On leaving us after taking his B.A. in Honours at London University Mr. East was tutor at Cliff College, where he took his B.D. degree at London. He entered the Wesleyan Ministry and was in training at a Theological College when the war broke out, Joining the Army as a private, after six months he was given a commission, and was about to attain the rank of Captain when he was killed. He left a touching letter to his parents telling them that he found the religion which had helped him in time of peace, was found sufficient in the face of death.

Several old boys of recent date including Ashton, Neall, Westoby are now in the front line trenches in France. Mr. Francis is also there.

Lieutenant Godfrey Goodman was in the Dublin fighting, and is still on duty in Ireland.

### EMPIRE DAY.

The School celebrated Empire Day this year in a special manner. After suitable prayers, addresses were delivered to the boys by the Headmaster and members of the staff. Mr. Knight gave the first address, taking as his subject: "Great Scientists and the Empire." He showed that the Empire of Great Britain was not to be estimated by the extent of its territories so much as by the services it had rendered to the world in furthering civilisation. It was an Empire great rather in its rule over the minds of men than in its regulation of material things.

Mr. Robertson followed with an exposition of the "Growth of the British Navy and its Service to the Empire." He traced Naval History from its earliest beginnings and indicated the main periods of its development. Incidentally he gave illustrations of the effect of Naval events on the formation of the National Characteristics. Emphasis was laid on the security afforded by our First Line of Defence.

Mr. Williams gave an address on the "Growth of the Empire," and showed how the idea of responsibility to weaker races had grown. He explained that while Empire might be reckoned as adding to the fame of a country, still more did it call for intelligent self-sacrifice.

The Headmaster took as his theme the "Empire Day Golden Rules" of Lord Meath. These are fifteen in number, and are worth recording. They are: (1) Love and Fear God; (2) Honour the King; (3) Obey the Laws; (4) Prepare to advance the highest interests of the Empire in Peace and in War; (5) Cherish Patriotism; (6) Regard the Rights of

other Nations; (7) Learn Citizenship; (8) Follow duty; (9) Consider duties before rights; (10) Acquire knowledge; (11) Think broadly; (12) Practise discipline: (13) Subdue self: (14) Work for others; (15) Consider the poor and suffering.

Mr. Bryant dealt with all these, but especially with Nos. 5, 6, and 9, and showed how our enemies in the present war had disregarded the rights of others and shown no fitness for the burdens of an Empire they were ambitious of acquiring.

Suitable songs were rendered by Mr. Knight and Mr. Williams. The proceedings terminated with the National Anthem.

## BOARDERS' NOTES.
