Our coons again distinguished themselves in the concert given at the end of last term. The whole troupe were in fine form, and the many jokes, premeditated and extempore, gave great delight to the audience—especially the joke which Massa Sambo forgot. The choruses were sung with great gusto, 'Widdicombe Fair' being especially effective; topical verses were liberally sprinkled throughout the libretto; while the delightful coon songs were sung excellently. We shall hope to hear more of them.

The present term has been an eventful one. The weather has been satisfactory on the whole, and that is saying a good deal when schoolboys are concerned. In cricket we have been fairly successful. The First Eleven have defeated Caistor, Old Cleve and Hull, and have lost to De Aston (twice), a strong Old Boys' XI and Gainsboro. The Second Eleven have won two of their three matches.

Augmented substantially by the Sports Prize Fund and by the proceeds of the Garden Fête kindly organised by Mrs. Atha, the Swimming Bath Fund has grown apace, and now amounts to £110.

The Contract has been let, the excavation has been carried out by willing hands, and some of the materials have already arrived. Our hearty thanks are due to the many friends whose generosity has brought this project within sight of accomplishment in so short a time.

The School Library continues to grow, and we have now a collection of books of which everyone should be glad to take advantage. This term the following books have been added :—The Man in the Iron Mask, Adventures of Sherlock Holmes, Return of Sherlock Holmes, Tom Sawyer, Ahmed of the Camels, Return of She, Three Men in a Boat, Many Cargoes, St. Winifred's, Les Misérables, The Iron Pirate, Uncle Tom's Cabin. Mr. Moss has kindly sent us the London Illustrated News and the Daily Mirror. Our thanks are also due to Mr. Heading, whose efforts as Librarian have resulted in such rapid progress.

Congratulations to C. V. Grant on passing Part I of the Cambridge Previous. We wish him all good luck at Downing College, whither he goes in October.

Last term we bade good-bye to Nigel Barker and A. E. Driskell. The latter is engaged as draughtsman at Scunthorpe. This term we welcomed Ringrose (Form III), Gurnell (Form III), Swindells (Form I), and Kirkland (Form I).

The Games Committee has awarded Cricket Colours to Marshall, Bryant ma. and Sumpter ma.

This term we are losing several of our number, including Grant, Goates (Captain of Football & Cricket), H. F. E. Shrigley (sub-editor of the *Briggensian*), Mc Intyre ma., Bryant ma. and Marshall. To them and to all others who are leaving we wish good luck and happiness.

SPORTS DAY, 1914.

The annual Sports were held on June 3rd. This year Fortune favoured us with fine weather, with the result that there was a large attendance. The School Field, with the well-cut track gaily decorated with flags and lined with spectators, looked at its best. The preliminary heats had been run off on May 26th, the most noteworthy event being J. Bryant's dead heat with Bones in the Relay Race.

This year it had been arranged that we should forego our prizes, and that the proceeds of the Prize Fund should be devoted to the Swimming Bath Fund. This did not, however, detract from the keenness in the various events, but rather enhanced it in those events for which points were given for the "Victor Ludorum" Cup. There was keen rivalry between boarders and day-boys, as well as between the two Houses.

The Sports commenced at half-past two with the Senior Hundred Yards—a very good race, in which Goates came in first. The next event worthy of note was the Hurdles, in which Bryant ma., leading from the start, had the misfortune to slip. Clark mi., as winner of the Junior High Jump, was a surprise packet, but he well deserved his success. The Senior High Jump was well contested, Marshall, the winner, clearing the bar at 4 feet 8 inches. The Quarter Mile, a rather crowded event, was won in fine style by Goates, while Allen showed his staying powers in the Half Mile and Mile, reaching the tape 2nd in the former and 1st in the latter—an easy winner. The Old Boys, with the exception of Mr. Rhodes, whose Quarter Mile was a feature of the afternoon, seemed rather shy of entering for the

events reserved for them, but they turned out in force for the Tug-of-War—Past v. Present, in which we were beaten, probably owing to our being all tired out (?).

After the Sports the prizes, which were intended merely as nominal ones, were kindly distributed by Mrs. Atha. Mr. Sutton-Nelthorpe, though unable to be present for the early part of the afternoon, did not disappoint us altogether, but arrived while the last events were taking place, and in time to preside at the prize-giving. In a welcome speech he congratulated us on our success in games and sports, and commended to his hearers the cause of the Swimming Bath. Mrs. Atha offered her sympathy to those who had not won prizes and reminded us that good sportsmanship was the important thing. After votes of thanks to Mrs. Atha and the Chairman and the usual cheers the visitors were entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Bryant to tea on the lawn, and thus ended a most successful Sports Day.

At half-past two the Fête was opened by Mr. Sutton-Nelthorpe, the opening ceremony being followed by exhibitions of drill and Indian club exercises. A tennis tournament was soon in full swing, and a cricket match was played in the adjoining field between Ladies' and Gentlemen's XI's, the Gentlemen winning by a few runs only. There were many other attractions, including bowls, clock-golf, houp-la, and a cocoanut stall; there was a guessing-the-weight-of-the-pig competition; and musical selections were rendered by the Brigg Silver Band.

After tea, which was provided in the grounds, two scenes of *A Midsummer Night's Dream* were played, and the club drill was repeated. An interesting programme of sports had been arranged for the evening, to be followed by dancing on the lawn, but only a few events had been held when the rain came on, bringing the Fête to a premature conclusion. This was all the more disappointing as many of the visitors only arrived in the evening, and many more would have followed later still.
