

• After our disastrous season a year ago, we have experienced a great relief this term. We have been fortunate in having half of last season's Colours available this season. This, coupled with the fact that the team is bigger and heavier, has been mainly responsible for our successful season.

The 1st XI. has been Adair, Spring, Dickinson, Butt, Bones i. (Vice-Capt.), Hewitt i., Campion, Sumpter ii., Sumpter i. (Capt.), Reed, Sleightholme.

On Sept. 25th we played a scratch side brought by A. L. McIntyre, composed mainly of Old Boys. The school XI. included Mr. Francis and Mr. Knight. The game was noteworthy chiefly for the tall scoring and for the fact that most of the players were very much out of condition. The game was eventually won 8—7, Mr. Francis obtaining 5 goals and Mr. Knight 3.

Versus Gainsborough G.S., Oct. 9th, home.

As is usual, this match proved fast and vigorous, hard knocks being given and taken. But as is unusual, we retired victors, winning 2—1. For the school goals were scored by Sumpter ma. 1, Sumpter mi. 1.

Versus Caistor G.S., Oct. 16th, home.

This match was played under wretched conditions, there being a continual downpour of drizzly rain. A one-sided game, in which the goalkeeper had three kicks only, resulted in a victory of 7—o. Our opponents' sole supporter on the touch line bore witness to the effects of the war upon local schools.
