LETTER FROM LIEUT. J G. ECCLES, INDIAN ARMY.

DUZDAP, EAST PERSIA,

31, 5, '19.

Dear Mr. Editor,

I receive the "Briggensian" regularly from home, and I look forward to reading it. I find it most interesting, and I read it from cover to cover. I thought today that you and my old school chums would like to hear from me, where I am and how the world is using me.

I have already spent a year in India. It has been a very happy year. I could, I am sure, write many pages on the custom and scenes of the country, but owing to space that is impossible in this letter. I have been stationed in several places but for the most part in Fatehgarh, a small station eighty miles North West of Cawnpore on the banks of the Ganges. Fatehgarh possesses a fine old fort and was the scene of fighting during the Mutiny. There was here a very heavy massacre of English people, two men escaping out of a number of sixty. I have been lucky in getting some good shooting (or shikar, as we call it). The Ganges is full of crocodiles, and I have been successful in shooting several large ones. Also wolf and deer are obtainable there. I know this will excite some of your readers, especially some of the boys at school who no doubt will envy me.

I was there attached to an Indian Infantry depôt. The men were good soldiers, and it was indeed a pleasure to be one of their officers. Just a few words of command are given in English, and at first it is quite amusing to listen to the native instructors. Their command "quick march" especially is amusing. They cannot say "quick" but say "guk". The men talk Urdu, which is not very difficult, and one is soon able to converse with them. The drill and nearly all the work is similar to that of the British Army. I am now setting out upon a most interesting and probably an exciting journey. I am proceeding to Turbat in East Persia. I am now at the rail-head Duzdab. I have a five hundred miles "trek" before me on pony and camel. I shall be about six weeks on the way. I have been exceedingly lucky in obtaining an appointment as a Supply Officer, and I am looking forward to seeing a new country. Duzdab is fifty miles across the border into Persia and two hundred and fifty miles from Quetta (India). We are encamped on a sandy plain surrounded by high hills. The wind is strong, and we get sand storms daily, which are most unpleasant. Your clothes, your shoes and all you possess become full of sand. But in

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spite of this the climate is very good, far nicer than the hot plains of India.

I often think of the happy days I had at B.G.S. and the good fellows I met there.

Well Mr. Editor I will close. If you can possibly spare the space to publish my poor letter, I shall be very much indebted to you. With best wishes to the old school, your paper and yourself.

"THIRTY YEARS AGO" AND TO-DAY.

The words of a popular music-hall ditty,

"Your Daddy did the same thing 50 years ago,

He acted in the same old way,"

coupled with my recent visit to the happy hunting grounds of my youth, on the occasion of the School sports, served to awaken in me memories that may perhaps amuse the rising generation of to-day.

Our Sports then in those days were run on much the same course as that you compete on to-day. One or two small differences there were; the long jump for instance was near the old elm that still stands near the sanatorium. We had no "shie" in those days, when the most interesting events were the steeplechase and obstacle race, at any rate from the spectators point of view. The course for the steeplechase started in the school field close to the cricket ground. From there it lay over the hedge into what is now Mr. Wm. Smith's garden, forty yards from this hedge it turned at a right angle and ran in a direct line from there to a point about the centre of Mr. Willey's pasture field that borders upon the road to Wrawby. Thence it turned sharply back again re-crossing the dike and hedge into the school field close to the large beech upon whose massive bole can still be seen the initials of a past generation of Briggensians. Across the neighbouring pond, which in those days was deep and well filled with water, and much wider than we could jump, a finish was made with one round of the course as you all know it to-day. A very mild introduction this to some of the cross country courses we came across in later days, but even here a thrill was occasionally provided, and I well remember one competitor going head first into the ditch approaching Mr.

Willey's field. The star performer over this course for two or three years in the early '80s was C. W. Hill, of Newstead, a relative of whom we fancy we saw competing in the long jump this year.

I wonder if a word or two here to the competitors of today would be taken amiss from one who has tried hands and feet in all the forms of sport he saw the other day? Anyhow whether or not, here goes! You long jumpers, you must learn to jump higher, sprint further before you jump, and let your run up be a real sprint reaching your best pace at the take off; the sprint should give you the length, the jump should be mainly for height. Sprinters, you must practice your start-try the "crouch"-and some of you were not sprinting but running on the flat of your feet. The high jump of the juniors particularly was quite good. A word for the Sports Committee here-a little more room should be allowed. To competitors-learn to jump in pumps, you will be more independent of the state of the ground. The highest jumpers do not try to kiss their knees when they go over the bar, but lie nearly full length along it and roll over it, difficult to learn but most effective. In the longer races, how many of you put your hands to the plough and only finished half a furrow ! more than one of you, I fancy, could have run into a place had you but gone all the way; a bad beating will often be more instructive for future years than an easy win.

Now you boys! don't you appreciate the efforts of your pals? The most lasting and appreciated part of my own winning in those long past years was not the prize, nor the sweet smile of the bonny lady who presented it to me, but the genuine full-throated howl of "Well run, sir!" which greeted its presentation, from those who had been beaten and who knew from that what work had gone to the winning. Heigho! my pen has run away with me till I doubt if you, Mr. Editor, will care to use any of this. I had intended to give other more amusing experiences, but they must await another idle hour; I much doubt, too, if having read this you are at all likely to be like Oliver Twist and ask for more.
