Mr. Sutton-Nelthorpe then thanked Mr. and Mrs. Bryant for the kind reception that they had accorded to all visitors. He was glad that so many of the staff of the school had returned safely from the war, and had again started duty. One could not, however, forget how many of the old boys of the

school had made the supreme sacrifice, and the school was indeed proud of its Roll of Honour.

THE CRICKET XI.
