OBituary Motices.

JOSEPH ALEC DENTON was the son of Mr. S. Denton, of Brigg. After leaving the School he became an apprentice with Messrs. Guy & Smith, Grimsby. He joined the School of Wireless Telegraphy, and had not been long at sea when he was killed in a collision between two of His Majesty's Destroyers on December 21st, 1916. He was one of those who lost his life in helping to keep unceasing guard in the tempest-ridden North Sea.

WILLIAM HENRY KENNING, son of Mr. H. Kenning, of Brigg, was a pupil here for 3 years, leaving in December 1907 after passing the Cambridge Junior. Completing his apprenticeship to a Chemist at Scunthorpe, he went to London. In 1913 he entered the Westminster College of Pharmacy, where he obtained the Silver Medal for Botany and acted as Secretary to the Football Club. He qualified as a Chemist in 1914. Whilst at Boston Spa as manager, he joined the Bramham V.A.D. as Pharmacist, and lectured on Poisons and Gasses. He joined the R.A.M.C. in 1915, but was invalided out of the Corps in 1916, afterwards receiving the Military Service Medal. Marrying in Sept. 1916, he was manager of a chemist's business at Ashton-on-Ribble, Durham, where he succumbed to an attack of influenza and pneumonia on January 2nd, 1917.

SCHOOL NOTES.

Owing to the increasing number of boys it became possible to divide the School into three houses instead of two this term, and also to organise them on a territorial basis. The new house, which draws its members from the district of which Scunthorpe is the centre, is called the Sheffield House.
