Obituary Notices.

LIEUT. W STUART BEAN, the son of Mr. W A Bean, was a member of the School from 1901-1904. He was gazetted to the East Riding R.E. in December, 1914, and in 1916 was attached to the Royal Flying Corps. He served in Egypt and Mesopotamia, and was killed in action on Jan. 21st, 1918. At the time his machine was shot down by Turkish Anti-Aircraft forces he was one of a party of seven machines in action over a Turkish Aerodrome. His machine was second in the flight. By his death the Service loses a gallant officer.

F A MALTBY, the son of Mr. C Maltby of Brigg, was a member of the School from May, 1912 to Dec. 1913. After leaving school he took up his father's business, and on several occasions played for the Old Boys' Team against the School. He enlisted in the R.F.A. and was killed in the Great Offensive of March, 1918. He was, as his commanding officer states, respected and popular in his Battery. At the Memorial Service held in the Wesleyan Church, Brigg, mention was made of his earnest Christian character.

R P EMINSON, the son of Mr. W Eminson of Scotter, was a boarder at the School from September 1911 to July 1913. On leaving he took up farming as his occupation. He joined the Royal Field Artillery, but was invalided home in the Autumn of 1917, and died in March 1918.

Cadet J A Carpenter and Cadet G S C R Goodman paid visits to the School after voyages which had not been lacking in incident.

We offer our congratulations to Sec-Lieut. A E Knight and Sec-Lieut. F Hotson on receiving their commissions. The former is attached to the Devons, and the latter to the Lincolns.

Further casualties are announced as we go to press. On April 12th Capt. Kenneth Bean of the Royal Scots died of wounds received in the Great Offensive. Hubert Ashton was severely wounded and made a prisoner of war in the Cambrai battle.

SCHOOL NOTES.

We welcome two new masters, Mr. J Holloway, B.Sc. London, who comes to us from Brampton County School, where he has been Science Master for five years, and Mr. A J Gregory, who has been serving in the Army.

Our numbers have again increased this term. We now number 118.

We congratulate E S B Adair on obtaining Third Class Honours with Matriculation exemption in the Senior Cambridge Local, and also H Mumby on passing the same examination. During the year nine boys have passed the Senior Local, five of them in Honours.

At half-term several of us went on a pilgrimage to the tomb of our pious founder, Sir John Nelthorpe, in Scawby Church.

Under the auspices of the new librarian, Miss E A Hinchcliffe, B.A., many beneficial changes have been made in the library. The Committee has been reconstructed, and is now actively engaged in increasing the facilities for reading. About thirty new books have been placed on the shelves. The Illustrated London News, Public Opinion, the Model Engineer, and the Hull and Lincolnshire Times have been added. Cases are being made to preserve periodicals. The walls have been decorated with a series of portraits, suitably framed, and still further improvements are pending.

We were very much interested in a number of coloured designs for a hearth-rug which were exhibited in the Fifth Form Room. The prize offered by Miss Godley for the best design was won by Leaning. There was another artistic display of original sketches, some of which showed considerable merit. The favourite subject seemed to be the attacks of English Aeroplanes on German submarines. H H Smith was the winner of Miss Couldrey's prize.

Forms II. and I. have sent the Editor a diagram which he regrets that he cannot reproduce. It is accompanied by the following explanation. "Detention is not a very nice thing, so we have made some signs. Instead of calling out for a pen-nib and annoying our teacher, we hold up the little finger. The Potato Plot is to be ours for a second year. Some three or four boys are working hard at it during the holidays; and it will be all planted before the Summer Term begins.

Mrs. Claye has very kindly offered two prizes to be competed for by the Boys of the School on "The Great War," and special arrangements have been made to give lessons and lectures next term in connection with this subject.

The Governors have offered a Scholarship of £10, to be awarded on the results of the Junior Cambridge Local. It is intended for those who do not already hold Scholarships in the School. It may possibly be divided between two candidates.

Our charities this term have been £2 12 8 for the Bibles Fund for the National School, Brigg, this sum resulting partly from an offertory at a School Service and chiefly from a collection in the School. The offertory at the other School Service was sent to the Young Helpers' League. It amounted to 10s.

Two very enjoyable events have been lectures on Constantinople and Venice, given by Mr. Phythian under the auspices of the University Extension Committee. The slides, especially in the last lecture, were magnificent. Some essays were sent in on both lectures, Allinson, Baker i, Leaning, and Naylor i, sent in the best on Constantinople, and Maden and Smith iv on Venice.
